Subject as provided above, the Registrar or, as the case may be, the relevant Transfer Agent will, within three business days (being for this purpose a day on which banks are open for business in the city where the specified office of the Registrar or, as the case may be, the relevant Transfer Agent is located) of the request (or such longer period as may be required to comply with any applicable fiscal or other laws or regulations), authenticate and deliver, or procure the authentication and delivery of, at its specified office to the transferee or (at the risk of the transferee) send by uninsured mail (free of charge to the holder and at the Issuer's (failing whom the Guarantor's) expense), to such address as the transferee may request, a new Definitive Registered Note in definitive form of a like aggregate nominal amount to the Definitive Registered Note (or the relevant part of the Definitive Registered Note) transferred. In the case of the transfer of part only of a Definitive Registered Note, a new Definitive Registered Note in respect of the balance of the Definitive Registered Note not transferred will be authenticated and delivered or (at the risk of the transferor) sent to the transferor (free of charge to the holder and at the Issuer's (failing whom the Guarantor's) expense).

2.3 Registration of transfer upon partial redemption

In the event of a partial redemption of Notes under Condition 8, the Issuer shall not be required to register the transfer of any Registered Note, or part of a Registered Note, called for partial redemption.

2.4 Costs of registration

Noteholders will not be required to bear the costs and expenses of effecting any registration of transfer as provided above, except for any costs or expenses of delivery other than by regular uninsured mail and except that the Issuer may require the payment of a sum sufficient to cover any stamp duty, tax or other governmental charge that may be imposed in relation to the registration.

2.5 Closed Periods

No Noteholder may require the transfer of a Registered Note to be registered during the period of (i) 15 days ending on (and including) the due date for redemption of, or payment of any Instalment Amount in respect of, that Note and (ii) during the period of seven days ending on (and including) any Record Date (as defined in Condition 7.4).

3 Status of the Notes and the Guarantee

3.1 Status of the Notes

The Notes and any relative Receipts and Coupons constitute direct, unconditional, unsubordinated and (subject to Condition 4) unsecured obligations of the Issuer and shall at all times rank *pari passu* and without any preference among themselves. The payment obligations of the Issuer under the Notes shall, save for certain obligations required to be preferred by law and subject to Condition 4, at all times rank at least equally with all its other present and future unsecured and unsubordinated obligations (other than subordinated obligations, if any), from time to time outstanding.

3.2 Status of the Guarantee

The payment of principal and interest in respect of the Notes and all other moneys payable by the Issuer under or pursuant to the Notes has been unconditionally and irrevocably guaranteed by the Guarantor in the Guarantee. The obligations of the Guarantor under the Guarantee are direct, unconditional, unsubordinated and (subject to Condition 4) unsecured obligations of the Guarantor and (save for certain obligations required to be preferred by law) rank equally with all other unsecured obligations (other than subordinated obligations, if any) of the Guarantor, from time to time outstanding.

4 Negative Pledge

So long as any Note and the relative Receipts or Coupons remains outstanding (as defined in the Agency Agreement), neither the Issuer nor the Guarantor will create or permit to subsist, and will procure that no Material Subsidiary (as defined below) creates or permits to subsist, any mortgage, charge, pledge, lien or other form of encumbrance or security interest ("Encumbrance"), other than the Permitted Encumbrance, upon the whole or any part of its present or future undertaking, assets or revenues (including any uncalled capital) to secure any Relevant Indebtedness (as defined below) or to secure any guarantee of or indemnity in respect of any Relevant Indebtedness unless, at the same time or prior thereto according to the Notes the same security as is created or subsisting to secure any such Relevant Indebtedness, guarantee or indemnity or according such other security as shall be approved by an Extraordinary Resolution (as defined in the Agency Agreement).

For the purposes of these Conditions:

"Material Subsidiary" means any Subsidiary of the Guarantor:

(a) whose gross revenue (consolidated in the case of a Subsidiary which itself has Subsidiaries) or whose gross assets (consolidated in the case of a Subsidiary which itself has Subsidiaries) represent not less than 10 per cent. of the consolidated gross revenue, or, as the case may be, the consolidated gross assets of the Guarantor and its Subsidiaries taken as a whole, all as

calculated respectively by reference to the latest audited financial statements (consolidated or, as the case may be, unconsolidated) of the Subsidiary and the then latest audited consolidated financial statements of the Guarantor, provided that:

- (i) in the case of a Subsidiary acquired after the end of the financial period to which the then latest audited consolidated financial statements of the Guarantor relate for the purpose of applying each of the foregoing tests, the reference to the Guarantor's latest audited consolidated financial statements shall be deemed to be a reference to such audited financial statements as if such Subsidiary had been shown therein by reference to its then latest relevant audited financial statements, adjusted as deemed appropriate by the auditor for the time being, after consultation with the Guarantor;
- (ii) if at any relevant time in relation to the Guarantor or any Subsidiary no financial statements are prepared and audited, its gross revenue and gross assets (consolidated, if applicable) shall be determined on the basis of pro forma consolidated financial statements (consolidated, if applicable) prepared for this purpose; and
- (iii) if the financial statements of any Subsidiary (not being a Subsidiary referred to in proviso (i) above) are not consolidated with those of the Guarantor, then the determination of whether or not such Subsidiary is a Material Subsidiary shall be based on a pro forma consolidation of its financial statements (consolidated, if appropriate) with the consolidated financial statements (determined on the basis of the foregoing) of the Guarantor; or
- (b) to which is transferred all or substantially all of the business, undertaking and assets of another Subsidiary which immediately prior to such transfer is a Material Subsidiary, whereupon (a) in the case of a transfer by a Material Subsidiary, the transferor Material Subsidiary shall immediately cease to be a Material Subsidiary and (b) the transferee Subsidiary shall immediately become a Material Subsidiary, provided that on or after the date on which the relevant financial statements for the financial period current at the date of such transfer are published, whether such transferor Subsidiary or such transferee Subsidiary is or is not a Material Subsidiary shall be determined pursuant to the provisions of sub-paragraph (a) above.

A report by two of the directors of the Guarantor that in their opinion (making such adjustments (if any) as they shall deem appropriate) a Subsidiary is or is not or was or was not at any particular time or during any particular period a Material Subsidiary shall, in the absence of manifest error, be conclusive and binding on the Issuer, the Guarantor and the Noteholders.

"Permitted Encumbrance" means (i) any Encumbrance over any assets (or related documents of title) purchased by the Issuer, the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary as security for all or part of the purchase price of such assets and any substitute Encumbrance created on those assets in connection with the refinancing (together with interest, fees and other charges attributable to such refinancing) of the indebtedness secured on those assets; and (ii) any Encumbrance over any assets (or related documents of title) purchased by the Issuer, the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary subject to such Encumbrance and any substitute Encumbrance created on those assets in connection with the refinancing (together with interest, fees and other charges attributable to such refinancing) of the indebtedness secured on those assets.

"Relevant Indebtedness" means any present or future indebtedness in the form of, or represented by, bonds, debentures, notes loan stock certificates of deposit or other securities which are for the time being, or are intended to be, or are capable of being, quoted, listed, ordinarily dealt in or traded on any stock exchange or over-the-counter or other securities market, having an original maturity of more than one year from its date of issue.

"Subsidiary", in relation to any person, means any company or other business entity of which that person owns or controls (either directly or through one or more other Subsidiaries) more than 50 per cent. of the issued share capital or other ownership interest having ordinary voting power to elect directors, managers or trustees of such company or other business entity or any company or other business entity which at any time has its accounts consolidated with those of that person or

which, under the laws, regulations or generally accepted accounting principles of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region of the People's Republic of China ("Hong Kong") from time to time, should have its accounts consolidated with those of that person.

5 Redenomination

5.1 Redenomination

Where redenomination is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement as being applicable, the Issuer may, without the consent of the Noteholders, the Receiptholders and the Couponholders, on giving prior notice to the Fiscal Agent and Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and/or the CMU, as applicable, and at least 30 days' prior notice to the Noteholders in accordance with Condition 15, elect that, with effect from the Redenomination Date specified in the notice, the Notes shall be redenominated in euro.

The election will have effect as follows:

- (a) the Notes and the Receipts shall be deemed to be redenominated in euro in the denomination of euro 0.01 with a nominal amount for each Note and Receipt equal to the nominal amount of that Note or Receipt in the Specified Currency, converted into euro at the Established Rate, provided that, if the Issuer determines, with the agreement of the Fiscal Agent, that the then market practice in respect of the redenomination in euro of internationally offered securities is different from the provisions specified above, such provisions shall be deemed to be amended so as to comply with such market practice and the Issuer shall promptly notify the Noteholders, the stock exchange (if any) on which the Notes may be listed and the Paying Agents of such deemed amendments;
- (b) save to the extent that an Exchange Notice has been given in accordance with paragraph (d) below, the amount of interest due in respect of the Notes will be calculated by reference to the aggregate nominal amount of Notes presented (or, as the case may be, in respect of which Coupons are presented) for payment by the relevant holder and the amount of such payment shall be rounded down to the nearest euro 0.01;
- (c) if definitive Notes are required to be issued after the Redenomination Date, they shall be issued at the expense of the Issuer in the denominations of euro 1,000, euro 10,000, euro 100,000 and (but only to the extent of any remaining amounts less than euro 1,000 or such smaller denominations as the Fiscal Agent may approve) euro 0.01 and such other denominations as the Fiscal Agent shall determine and notify to the Noteholders;
- (d) if issued prior to the Redenomination Date, all unmatured Coupons denominated in the Specified Currency (whether or not attached to the Notes) will become void with effect from the date on which the Issuer gives notice (the "Exchange Notice") that replacement euro-denominated Notes, Receipts and Coupons are available for exchange (provided that such securities are so available) and no payments will be made in respect of them. The payment obligations contained in any Notes and Receipts so issued will also become void on that date although those Notes and Receipts will continue to constitute valid exchange obligations of the Issuer. New euro-denominated Notes, Receipts and Coupons will be issued in exchange for Notes, Receipts and Coupons denominated in the Specified Currency in such manner as the Fiscal Agent may specify and as shall be notified to the Noteholders in the Exchange Notice. No Exchange Notice may be given less than 15 days prior to any date for payment of principal or interest on the Notes;
- (e) after the Redenomination Date, all payments in respect of the Notes, the Receipts and the Coupons, other than payments of interest in respect of periods commencing before the Redenomination Date, will be made solely in euro as though references in the Notes to the Specified Currency were to euro. Payments will be made in euro by credit or transfer to a euro account (or any other account to which euro may be credited or transferred) specified by the payee;

- (f) if the Notes are Fixed Rate Notes and interest for any period ending on or after the Redenomination Date is required to be calculated for a period ending other than on an Interest Payment Date, it will be calculated:
 - (i) in the case of the Notes represented by a Global Note, by applying the Rate of Interest to the aggregate outstanding nominal amount of the Notes represented by such Global Note; and
 - (ii) in the case of definitive Notes, by applying the Rate of Interest to the Calculation Amount;

and, in each case, multiplying such sum by the applicable Day Count Fraction, and rounding the resultant figure to the nearest sub-unit of the relevant Specified Currency, half of any such sub-unit being rounded upwards or otherwise in accordance with applicable market convention. Where the Specified Denomination of a Fixed Rate Note in definitive form is a multiple of the Calculation Amount, the amount of interest payable in respect of such Fixed Rate Note shall be the product of the amount (determined in the manner provided above) for the Calculation Amount and the amount by which the Calculation Amount is multiplied to reach the Specified Denomination without any further rounding;

- (g) if the Notes are Floating Rate Notes, the applicable Pricing Supplement will specify any relevant changes to the provisions relating to interest; and
- (h) such other changes shall be made to this Condition as the Issuer may decide, after consultation with the Fiscal Agent, and as may be specified in the notice, to conform it to conventions then applicable to instruments denominated in euro.

5.2 Definitions

In these Conditions, the following expressions have the following meanings:

"Established Rate" means the rate for the conversion of the Specified Currency (including compliance with rules relating to roundings in accordance with applicable European Union regulations) into euro established by the Council of the European Union pursuant to Article 140 of the Treaty;

"euro" means the lawful currency of member states of the European Union that adopt the single currency introduced in accordance with the Treaty establishing the European Community, as amended from time to time;

"Redenomination Date" means (in the case of interest bearing Notes) any date for payment of interest under the Notes or (in the case of Zero Coupon Notes) any date, in each case specified by the Issuer in the notice given to the Noteholders pursuant to Condition 5.1 above and which falls on or after the date on which the country of the Specified Currency first participates in the third stage of European economic and monetary union; and

"Treaty" means the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union, as amended.

6 Interest

6.1 Interest on Fixed Rate Notes

Each Fixed Rate Note bears interest on its outstanding nominal amount (or if it is a Partly Paid Note, the nominal amount paid up) from (and including) the Interest Commencement Date at the rate(s) per annum equal to the Rate(s) of Interest. Interest will be payable in arrear on the Interest Payment Date(s) in each year up to (and including) the Maturity Date.

If the Notes are in definitive form, except as provided in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the amount of interest payable on each Interest Payment Date in respect of the Fixed Interest Period ending on (but excluding) such date will amount to the Fixed Coupon Amount. Payments of interest on any Interest Payment Date will, if so specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, amount to the Broken Amount so specified.

As used in these Conditions, "Fixed Interest Period" means the period from (and including) an Interest Payment Date (or the Interest Commencement Date) to (but excluding) the next (or first) Interest Payment Date.

Except in the case of Notes in definitive form where an applicable Fixed Coupon Amount or Broken Amount is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, interest shall be calculated in respect of any period by applying the Rate of Interest to:

- (A) in the case of Fixed Rate Notes which are (i) represented by a Global Note or (i) Registered Notes in definitive form, the aggregate outstanding nominal amount of (A) the Fixed Rate Notes represented by such Global Note or (B) such Registered Note (or, in each case, if they are Partly Paid Notes, the aggregate amount paid up); or
- (B) in the case of Fixed Rate Notes which are Bearer Notes in definitive form, the Calculation Amount;

and, in each case, multiplying such sum by the applicable Day Count Fraction. The resultant figure (including after application of any Fixed Coupon Amount or Broken Amount, as applicable, to the aggregate outstanding nominal amount of Fixed Rate Notes which are Registered Notes in definitive form or the Calculation Amount in the case of Fixed Rate Notes which are Bearer Notes in definitive form) shall be rounded to the nearest sub-unit of the relevant Specified Currency, half of any such sub-unit being rounded upwards or otherwise in accordance with applicable market convention. Where the Specified Denomination of a Fixed Rate Note which is a Bearer Note in definitive form is a multiple of the Calculation Amount, the amount of interest payable in respect of such Fixed Rate Note shall be the product of the amount (determined in the manner provided above) for the Calculation Amount and the amount by which the Calculation Amount is multiplied to reach the Specified Denomination without any further rounding.

"Day Count Fraction" means, in respect of the calculation of an amount of interest in accordance with this Condition 6.1:

- (a) if "Actual/Actual (ICMA)" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement:
 - (i) in the case of Notes where the number of days in the relevant period from (and including) the most recent Interest Payment Date (or, if none, the Interest Commencement Date) to (but excluding) the relevant payment date (the "Accrual Period") is equal to or shorter than the Determination Period during which the Accrual Period ends, the number of days in such Accrual Period divided by the product of (I) the number of days in such Determination Period and (II) the number of Determination Dates (as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement) that would occur in one calendar year; or

- (ii) in the case of Notes where the Accrual Period is longer than the Determination Period during which the Accrual Period ends, the sum of:
 - (A) the number of days in such Accrual Period falling in the Determination Period in which the Accrual Period begins divided by the product of (x) the number of days in such Determination Period and (y) the number of Determination Dates that would occur in one calendar year; and
 - (B) the number of days in such Accrual Period falling in the next Determination Period divided by the product of (x) the number of days in such Determination Period and (y) the number of Determination Dates that would occur in one calendar year;
- (b) if "30/360" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the number of days in the period from (and including) the most recent Interest Payment Date (or, if none, the Interest Commencement Date) to (but excluding) the relevant payment date (such number of days being calculated on the basis of a year of 360 days with 12 30-day months) divided by 360; and
- (c) if "Actual/365 (Fixed)" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the actual number of days in the Interest Period divided by 365.

In these Conditions:

"Determination Period" means each period from (and including) a Determination Date to (but excluding) the next Determination Date (including, where either the Interest Commencement Date or the final Interest Payment Date is not a Determination Date, the period commencing on the first Determination Date prior to, and ending on the first Determination Date falling after, such date); and

"sub-unit" means, with respect to any currency other than euro, the lowest amount of such currency that is available as legal tender in the country of such currency and, with respect to euro, one cent.

6.2 Interest on Floating Rate Notes and Index Linked Interest Notes

(a) Interest Payment Dates

Each Floating Rate Note and Index Linked Interest Note bears interest on its outstanding nominal amount (or if it is a Partly Paid Note, the nominal amount paid up) from (and including) the Interest Commencement Date and such interest will be payable in arrear on either:

- (i) the Specified Interest Payment Date(s) in each year specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement; or
- (ii) if no Specified Interest Payment Date(s) is/are specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, each date (each such date, together with each Specified Interest Payment Date, an "Interest Payment Date") which falls the number of months or other period specified as the Specified Period in the applicable Pricing Supplement after the preceding Interest Payment Date or, in the case of the first Interest Payment Date, after the Interest Commencement Date.

Such interest will be payable in respect of each Interest Period. In these Conditions, "Interest Period" means the period from (and including) an Interest Payment Date (or the Interest Commencement Date) to (but excluding) the next (or first) Interest Payment Date) or the relevant payment date if the Notes become payable on a date other than an Interest Payment Date.

If a Business Day Convention is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement and (x) if there is no numerically corresponding day in the calendar month in which an Interest Payment Date should occur or (y) if any Interest Payment Date would otherwise fall on a day which is not a Business Day, then, if the Business Day Convention specified is:

- (A) in any case where Specified Periods are specified in accordance with Condition 6.2(a)(ii) above, the Floating Rate Convention, such Interest Payment Date (a) in the case of (x) above, shall be the last day that is a Business Day in the relevant month and the provisions of (ii) below shall apply *mutatis mutandis* or (b) in the case of (y) above, shall be postponed to the next day which is a Business Day unless it would thereby fall into the next calendar month, in which event (i) such Interest Payment Date shall be brought forward to the immediately preceding Business Day and (ii) each subsequent Interest Payment Date shall be the last Business Day in the month which falls in the Specified Period after the preceding applicable Interest Payment Date occurred; or
- (B) the Following Business Day Convention, such Interest Payment Date shall be postponed to the next day which is a Business Day; or
- (C) the Modified Following Business Day Convention, such Interest Payment Date shall be postponed to the next day which is a Business Day unless it would thereby fall into the next calendar month, in which event such Interest Payment Date shall be brought forward to the immediately preceding Business Day; or
- (D) the Preceding Business Day Convention, such Interest Payment Date shall be brought forward to the immediately preceding Business Day.

(b) Rate of Interest

The Rate of Interest payable from time to time in respect of Floating Rate Notes and Index Linked Interest Notes will be determined in the manner specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement.

(A) ISDA Determination for Floating Rate Notes

Where ISDA Determination is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement as the manner in which the Rate of Interest is to be determined, the Rate of Interest for each Interest Period will be the relevant ISDA Rate plus or minus (as indicated in the applicable Pricing Supplement) the Margin (if any). For the purposes of this subparagraph (i), "ISDA Rate" for an Interest Period means a rate equal to the Floating Rate that would be determined by the Fiscal Agent under an interest rate swap transaction if the Fiscal Agent were acting as Calculation Agent for that swap transaction under the terms of an agreement incorporating the 2006 ISDA Definitions, as published by the International Swaps and Derivatives Association, Inc. and as amended and updated as at the Issue Date of the first Tranche of the Notes (the "ISDA Definitions") and under which:

- (A) the Floating Rate Option is as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement;
- (B) the Designated Maturity is a period specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement; and
- (C) the relevant Reset Date is either (a) if the applicable Floating Rate Option is based on the London interbank offered rate ("LIBOR"), the Euro-zone interbank offered rate ("EURIBOR") or the Hong Kong interbank offered rate ("HIBOR"), the first day of that Interest Period or (b) in any other case, as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement.

For the purposes of this subparagraph (i), "Floating Rate", "Calculation Agent", "Floating Rate Option", "Designated Maturity" and "Reset Date" have the meanings given to those terms in the ISDA Definitions.

Unless otherwise stated in the applicable Pricing Supplement the Minimum Rate of Interest shall be deemed to be zero.

(B) Screen Rate Determination for Floating Rate Notes

Where Screen Rate Determination is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement as the manner in which the Rate of Interest is to be determined, the Rate of Interest for each Interest Period will, subject as provided below, be either:

- (A) the offered quotation; or
- (B) the arithmetic mean (rounded if necessary to the fifth decimal place, with 0.000005 being rounded upwards) of the offered quotations,

(expressed as a percentage rate per annum) for the Reference Rate which appears or appear, as the case may be, on the Relevant Screen Page (or such replacement page on that service which displays the information) as at 11.00 a.m. (London time, in the case of LIBOR, or Brussels time, in the case of EURIBOR, or Hong Kong time, in the case of HIBOR) on the Interest Determination Date in question plus or minus (as indicated in the applicable Pricing Supplement) the Margin (if any), all as determined by the Calculation Agent (as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement). If five or more of such offered quotations are available on the Relevant Screen Page, the highest (or, if there is more than one such highest quotation, one only of such quotations) and the lowest (or, if there is more than one such lowest quotation, one only of such quotations) shall be disregarded by the Calculation Agent (as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement) for the purpose of determining the arithmetic mean (rounded as provided above) of such offered quotations.

The Agency Agreement contains provisions for determining the Rate of Interest in the event that the Relevant Screen Page is not available or if, in the case of (A) above, no such offered quotation appears or, in the case of (B) above, fewer than three such offered quotations appear, in each case as at the time specified in the preceding paragraph.

Unless otherwise stated, in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the Minimum Rate of Interest shall be deemed to be zero.

(c) Minimum Rate of Interest and/or Maximum Rate of Interest

If the applicable Pricing Supplement specifies a Minimum Rate of Interest for any Interest Period, then, in the event that the Rate of Interest in respect of such Interest Period determined in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (b) above is less than such Minimum Rate of Interest, the Rate of Interest for such Interest Period shall be such Minimum Rate of Interest.

If the applicable Pricing Supplement specifies a Maximum Rate of Interest for any Interest Period, then, in the event that the Rate of Interest in respect of such Interest Period determined in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (b) above is greater than such Maximum Rate of Interest, the Rate of Interest for such Interest Period shall be such Maximum Rate of Interest.

(d) Determination of Rate of Interest and calculation of Interest Amounts

The Fiscal Agent or the Calculation Agent (as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement), as applicable, in the cases of Floating Rate Notes and Index Linked Interest Notes, will at or as soon as practicable after each time at which the Rate of Interest is to be determined, determine the Rate of Interest for the relevant Interest Period. In the case where the Calculation Agent is the party responsible for determining the rate of interest, the Calculation Agent will notify the Fiscal Agent of the Rate of Interest for the relevant Interest Period as soon as practicable after calculating the same.

The Fiscal Agent or the Calculation Agent (as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement), as applicable, will calculate the amount of interest (the "Interest Amount") payable on the Floating Rate Notes or Index Linked Interest Notes for the relevant Interest Period by applying the Rate of Interest to:

- (A) in the case of Floating Rate Notes or Index Linked Interest Notes which are represented by a Global Note, the aggregate outstanding nominal amount of the Notes represented by such Global Note (or, if they are Partly Paid Notes, the aggregate amount paid up); or
- (B) in the case of Floating Rate Notes or Index Linked Interest Notes in definitive form, the Calculation Amount;

and, in each case, multiplying such sum by the applicable Day Count Fraction, and rounding the resultant figure to the nearest sub-unit of the relevant Specified Currency, half of any such sub-unit being rounded upwards or otherwise in accordance with applicable market convention. Where the Specified Denomination of a Floating Rate Note or an Index Linked Interest Note in definitive form is a multiple of the Calculation Amount, the Interest Amount payable in respect of such Note shall be the product of the amount (determined in the manner provided above) for the Calculation Amount and the amount by which the Calculation Amount is multiplied to reach the Specified Denomination without any further rounding.

"Day Count Fraction" means, in respect of the calculation of an amount of interest in accordance with this Condition 6.2:

- (i) if "Actual/Actual (ISDA)" or "Actual/Actual" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the actual number of days in the Interest Period divided by 365 (or, if any portion of that Interest Period falls in a leap year, the sum of (I) the actual number of days in that portion of the Interest Period falling in a leap year divided by 366 and (II) the actual number of days in that portion of the Interest Period falling in a non-leap year divided by 365);
- (ii) if "Actual/365 (Fixed)" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the actual number of days in the Interest Period divided by 365;
- (iii) if "Actual/365 (Sterling)" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the actual number of days in the Interest Period divided by 365 or, in the case of an Interest Payment Date falling in a leap year, 366;
- (iv) if "Actual/360" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the actual number of days in the Interest Period divided by 360;
- (v) if "30/360", "360/360" or "Bond Basis" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the number of days in the Interest Period divided by 360, calculated on a formula basis as follows:

Day Count Fraction =
$$\frac{([360 \times (Y_2 - Y_1)] + [30 \times (M_2 - M_1)] + (MD_2 - D_1))}{360}$$

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where:

"Y₁" is the year, expressed as a number, in which the first day of the Interest Period falls;

"Y₂" is the year, expressed as a number, in which the day immediately following the last day of the Interest Period falls;

"M₁" is the calendar month, expressed as a number, in which the first day of the Interest Period falls;

" M_2 " is the calendar month, expressed as a number, in which the day immediately following the last day of the Interest Period falls;

"D₁" is the first calendar day, expressed as a number, of the Interest Period, unless such number is 31, in which case D1 will be 30; and

"D₂" is the calendar day, expressed as a number, immediately following the last day included in the Interest Period, unless such number would be 31 and D1 is greater than 29, in which case D2 will be 30;

(vi) if "30E/360" or "Eurobond Basis" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the number of days in the Interest Period divided by 360, calculated on a formula basis as follows:

Day Count Fraction =
$$\frac{([360 \times (Y_2 - Y_1)] + [30 \times (M_2 - M_1)] + (MD_2 - D_1))}{360}$$

where:

"Y₁" is the year, expressed as a number, in which the first day of the Interest Period falls;

" Y_2 " is the year, expressed as a number, in which the day immediately following the last day of the Interest Period falls;

" M_1 " is the calendar month, expressed as a number, in which the first day of the Interest Period falls;

" M_2 " is the calendar month, expressed as a number, in which the day immediately following the last day of the Interest Period falls;

" D_1 " is the first calendar day, expressed as a number, of the Interest Period, unless such number would be 31, in which case D_1 will be 30; and

" D_2 " is the calendar day, expressed as a number, immediately following the last day included in the Interest Period, unless such number would be 31, in which case D_2 will be 30; and

(vii) If "30E/360 (ISDA)" is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the number of days in the Interest Period divided by 360, calculated on a formula basis as follows:

Day Count Fraction =
$$\frac{([360 \times (Y_2 - Y_1)] + [30 \times (M_2 - M_1)] + (MD_2 - D_1))}{360}$$

where:

" Y_1 " is the year, expressed as a number, in which the first day of the Interest Period falls;

"Y₂" is the year, expressed as a number, in which the day immediately following the last day of the Interest Period falls;

"M₁" is the calendar month, expressed as a number, in which the first day of the Interest Period falls;

"M₂" is the calendar month, expressed as a number, in which the day immediately following the last day of the Interest Period falls;

" D_1 " is the first calendar day, expressed as a number, of the Interest Period, unless (i) that day is the last day of February or (ii) such number would be 31, in which case D_1 will be 30; and

" D_2 " is the calendar day, expressed as a number, immediately following the last day included in the Interest Period, unless (i) that day is the last day of February but not the Maturity Date or (ii) such number would be 31 and D_2 will be 30.

(e) Notification of Rate of Interest and Interest Amounts

The Fiscal Agent or the Calculation Agent (as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement), as applicable, will cause the Rate of Interest and each Interest Amount for each Interest Period and the relevant Interest Payment Date to be notified to the Issuer by no later than the first day of each Interest Period as soon as possible after their determination but in no event later than the fourth London Business Day thereafter. Each Interest Amount and Interest Payment Date so notified may subsequently be amended (or appropriate alternative arrangements made by way of adjustment) without prior notice in the event of an extension or shortening of the Interest Period. For the purposes of this paragraph, the expression "London Business Day" means a day (other than a Saturday or a Sunday) on which banks and foreign exchange markets are open for general business in London.

(f) Certificates to be final

All certificates, communications, opinions, determinations, calculations, quotations and decisions given, expressed, made or obtained for the purposes of the provisions of this Condition 6.2, whether by the Fiscal Agent or the Calculation Agent, as applicable, shall (in the absence of wilful default, gross negligence or manifest error) be binding on the Issuer, the Guarantor, the Fiscal Agent, the other Agents and all Noteholders, Receiptholders and Couponholders and (in the absence of wilful default and gross negligence) no liability to the Issuer, the Guarantor, the Noteholders, the Receiptholders or the Couponholders shall attach to the Fiscal Agent or the Calculation Agent, if applicable, in connection with the exercise or non-exercise by it of its powers, duties and discretions pursuant to such provisions.

(g) Benchmark Replacement

In addition, notwithstanding the provisions above in this Condition 6.2, if the Issuer determines that a Benchmark Event (as defined below) has occurred in relation to the relevant Reference Rate when any Rate of Interest (or the relevant component part thereof) remains to be determined by such Reference Rate, then the following provisions shall apply:

(A) the Issuer shall use all reasonable endeavours to appoint, as soon as reasonably practicable, an Independent Adviser (as defined below) to determine (acting in a reasonable manner), no later than five business days prior to the relevant Interest Determination Date relating to the next succeeding Interest Period (the "IA Determination Cut-off Date"), a Successor Rate (as defined below) or, alternatively, if there is no Successor Rate, an Alternative Reference Rate (as defined below) for purposes of determining the Rate of Interest (or the relevant component part thereof) applicable to the Notes. In making such determination,

the Independent Adviser appointed pursuant to this Condition 6.2(g) shall act in good faith as an expert and in consultation with the Issuer. In the absence of bad faith or fraud, the Independent Adviser shall have no liability whatsoever to the Issuer, the Paying Agents, the Noteholders, the Receiptholders or the Couponholders for any determination made by it, pursuant to this Condition 6.2(g);

- (B) if the Issuer (acting in a reasonable manner) is unable to appoint an Independent Adviser, or the Independent Adviser appointed by it fails to determine a Successor Rate or failing which, an Alternative Reference Rate prior to the IA Determination Cut-off Date, the Rate of Interest applicable to the next succeeding Interest Period shall be equal to the Rate of Interest last determined in relation to the Notes in respect of the preceding Interest Period (or alternatively, if there has not been a first Interest Payment Date, the Rate of Interest shall be the initial Rate of Interest) (subject, where applicable, to substituting the Margin (as defined below) that applied to such preceding Interest Period for the Margin that is to be applied to the relevant Interest Period); for the avoidance of doubt, the proviso in this subparagraph (B) shall apply to the relevant Interest Period only and any subsequent Interest Periods are subject to the subsequent operation of, and to adjustment as provided in, Condition 6.2(g)(A));
- (C) if the Independent Adviser determines a Successor Rate or, failing which, an Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable) in accordance with the above provisions, the Independent Adviser (acting in good faith and in a commercially reasonable manner), may also specify changes to these Conditions, including but not limited to the Day Count Fraction, Relevant Screen Page, Business Day Convention, business days, Interest Determination Date and/or the definition of Reference Rate applicable to the Notes, and the method for determining the fallback rate in relation to the Notes, if such changes are necessary to ensure the proper operation of such Successor Rate, Alternative Reference Rate and/or Adjustment Spread (as defined below) (as applicable). If the Independent Adviser (in consultation with the Issuer) determines that an Adjustment Spread is required to be applied to the Successor Rate or the Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable) and determines the quantum of, or a formula or methodology for determining, such Adjustment Spread, then such Adjustment Spread shall be applied to the Successor Rate or the Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable). If the Independent Adviser is unable to determine the quantum of, or a formula or methodology for determining, such Adjustment Spread, then such Successor Rate or Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable) will apply without an Adjustment Spread. For the avoidance of doubt, the Fiscal Agent and the Paying Agents shall, at the direction and expense of the Issuer, effect such consequential amendments to the Agency Agreement and these Conditions as may be required in order to give effect to this Condition 6.2(g)(C). Noteholder consent shall not be required in connection with effecting the Successor Rate or the Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable) or such other changes, including for the execution of any documents or other steps by the Fiscal Agent or the Paying Agents (if required); and
- (D) the Issuer shall, prior to the IA Determination Cut-off Date, following the determination of any Successor Rate or Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable), give notice thereof to the Fiscal Agent, the Paying Agents and, in accordance with Condition 15, the Noteholders, which shall specify the effective date(s) for such Successor Rate or Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable) and any consequential changes made to these Conditions,

provided that the determination of any Successor Rate or Alternative Reference Rate, and any other related changes to the Notes, shall be made in accordance with applicable law.

For the purposes of this Condition 6.2(g):

"Adjustment Spread" means a spread (which may be positive or negative) or formula or methodology for calculating a spread, which the Independent Adviser (in consultation with the Issuer) determines is required to be applied to the Successor Rate or the Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable) in order to reduce or eliminate, to the extent reasonably practicable in the circumstances, any economic prejudice or benefit (as applicable) to Noteholders and Couponholders as a result of the replacement of the Reference Rate with the Successor Rate or the Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable) and is the spread, formula or methodology which:

- (i) in the case of a Successor Rate, is formally recommended in relation to the replacement of the Reference Rate with the Successor Rate by any Relevant Nominating Body; or
- (ii) in the case of a Successor Rate for which no such recommendation has been made or in the case of an Alternative Reference Rate, the Independent Adviser (in consultation with the Issuer) determines is recognised or acknowledged as being in customary market usage in international debt capital markets transactions which reference the Reference Rate, where such rate has been replaced by the Successor Rate or the Alternative Reference Rate (as applicable); or
- (iii) if no such customary market usage is recognised or acknowledged, the Independent Adviser (in consultation with the Issuer) or the Issuer in its discretion (as applicable), determines (acting in a reasonable manner) to be appropriate;

"Alternative Reference Rate" means the rate that the Independent Adviser determines has replaced the relevant Reference Rate in customary market usage in the international debt capital markets for the purposes of determining rates of interest in respect of bonds denominated in the Specified Currency and of a comparable duration to the relevant Interest Period, or, if the Independent Adviser determines that there is no such rate, such other rate as the Independent Adviser determines in its discretion (acting in a reasonable manner) is most comparable to the relevant Reference Rate;

"Benchmark Event" means, in respect of a Reference Rate:

- (i) such Reference Rate ceasing be published for a period of at least five business days or ceasing to exist;
- (ii) a public statement by the administrator of such Reference Rate that it will, by a specified date within the following six months, cease publishing such Reference Rate permanently or indefinitely (in circumstances where no successor administrator has been appointed that will continue publication of such Reference Rate:
- (iii) a public statement by the supervisor of the administrator of such Reference Rate that such Reference Rate has been or will, by a specified date within the following six months, be permanently or indefinitely discontinued;
- (iv) a public statement by the supervisor of the administrator of such Reference Rate that means such Reference Rate will be prohibited from being used or that its use will be subject to restrictions or adverse consequences, in each case within the following six months;
- (v) the making of a public statement by the supervisor of the administrator of the Reference Rate that such Reference Rate is or will, by a specified future date with the following six months, be no longer representative of its relevant underlying market; or

(vi) it has become unlawful for any Paying Agent, Calculation Agent, the Issuer or other party to calculate any payments due to be made to any Noteholder using such Reference Rate;

provided that the Benchmark Event shall be deemed to occur (a) in the case of sub-paragraphs (ii) and (iii) above, on the date of the cessation of publication of the Reference Rate or the discontinuation of the Reference Rate, as the case may be, (b) in the case of sub-paragraph (iv) above, on the date of the prohibition of use of the Reference Rate and (c) in the case of sub-paragraph (v) above, on the date with effect from which the Reference Rate will no longer be (or will be deemed by the relevant supervisor to no longer be) representative of its relevant underlying market and which is specified in the relevant public statement, and, in each case, not the date of the relevant public statement.

The occurrence of a Benchmark Event shall be determined by the Issuer and promptly notified to the Fiscal Agent, the Calculation Agent and the Paying Agents. For the avoidance of doubt, neither the Fiscal Agent, the Calculation Agent nor the Paying Agents shall have any responsibility for making such determination.

"Business Day" means:

- (a) a day on which commercial banks and foreign exchange markets settle payments and are open for general business (including dealing in foreign exchange and foreign currency deposits) in Hong Kong and each Additional Business Centre (other than TARGET2 System (as defined below)) specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement;
- (b) if TARGET2 System is specified as an Additional Business Centre in the applicable Pricing Supplement, a day on which the Trans-European Automated Real-Time Gross Settlement Express Transfer (TARGET2) System (the "TARGET2 System") is open;

either (i) in relation to any sum payable in a Specified Currency other than euro and Renminbi, a day on which commercial banks and foreign exchange markets settle payments and are open for general business (including dealing in foreign exchange and foreign currency deposits) in the principal financial centre of the country of the relevant Specified Currency (which if the Specified Currency is Australian dollars or New Zealand dollars shall be Sydney and Auckland, respectively), (ii) in relation to any sum payable in euro, a day on which the TARGET2 System is open, (iii) in relation to any sum payable in Renminbi, a day (other than a Saturday, Sunday or public holiday) on which commercial banks in Hong Kong are generally open for business and settlement of Renminbi payments in Hong Kong or (iv) in relation to any sum payable in a currency and/or one or more Business Centres specified hereon, a day (other than a Saturday or a Sunday) on which commercial banks and foreign exchange markets settlement payments in such currency in the Business Centre(s) or, if no currency is indicated, generally in each of the Business Centres.

"Independent Adviser" means an independent financial institution of international repute or other independent financial adviser of recognised standing and with appropriate expertise, in each case appointed by the Issuer at its own expense;

"Margin" has the meaning given in the applicable Pricing Supplement;

"Reference Rate" has the meaning given in the applicable Pricing Supplement;

"Relevant Nominating Body" means, in respect of a reference rate:

(i) the central bank for the currency to which the reference rate relates, or any central bank or other supervisory authority which is responsible for supervising the administrator of the reference rate; or

(ii) any working group or committee sponsored by, chaired or co-chaired by or constituted at the request of (a) the central bank for the currency to which the reference rate relates, (b) any central bank or other supervisory authority which is responsible for supervising the administrator of the reference rate, (c) a group of the aforementioned central banks or other supervisory authorities, or (d) the Financial Stability Board or any part thereof; and

"Successor Rate" means the rate that the Independent Adviser or the Issuer (as applicable) determines is a successor to or replacement of the Reference Rate which is formally recommended by any Relevant Nominating Body.

6.3 Interest on Dual Currency Interest Notes

The rate or amount of interest payable in respect of Dual Currency Interest Notes shall be determined in the manner specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement.

6.4 Interest on Partly Paid Notes

In the case of Partly Paid Notes (other than Partly Paid Notes which are Zero Coupon Notes), interest will accrue as aforesaid on the paid-up nominal amount of such Notes and otherwise as specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement.

6.5 Accrual of interest

Each interest-bearing Note (or in the case of the redemption of part only of a Note, that part only of such Note) will cease to bear interest (if any) from the date for its redemption unless, upon due presentation thereof, payment of principal is improperly withheld or refused. In such event, interest will continue to accrue until whichever is the earlier of:

- (a) the date on which all amounts due in respect of such Note have been paid; and
- (b) five days after the date on which the full amount of the moneys payable in respect of such Note has been received by the Fiscal Agent and notice to that effect has been given to the Noteholders in accordance with Condition 15.

7 Payments

7.1 Method of payment

Subject as provided below:

- (a) payments in a Specified Currency other than euro and Renminbi will be made by credit or transfer to an account in the relevant Specified Currency maintained by the payee with a bank in the principal financial centre of the country of such Specified Currency (which, if the Specified Currency is Australian dollars or New Zealand dollars, shall be Sydney and Auckland, respectively);
- (b) payments in euro will be made by credit or transfer to a euro account (or any other account to which euro may be credited or transferred) specified by the payee; and
- (c) payments in Renminbi will be made by transfer to a Renminbi account maintained by or on behalf of the Noteholder with a bank in Hong Kong.

Payments will be subject in all cases to (i) any fiscal or other laws and regulations applicable thereto in the place of payment, but without prejudice to the provisions of Condition 9 and (ii) any withholding or deduction required pursuant to an agreement described in Section 1471(b) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code") or otherwise imposed pursuant to Sections 1471 through 1474 of the Code, any regulations or agreements thereunder, any official interpretations thereof, or (without prejudice to the provisions of Condition 9) any law implementing an intergovernmental approach thereto.

7.2 Presentation of Definitive Bearer Notes, Receipts and Coupons

Payments of principal in respect of Definitive Bearer Notes not held through the CMU will (subject as provided below) be made in the manner provided in Condition 7.1 above only against presentation and surrender (or, in the case of part payment of any sum due, endorsement) of Definitive Bearer Notes, and payments of interest in respect of Definitive Bearer Notes will (subject as provided below) be made as aforesaid only against presentation and surrender (or, in the case of part payment of any sum due, endorsement) of Coupons, in each case at the specified office of any Paying Agent outside the United States (which expression, as used herein, means the United States of America (including the States and the District of Columbia and its possessions)).

Payments of instalments of principal (if any) in respect of Definitive Bearer Notes not held through the CMU, other than the final instalment, will (subject as provided below) be made in the manner provided in Condition 7.1 above only against presentation and surrender (or, in the case of part payment of any sum due, endorsement) of the relevant Receipt in accordance with the preceding paragraph. Payment of the final instalment will be made in the manner provided in Condition 7.1 above only against presentation and surrender (or, in the case of part payment of any sum due, endorsement) of the relevant Definitive Bearer Note in accordance with the preceding paragraph. Each Receipt must be presented for payment of the relevant instalment together with the Definitive Bearer Note to which it appertains. Receipts presented without the Definitive Bearer Note to which they appertain do not constitute valid obligations of the Issuer. Upon the date on which any Definitive Bearer Note becomes due and repayable, unmatured Receipts (if any) relating thereto (whether or not attached) shall become void and no payment shall be made in respect thereof.

Fixed Rate Notes in definitive bearer form not held through the CMU (other than Dual Currency Notes, Index Linked Notes or Long Maturity Notes (as defined below)) should be presented for payment together with all unmatured Coupons appertaining thereto (which expression shall for this purpose include Coupons falling to be issued on exchange of matured Talons), failing which the amount of any missing unmatured Coupon (or, in the case of payment not being made in full, the same proportion of the amount of such missing unmatured Coupon as the sum so paid bears to the sum due) will be deducted from the sum due for payment. Each amount of principal so deducted will be paid in the manner mentioned above against surrender of the relative missing Coupon at any time before the expiry of 10 years after the Relevant Date (as defined in Condition 9) in respect of such principal (whether or not such Coupon would otherwise have become void under Condition 10) or, if later, five years from the date on which such Coupon would otherwise have become due, but in no event thereafter.

Upon any Fixed Rate Note in definitive bearer form becoming due and repayable prior to its Maturity Date, all unmatured Talons (if any) appertaining thereto will become void and no further Coupons will be issued in respect thereof.

Upon the date on which any Floating Rate Note, Dual Currency Note, Index Linked Note or Long Maturity Note in definitive bearer form not held through the CMU becomes due and repayable, unmatured Coupons and Talons (if any) relating thereto (whether or not attached) shall become void and no payment or, as the case may be, exchange for further Coupons shall be made in respect thereof. A "Long Maturity Note" is a Fixed Rate Note (other than a Fixed Rate Note which on issue had a Talon attached) whose nominal amount on issue is less than the aggregate interest payable thereon provided that such Note shall cease to be a Long Maturity Note on the Interest Payment Date on which the aggregate amount of interest remaining to be paid after that date is less than the nominal amount of such Note.

In the case of Definitive Bearer Notes held through the CMU, payment will be made at the direction of the bearer to the CMU Accountholders and such payment shall discharge the obligations of the Issuer or, as the case may be, the Guarantor in respect of that payment.

If the due date for redemption of any Definitive Bearer Note is not an Interest Payment Date, interest (if any) accrued in respect of such Note from (and including) the preceding Interest Payment Date or, as the case may be, the Interest Commencement Date shall be payable only against surrender of the relevant Definitive Bearer Note.

7.3 Payments in respect of Bearer Global Notes

Payments of principal and interest (if any) in respect of any Bearer Global Note will (subject as provided below) be made in the manner specified above in relation to Definitive Bearer Notes or otherwise in the manner specified in the relevant Bearer Global Note (i) in the case of a Bearer Global Note held in the CMU, to the person(s) for whose account(s) interests in the relevant Bearer Note are credited as being held with the CMU in accordance with the CMU Rules (as defined in the Agency Agreement) at the relevant time, or (ii) in the case of a Bearer Global Note not lodged with the CMU, against presentation or surrender, as the case may be, of such Bearer Global Note at the specified office of any Paying Agent outside the United States. A record of each payment, distinguishing between any payment of principal and any payment of interest, will be made on such Bearer Global Note (in the case of a Bearer Global Note not lodged with the CMU) against presentation by the Paying Agent to which it was presented or (in the case of a Bearer Global Note lodged with the CMU) on withdrawal of such Bearer Global Note by the CMU Lodging Agent, and in each such case, such record shall be prima facie evidence that the payment in question has been made.

7.4 Payments in respect of Definitive Registered Notes and Registered Global Notes

Payments of principal (other than instalments of principal prior to the final instalment) in respect of each Definitive Registered Note and each Registered Global Note will be made against presentation and surrender (or, in the case of part payment of any sum due, endorsement) of the Definitive Registered Note or Registered Global Note at the specified office of the Paying Agents. Such payments will be made by transfer to the Designated Account (as defined below) of the holder (or the first named of joint holders) of the Registered Note appearing in the register of holders of the Registered Notes maintained by the Registrar (the "Register") (i) where in global form, at the close of the business day (being for this purpose, in respect of Notes clearing through Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg, a day on which Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg are open for business. and in respect of Notes clearing through the CMU, a day on which the CMU is open for business) before the relevant due date, and (ii) where in definitive form, at the close of business on the third business day (being for this purpose a day on which banks are open for business in the city where the specified office of the Registrar is located) before the relevant due date. For these purposes, "Designated Account" means the account (which, in the case of a payment in Japanese yen to a non-resident of Japan, shall be a non-resident account and, in the case of a payment in Renminbi, means the Renminbi account maintained by or on behalf of the Noteholder with a bank in Hong Kong, details of which appear on the Register at the close of business on the fifth business day before the due date for payment) maintained by a holder with a Designated Bank and identified as such in the Register and "Designated Bank" means (in the case of payment in a Specified Currency other than euro and Renminbi) a bank in the principal financial centre of the country of such Specified Currency (which, if the Specified Currency is Australian dollars or New Zealand dollars, shall be Sydney or Auckland, respectively) and (in the case of a payment in euro) any bank which processes payments in euro and (in the case of a payment in Renminbi) a bank in Hong Kong.

Payments of interest and payments of instalments of principal (other than the final instalment) in respect of each Definitive Registered Note and each Registered Global Note will be made by transfer on the due date to the Designated Account of the holder (or the first named of joint holders) of the Registered Note appearing in the Register (i) where in global form, at the close of the business day (being for this purpose, in respect of Notes clearing through Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg, a day on which Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg are open for business, and in respect of Notes clearing through the CMU, a day on which the CMU is open for business) before the relevant due date, and (ii) where in definitive form, at the close of business on the fifth day (in the case of Renminbi) and the fifteenth day (in the case of a currency other than Renminbi, whether or not such fifteenth

day is a business day) before the relevant due date (the "Record Date"). Payment of the interest due in respect of each Registered Note on redemption and the final instalment of principal will be made in the same manner as payment of the principal amount of such Registered Note.

No commissions or expenses shall be charged to such holders by the Registrar in respect of any payments of principal or interest in respect of the Registered Notes.

In the case of Definitive Registered Note or Registered Global Note held in the CMU, payment will be made to the person(s) for whose account(s) interests in the relevant Definitive Registered Note or Registered Global Note are credited as being held with the CMU in accordance with the CMU Rules at the relevant time.

None of the Issuer, the Guarantor or the Agents will have any responsibility or liability for any aspect of the records relating to, or payments made on account of, beneficial ownership interests in the Registered Global Notes or for maintaining, supervising or reviewing any records relating to such beneficial ownership interests.

7.5 General provisions applicable to payments

The holder of a Global Note (if the Global Note is not lodged with the CMU) or the CMU Accountholder at the direction of the holder of a Global Note (if the Global Note is lodged with the CMU) shall be the only person(s) entitled to receive payments in respect of Notes represented by such Global Note and the Issuer or, as the case may be, the Guarantor will be discharged by payment to, or to the order of, the holder of such Global Note or such CMU Accountholder (as the case may be) in respect of each amount so paid. Each of the persons shown in the records of Euroclear or Clearstream, Luxembourg as the beneficial holder of a particular nominal amount of Notes represented by such Global Note must look solely to Euroclear or Clearstream, Luxembourg, as the case may be, for his share of each payment so made by the Issuer or, as the case may be, the Guarantor to, or to the order of, the holder of such Global Note.

Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Condition, if any amount of principal and/or interest in respect of Bearer Notes is payable in U.S. dollars, such U.S. dollar payments of principal and/or interest in respect of such Notes will be made at the specified office of a Paying Agent in the United States if:

- (a) the Issuer has appointed Paying Agents with specified offices outside the United States with the reasonable expectation that such Paying Agents would be able to make payment in U.S. dollars at such specified offices outside the United States of the full amount of principal and interest on the Bearer Notes in the manner provided above when due;
- (b) payment of the full amount of such principal and interest at all such specified offices outside the United States is illegal or effectively precluded by exchange controls or other similar restrictions on the full payment or receipt of principal and interest in U.S. dollars; and
- (c) such payment is then permitted under United States law without involving, in the opinion of the Issuer and the Guarantor, adverse tax consequences to the Issuer or the Guarantor.

7.6 Payment Day

If the date for payment of any amount in respect of any Note, Receipt or Coupon is not a Payment Day (as defined below), the holder thereof shall not be entitled to payment until the next following Payment Day in the relevant place and shall not be entitled to further interest or other payment in respect of such delay. For these purposes, "Payment Day" means any day which (subject to Condition 10) is:

- (a) a day on which commercial banks and foreign exchange markets settle payments and are open for general business (including dealing in foreign exchange and foreign currency deposits):
 - (i) in the case of Notes in definitive form only, the relevant place of presentation;
 - (ii) Hong Kong;
 - (iii) in each Additional Financial Centre (other than TARGET2 System) specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement;
- (b) if TARGET2 System is specified as an Additional Financial Centre in the applicable Pricing Supplement, a day on which the TARGET2 System is open; and
- (c) either (A) in relation to any sum payable in a Specified Currency other than euro and Renminbi, a day on which commercial banks and foreign exchange markets settle payments and are open for general business (including dealing in foreign exchange and foreign currency deposits) in the principal financial centre of the country of the relevant Specified Currency (which if the Specified Currency is Australian dollars or New Zealand dollars shall be Sydney and Auckland, respectively), (B) in relation to any sum payable in euro, a day on which the TARGET2 System is open or (C) in relation to any sum payable in Renminbi, a day on which banks and foreign exchange markets are open for business and settlement of Renminbi payments in Hong Kong.

7.7 Interpretation of principal and interest

Any reference in these Conditions to principal in respect of the Notes shall be deemed to include, as applicable:

- (a) any additional amounts which may be payable with respect to principal under Condition 9; (b) the Final Redemption Amount of the Notes;
- (b) the Early Redemption Amount of the Notes;
- (c) the Optional Redemption Amount(s) (if any) of the Notes;
- (d) in relation to Notes redeemable in instalments, the Instalment Amounts;
- (e) in relation to Zero Coupon Notes, the Amortised Face Amount (as defined in Condition 8.7); and
- (f) any premium and any other amounts (other than interest) which may be payable by the Issuer under or in respect of the Notes.

Any reference in these Conditions to interest in respect of the Notes shall be deemed to include, as applicable, any additional amounts which may be payable with respect to interest under Condition 9.

8 Redemption and Purchase

8.1 Redemption at maturity

Unless previously redeemed or purchased and cancelled as specified below, each Note (including each Index Linked Redemption Note and Dual Currency Redemption Note) will be redeemed by the Issuer at its Final Redemption Amount specified in, or determined in the manner specified in, the applicable Pricing Supplement in the relevant Specified Currency on the Maturity Date.

8.2 Redemption for tax reasons

The Notes may be redeemed at the option of the Issuer in whole, but not in part, at any time (if this Note is neither a Floating Rate Note, an Index Linked Interest Note nor a Dual Currency Interest Note) or on any Interest Payment Date (if this Note is either a Floating Rate Note, an Index Linked Interest Note or a Dual Currency Interest Note), on giving not less than 30 nor more than 60 days' notice to the Fiscal Agent and, in accordance with Condition 15, the Noteholders (which notice shall be irrevocable), if:

- (a) on the occasion of the next payment due under the Notes, the Issuer has or will become obliged to pay Additional Amounts as provided or referred to in Condition 9 or the Guarantor would be unable for reasons outside its control to procure payment by the Issuer and in making payment itself would be required to pay such Additional Amounts, in each case as a result of any change in, or amendment to, the laws or regulations of a Tax Jurisdiction (as defined in Condition 9) or any change in the application or official interpretation of such laws or regulations, which change or amendment becomes effective on or after the date on which agreement is reached to issue the first Tranche of the Notes; and
- (b) such obligation cannot be avoided by the Issuer or, as the case may be, the Guarantor taking reasonable measures available to it,

provided that no such notice of redemption shall be given earlier than 90 days prior to the earliest date on which the Issuer or, as the case may be, the Guarantor would be obliged to pay such additional amounts or give effect to such treatment, as the case may be, were a payment in respect of the Notes then due.

Prior to giving any notice of redemption pursuant to this Condition, the Issuer shall deliver to the Fiscal Agent a certificate signed by two Directors of the Issuer or, as the case may be, two Directors of the Guarantor stating that the Issuer is entitled to effect such redemption and setting forth a statement of facts showing that the conditions precedent to the right of the Issuer so to redeem have occurred. The Fiscal Agent shall be entitled to accept and rely upon such certificate (without further investigation or enquiry) as sufficient evidence of the satisfaction of the conditions precedent set out in this Condition 8.2, in which event they shall be conclusive and binding on the Noteholders.

Notes redeemed pursuant to this Condition 8.2 will be redeemed at their Early Redemption Amount referred to in Condition 8.7 below together (if appropriate) with interest accrued to (but excluding) the date of redemption.

8.3 Redemption at the option of the Issuer (Issuer Call)

If Issuer Call is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, the Issuer may, having given:

- (a) not less than 15 nor more than 30 days' notice to the Noteholders in accordance with Condition 15; and
- (b) not less than 15 days before the giving of the notice referred to in (a) above, notice to the Fiscal Agent and, in the case of a redemption of Registered Notes, the Registrar;

(which notices shall be irrevocable and shall specify the date fixed for redemption), redeem all or some only of the Notes then outstanding on any Optional Redemption Date and at the Optional Redemption Amount(s) specified in, or determined in the manner specified in, the applicable Pricing Supplement together, if appropriate, with interest accrued to (but excluding) the relevant Optional Redemption Date. Any such redemption must be of a nominal amount not less than the Minimum Redemption Amount and not more than the Maximum Redemption Amount, in each case as may be specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement. In the case of a partial redemption of Notes, the Notes to be redeemed ("Redeemed Notes") will be selected individually by lot, in the case of Redeemed Notes represented by definitive Notes, and in accordance with the rules of Euroclear and/or Clearstream, Luxembourg (to be reflected in the records of Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg as either a pool factor or a reduction in nominal amount, at their discretion) and/or the CMU (as appropriate), in the case of Redeemed Notes represented by a Global Note, not more than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption (such date of selection being hereinafter called the "Selection Date"). In the case of Redeemed Notes represented by definitive Notes, a list of the serial numbers of such Redeemed Notes will be published in accordance with Condition 15 not less than 15 days prior to the date fixed for redemption. The aggregate nominal amount of Redeemed Notes represented by definitive Notes or represented by a Global Note shall in each case bear the same proportion to the aggregate nominal amount of all Redeemed Notes as the aggregate nominal amount of definitive Notes outstanding and Notes outstanding represented by such Global Note, respectively, bears to the aggregate nominal amount of the Notes outstanding, in each case on the Selection Date, provided that, if necessary, appropriate adjustments shall be made to such nominal amounts to ensure that each represents an integral multiple of the Calculation Amount. No exchange of the relevant Global Note will be permitted during the period from (and including) the Selection Date to (and including) the date fixed for redemption pursuant to this Condition 8.3 and notice to that effect shall be given by the Issuer to the Noteholders in accordance with Condition 15 at least five days prior to the Selection Date.

8.4 Redemption at the option of the Noteholders (Investor Put)

If Investor Put is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, upon the holder of any Note giving to the Issuer, in accordance with Condition 15, not less than 15 nor more than 30 days' notice (or such other notice period as is specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement) (which notice shall be irrevocable save as provided in Condition 8.6), the Issuer will, upon the expiry of such notice, redeem subject to, and in accordance with, the terms specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement such Note on the Optional Redemption Date and at the relevant Optional Redemption Amount as specified in, or determined in the manner specified in, the applicable Pricing Supplement, together, if applicable, with interest accrued to (but excluding) the relevant Optional Redemption Date. Registered Notes may be redeemed under this Condition 8.4 in any multiple of their lowest Specified Denomination. It may be that before an Investor Put can be exercised, certain conditions and/or circumstances will need to be satisfied. Where relevant, the provisions will be set out in the applicable Pricing Supplement. Such option shall operate as set out below in Condition 8.6.

8.5 Redemption for Put Event

Upon the occurrence of a Put Event (as defined below), the holder of each Note will have the right, at such holder's option, exercisable during the Change of Control Put Period (as defined below) by giving to the Issuer a notice (which notice shall be irrevocable save as provided in Condition 8.6) to require the Issuer to redeem all, but not some only, of such holder's Notes on the Put Date (as defined below) at the Early Redemption Amount, together with accrued interest up to but excluding the Put Date. Such option shall operate as set out below and in Condition 8.6.

The Issuer shall give notice to Noteholders and the Fiscal Agent in accordance with Condition 15 by not later than 14 days following the first day on which it becomes aware of the occurrence of a Put Event, which notice shall specify the procedure for exercise by holders of their rights to require redemption of the Notes pursuant to this Condition 8.5 (a "Put Event Notice").

For the purposes of this Condition 8.5:

- a "Change of Control" occurs when:
- (i) any Person or Persons acting together acquires Control of the Guarantor if such Person or Persons does not or do not have, and would not be deemed to have, Control of the Guarantor on the date of issue of the Notes;
- (ii) the Guarantor consolidates with or merges into or sells or transfers all or substantially all of its assets to any other Person, unless the consolidation, merger, sale or transfer will not result in the other Person or Persons acquiring Control over the Guarantor or the successor entity; or
- (iii) one or more other Persons acquires the legal or beneficial ownership of all or substantially all of the Guarantor's issued share capital;

"Change of Control Put Period" means a period of 60 days following a Put Event, or, if a Put Event Notice is given, a period of 60 days following the date upon which such notice is given;

"Control" means the ownership or control of more than 50 per cent. of the voting rights of the issued share capital of the Guarantor or the right to appoint and/or remove all or the majority of the members of the Guarantor's board of directors or other governing body, whether obtained directly or indirectly, and whether obtained by ownership of share capital, the possession of voting rights, contract or otherwise;

"Put Date" means the fourteenth day after the expiry of the Change of Control Put Period; "Put Event" will be deemed to occur if:

- (i) there is a Change of Control; and
- (ii) at the time of the occurrence of a Change of Control, the Notes carry an investment grade credit rating (in these Conditions meaning Baa3/BBB-, or equivalent, or better), from any two Rating Agencies and such rating from any one of such Rating Agencies is, within a period ending 120 days after the date notice of the Change of Control first becoming public (which period shall be extended so long as the Notes are under consideration (as publicly announced within such 120 day period) for rating review), either downgraded to a non-investment grade credit rating (in these Conditions meaning Ba1/BB+, or equivalent, or worse) or withdrawn,

provided that (aa) if at the time of the occurrence of the Change of Control the Notes carry either a non-investment grade credit rating from either of such Rating Agencies then assigning a credit rating to the Notes or no credit rating from any one of such Rating Agencies, a Put Event will be deemed to occur upon the occurrence of a Change of Control alone; and (bb) if at the time of the occurrence of the Change of Control the Notes carry a rating from more than two Rating Agencies, at least two of which are investment grade, then paragraph (ii) above will apply;

a "Person", as used in this Condition 8.5, includes any individual, company, corporation, firm, partnership, joint venture, undertaking, association, organisation, trust, state or agency of state (in each case whether or not being a separate legal entity) but does not include the Guarantor's wholly owned direct or indirect Subsidiaries; and

"Rating Agency" means Moody's Investors Service, Inc. ("Moody's") or Standard & Poor's Rating Services, a division of The McGraw-Hill Companies, Inc. ("S&P") or any other reputable credit rating agency of international standing, appointed by the Issuer and the Guarantor and includes the respective successors and assigns of such Rating Agency.

8.6 Put Notices

To exercise the right to require redemption of this Note pursuant to Condition 8.4 or 8.5, the holder of this Note must, if this Note is in definitive form and held outside Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and the CMU, deliver at the specified office of any Paying Agent (in the case of Bearer Notes) or the Registrar (in the case of Registered Notes), at any time during the normal business hours of such Paying Agent or, as the case may be, the Registrar on any Business Day (as defined in Condition 6) falling within the notice period (in the case of Condition 8.4) or Change of Control Put Period (in the case of Condition 8.5), a duly signed and completed notice of exercise in the form (for the time being current) obtainable from any specified office of any Paying Agent or, as the case may be, the Registrar (a "Put Notice") and in which the holder must specify a bank account to which payment is to be made under this Condition and, in the case of Registered Notes, the nominal amount thereof to be redeemed and, if less than the full nominal amount of the Registered Notes so surrendered is to be redeemed, an address to which a new Registered Note in respect of the balance of such Registered Notes is to be sent subject to and in accordance with the provisions of Condition 2.2. If this Note is in definitive bearer form, the Put Notice must be accompanied by this Note or evidence satisfactory to the Paying Agent concerned that this Note will, following delivery of the Put Notice, be held to its order or under its control.

If this Note is represented by a Global Note or is in definitive form and held through Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg or the CMU, to exercise the right to require redemption of this Note pursuant to Condition 8.4 or 8.5, the holder of this Note must, within the notice period (in the case of Condition 8.4) or Change of Control Put Period (in the case of Condition 8.5), give notice to the Fiscal Agent (in the case of Bearer Notes) or the Registrar (in the case of Registered Notes) of such exercise in accordance with the standard procedures of Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and the CMU (which may include notice being given on his instruction by Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg or any common depositary, as the case may be, for them to the Fiscal Agent (in the case of Bearer Notes) or the Registrar (in the case of Registered Notes) by electronic means or notice being given to the CMU Lodging Agent) in a form acceptable to Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg, the CMU and the CMU Lodging Agent from time to time.

Any Put Notice or other notice given in accordance with this Condition 8.6 and the standard procedures of Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and the CMU given by a holder of any Note pursuant to Condition 8.4 or 8.5 shall be irrevocable except where, prior to the due date of redemption, an Event of Default has occurred and is continuing, in which event such holder, at its option, may elect by notice to the Issuer to withdraw the notice given pursuant to Condition 8.4 or 8.5.

8.7 Early Redemption Amounts

For the purpose of Condition 8.2 and Condition 8.5 above and Condition 11, each Note will be redeemed at its Early Redemption Amount calculated as follows:

- (a) in the case of a Note (other than a Zero Coupon Note, an Instalment Note and a Partly Paid Note) with a Final Redemption Amount equal to the Issue Price, at the Final Redemption Amount thereof;
- (b) in the case of a Note (other than a Zero Coupon Note but including an Instalment Note and a Partly Paid Note) with a Final Redemption Amount which is or may be less or greater than the Issue Price or which is payable in a Specified Currency other than that in which the Note is denominated, at the amount specified in, or determined in the manner specified in, the applicable Pricing Supplement or, if no such amount or manner is so specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement, at its nominal amount; or

(c) in the case of a Zero Coupon Note, at an amount (the "Amortised Face Amount") calculated in accordance with the following formula:

Early Redemption Amount = RP x $(1 + AY)^y$ where:

"RP" means the Reference Price;

"AY" means the Accrual Yield expressed as a decimal; and

"y" is the Day Count Fraction specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement which will be either (i) 30/360 (in which case the numerator will be equal to the number of days (calculated on the basis of a 360-day year consisting of 12 months of 30 days each) from (and including) the Issue Date of the first Tranche of the Notes to (but excluding) the date fixed for redemption or (as the case may be) the date upon which such Note becomes due and repayable and the denominator will be 360) or (ii) Actual/360 (in which case the numerator will be equal to the actual number of days from (and including) the Issue Date of the first Tranche of the Notes to (but excluding) the date fixed for redemption or (as the case may be) the date upon which such Note becomes due and repayable and the denominator will be 360) or (iii) Actual/365 (in which case the numerator will be equal to the actual number of days from (and including) the Issue Date of the first Tranche of the Notes to (but excluding) the date fixed for redemption or (as the case may be) the date upon which such Note becomes due and repayable and the denominator will be 365).

8.8 Instalments

Instalment Notes will be redeemed in the Instalment Amounts and on the Instalment Dates. In the case of early redemption, the Early Redemption Amount will be determined pursuant to Condition 8.7.

8.9 Partly Paid Notes

Partly Paid Notes will be redeemed, whether at maturity, early redemption or otherwise, in accordance with the provisions of this Condition and the applicable Pricing Supplement.

8.10 Purchases

The Issuer, the Guarantor or any Subsidiaries of the Issuer or the Guarantor may at any time purchase Notes (provided that, in the case of Definitive Bearer Notes, all unmatured Receipts, Coupons and Talons appertaining thereto are purchased therewith) at any price in the open market or otherwise. All Notes so purchased will be surrendered to any Paying Agent and/or the Registrar for cancellation.

8.11 Cancellation

All Notes which are redeemed will forthwith be cancelled (together with all unmatured Receipts, Coupons and Talons attached thereto or surrendered therewith at the time of redemption). All Notes so cancelled and the Notes purchased and cancelled pursuant to Condition 8.10 above (together with all unmatured Receipts, Coupons and Talons cancelled therewith) shall be forwarded to the Fiscal Agent and cannot be reissued or resold.

8.12 Late payment on Zero Coupon Notes

If the amount payable in respect of any Zero Coupon Note upon redemption of such Zero Coupon Note pursuant to Condition 8.1, 8.2, 8.3, 8.4 or 8.5 above or upon its becoming due and repayable as provided in Condition 11 is improperly withheld or refused, the amount due and repayable in respect of such Zero Coupon Note shall be the amount calculated as provided in Condition 8.7(c) above as though the references therein to the date fixed for the redemption or the date upon which such Zero Coupon Note becomes due and payable were replaced by references to the date which is the earlier of:

- (a) the date on which all amounts due in respect of such Zero Coupon Note have been paid; and
- (b) five days after the date on which the full amount of the moneys payable in respect of such Zero Coupon Notes has been received by the Fiscal Agent or the Registrar and notice to that effect has been given to the Noteholders in accordance with Condition 15.

9 Taxation

All payments of principal, premium and interest by or on behalf of the Issuer or the Guarantor in respect of the Notes, Receipts and Coupons or under the Guarantee shall be made without withholding or deduction for, or on account of, any present or future taxes, duties, assessments or governmental charges of whatever nature ("Taxes") imposed or levied by or on behalf of any Tax Jurisdiction, unless the withholding or deduction of the Taxes is required by law. In that event, the Issuer or, as the case may be, the Guarantor will pay such additional amounts ("Additional Amounts") as shall be necessary in order that the net amounts received by the holders of the Notes, Receipts or Coupons after such withholding or deduction shall equal the respective amounts of principal and interest which would otherwise have been receivable in respect of the Notes, Receipts or Coupons, as the case may be, in the absence of the withholding or deduction; except that no such Additional Amounts shall be payable with respect to any Note, Receipt or Coupon:

- (a) presented for payment by or on behalf of, a holder who is liable to the Taxes in respect of such Note, Receipt or Coupon by reason of his having some connection with Hong Kong other than the mere holding of such Note, Receipt or Coupon; or
- (b) presented for payment more than 30 days after the Relevant Date except to the extent that a holder would have been entitled to additional amounts on presenting the same for payment on the last day of the period of 30 days assuming that day to have been a Payment Day (as defined in Condition 7.6).

As used in these Conditions:

- (i) "Tax Jurisdiction" means Hong Kong or any political subdivision or any authority thereof or therein having power to tax; and
- (ii) "Relevant Date" means the date on which the payment first becomes due, except that, if the full amount of the money payable has not been duly received by the Fiscal Agent, as the case may be, on or before the due date, it means the date on which, the full amount of the money having been so received, notice to that effect is duly given to the Noteholders by the Issuer in accordance with Condition 15.

10 Prescription

The Notes (whether in bearer or registered form), Receipts and Coupons will become void unless presented for payment within a period of 10 years (in the case of principal) and five years (in the case of interest) after the Relevant Date (as defined in Condition 9) therefor.

There shall not be included in any Coupon sheet issued on exchange of a Talon any Coupon the claim for payment in respect of which would be void pursuant to this Condition or Condition 7.2 or any Talon which would be void pursuant to Condition 7.2.

11 Events of Default

If any one or more of the following events (each an "Event of Default") shall occur:

- (a) **Payment default:** the Issuer fails to pay the principal within seven days after the due date for such payment or any interest within 14 days after the due date for such payment on any Note when due;
- (b) Other defaults: the Issuer or the Guarantor does not perform or comply with one or more of its other obligations in the Notes or under the Guarantee, which default is incapable of remedy or is not remedied within 30 days after written notice specifying such default, requiring it to be remedied and stating that such notice is a notice of default under the Notes and shall have been given to the Fiscal Agent at its specified office by Noteholders representing at least 5 per cent. of the aggregate outstanding principal amount of the Notes;
- (c) Insolvency: the Issuer or the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary is (or is, or could be deemed by law or a court to be) insolvent or bankrupt or is unable to pay its debts, stops, suspends or threatens to stop or suspend payment of all or a material part of (or of a particular type of) its debts, proposes or makes any agreement for the deferral, rescheduling or other readjustment of all of (or all of a particular type of) its debts (or of any part which it will or might otherwise be unable to pay when due), proposes or makes a general assignment or an arrangement or composition with or for the benefit of the relevant creditors in respect of any of such debts or a moratorium is agreed or declared in respect of or affecting all or any part of (or of a particular type of) the debts of the Issuer or the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary;
- (d) Cross-default: (i) any other present or future indebtedness of the Issuer or the Guarantor or any of their respective Subsidiaries for or in respect of moneys borrowed or raised becomes (or becomes capable of being declared) due and payable prior to its stated maturity by reason of any actual or potential default, event of default or the like (howsoever described), or (ii) any such indebtedness is not paid when due or, as the case may be, within any originally applicable grace period, or (iii) the Issuer, the Guarantor or any of their respective Subsidiaries fails to pay when due any amount payable by it under any present or future guarantee for, or indemnity in respect of, any moneys borrowed or raised, provided that the aggregate amount of the relevant indebtedness, guarantees and indemnities in respect of which one or more of the events mentioned above in this paragraph (d) have occurred equals or exceeds U.S.\$30,000,000 or its equivalent in any other currency (on the basis of the middle spot rate for the relevant currency against the U.S. dollar as quoted by any leading bank on the day on which this paragraph operates) on the day on which such indebtedness becomes due and payable or is not paid or any such amount becomes due and payable or is not paid under any such guarantee or indemnity;
- (e) **Enforcement proceedings:** a distress, attachment, execution or other legal process is levied, enforced or sued out on or against any material part of the property, assets or turnover of the Issuer, the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary and is not discharged or stayed within 30 days (or such longer period as an Extraordinary Resolution of the Noteholders may permit);
- (f) Winding-up: an order is made or an effective resolution passed for the winding-up or dissolution or administration of the Issuer or the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary (except for a members' voluntary solvent winding up of a Material Subsidiary), or the Issuer, the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary ceases or threatens to cease to carry on all or substantially all of its business or operations, except for the purpose of, and followed by, a reconstruction, amalgamation, reorganisation, merger or consolidation (i) on terms approved by an Extraordinary Resolution of the Noteholders, or (ii) in the case of a Material Subsidiary, whereby the undertaking and assets of such Material Subsidiary are transferred to or otherwise vested in the Guarantor or another Material Subsidiary;

- (g) **Security enforced:** an encumbrancer takes possession or an administrative or other receiver or an administrator is appointed of the whole or any material part of the property, assets or turnover of the Issuer or the Guarantor or any Material Subsidiary (as the case may be) and is not discharged within 30 days;
- (h) Consent and authorisations: any action, condition or thing (including the obtaining or effecting of any necessary consent, approval, authorisation, exemption, filing, license, order, recording or registration) at any time required to be taken, fulfilled or done in order (i) to enable the Issuer and the Guarantor lawfully to enter into, exercise their respective rights and perform and comply with their respective obligations under the Notes, (ii) to ensure that those obligations are legally binding and enforceable, and (iii) to make the Notes admissible in evidence in the courts of Hong Kong is not taken, fulfilled or done;
- (i) **Guarantees:** any of the Guarantees is not (or is claimed by the Guarantor not to be) in full force and effect:
- (j) Ownership: the Issuer ceases to be wholly owned and controlled by the Guarantor; or
- (k) Analogous events: any event occurs which, under the laws of any relevant jurisdiction, has an analogous effect to any of the events referred to in any of the foregoing paragraphs,

then any Note may, by notice in writing given to the Fiscal Agent at its specified office by Noteholders representing at least 5 per cent. of the aggregate outstanding principal amount of the Notes, be declared immediately due and payable whereupon it shall become immediately due and payable at its Early Redemption Amount together with accrued interest (if any) to the date of repayment, without further formality.

12 Replacement of Notes, Receipts, Coupons and Talons

Should any Note, Receipt, Coupon or Talon be lost, stolen, mutilated, defaced or destroyed, it may be replaced at the specified office of the Fiscal Agent or the Paying Agent (in the case of Bearer Notes, Receipts or Coupons) or the Registrar (in the case of Registered Notes) upon payment by the claimant of such costs and expenses as may be incurred in connection therewith and on such terms as to evidence and indemnity as the Issuer, the Fiscal Agent or the Registrar may reasonably require. Mutilated or defaced Notes, Receipts, Coupons or Talons must be surrendered before replacements will be issued.

13 Agents

The names of the initial Agents and their initial specified offices are set out below.

The Issuer is entitled to vary or terminate the appointment of any Agent and/or appoint additional or other Agents and/or approve any change in the specified office through which any Agent acts, provided that:

- (a) there will at all times be a Fiscal Agent and a Registrar; and
- (b) so long as the Notes are listed on any stock exchange or admitted to trading by any other relevant authority, there will at all times be a Paying Agent (in the case of Bearer Notes) and a Registrar and Transfer Agent (in the case of Registered Notes) with a specified office in such place as may be required by the rules and regulations of the relevant stock exchange or other relevant authority.

In addition, the Issuer shall forthwith appoint a Paying Agent having a specified office in New York City in the circumstances described in Condition 7.5. Any variation, termination, appointment or change shall only take effect (other than in the case of insolvency, when it shall be of immediate effect) after not less than 30 nor more than 45 days' prior notice thereof shall have been given to the Noteholders by the Issuer in accordance with Condition 15.

In acting under the Agency Agreement, the Agents act solely as agents of the Issuer and the Guarantor and do not assume any obligation to, or relationship of agency with, any Noteholders, Receiptholders or Couponholders. The Agency Agreement contains provisions permitting any entity into which any Agent is merged or converted or with which it is consolidated or to which it transfers all or substantially all of its assets to become the successor paying agent.

None of the Agents shall be obliged to take any steps to ascertain whether a Change of Control, Potential Event of Default or Event of Default has occurred or whether any other party is complying with its obligations under the Conditions or the Agency Agreement, or to monitor or to investigate the occurrence of any Change of Control, Potential Event of Default or Event of Default or whether any other party is complying with its obligations under the Conditions or the Agency Agreement, and none of the Agents shall be liable to the Noteholders, the Issuer, the Guarantor or any other person for not doing so.

14 Exchange of Talons

On and after the Interest Payment Date on which the final Coupon comprised in any Coupon sheet matures, the Talon (if any) forming part of such Coupon sheet may be surrendered at the specified office of any Paying Agent in exchange for a further Coupon sheet including (if such further Coupon sheet does not include Coupons to (and including) the final date for the payment of interest due in respect of the Note to which it appertains) a further Talon, subject to the provisions of Condition 10.

15 Notices

All notices regarding Bearer Notes will be deemed to be validly given if published in a leading daily newspaper of general circulation in Hong Kong. It is expected that such publication will be made in the South China Morning Post in Hong Kong. The Issuer shall also ensure that notices are duly published in a manner which complies with the rules and regulations of any stock exchange or any other relevant authority on which the Bearer Notes are for the time being listed or by which they have been admitted to trading. Any such notice will be deemed to have been given on the date of the first publication or, where required to be published in more than one newspaper, on the date of the first publication in all required newspapers.

All notices regarding Registered Notes will be deemed to be validly given if (a) sent by first class mail or (if posted to an address overseas) by airmail to the holders (or the first named of joint holders) at their respective addresses recorded in the Register and will be deemed to have been given on the day after mailing and (b) if and for so long as the Registered Notes are listed on a stock exchange or are admitted to trading by another relevant authority and the rules of that stock exchange or relevant authority so require, such notice will be published in a daily newspaper of general circulation in the place or places required by those rules.

Until such time as any definitive Notes are issued, there may, so long as any Global Notes representing the Notes are held in their entirety on behalf of Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and/or the CMU, be substituted for such publication in such newspaper(s) or such mailing, the delivery of the relevant notice to Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and/or the CMU for communication by them to the holders of the Notes and, in addition, for so long as any Notes are listed on a stock exchange or are admitted to trading by another relevant authority and the rules of that stock exchange or relevant authority so require, such notice will be published in a daily newspaper of general circulation in the place or places required by those rules. Any such notice shall be deemed to have been given to the holders of the Notes on the seventh day after the day on which the said notice was given to Euroclear and/or Clearstream, Luxembourg and/or the persons shown in the relevant CMU Issue Position Report.

Notices to be given by any Noteholder shall be in writing and given by lodging the same, together (in the case of any Note in definitive form) with the relative Note or Notes, with the Fiscal Agent (in the case of Bearer Notes) or the Registrar (in the case of Registered Notes). Whilst any of the Notes are represented by a Global Note, such notice may be given by any holder of a Note to the Fiscal Agent or the Registrar through Euroclear and/or Clearstream, Luxembourg, and/or, in the case of Notes lodged with the CMU, by delivery by such holder of such notice to the CMU

Lodging Agent in Hong Kong, as the case may be, in such manner as the Fiscal Agent, the Registrar, the CMU Lodging Agent and Euroclear and/or Clearstream, Luxembourg and/or the CMU, as the case may be, may approve for this purpose.

Receiptholders and Couponholders will be deemed for all purposes to have notice of the contents of any notice given to the Noteholders in accordance with this Condition.

16 Meetings of Noteholders and Modifications

16.1 Meeting of Noteholders

The Agency Agreement contains provisions for convening meetings of the Noteholders to consider any matter affecting their interests, including the sanctioning by Extraordinary Resolution of a modification of the Notes, the Receipts, the Coupons or any of the provisions of the Agency Agreement. Such a meeting may be convened by the Issuer or the Guarantor and shall be convened by the Issuer if required in writing by Noteholders holding not less than 10 per cent. in nominal amount of the Notes for the time being remaining outstanding. The quorum at any such meeting for passing an Extraordinary Resolution is two or more persons present holding Notes or voting certificates or being proxies or representatives and holding or representing more than 50 per cent. in nominal amount of the Notes for the time being outstanding, or at any adjourned meeting two or more persons present holding Notes or voting certificates or being proxies or representatives at the adjourned meeting whatever the nominal amount of the Notes so held or represented will form a quorum, unless the business of such meeting includes consideration of proposals, inter alia, (i) to modify the due date for any payment in respect of the Notes, (ii) to reduce or cancel the principal amount of, or interest on, the Notes, (iii) to change the currency of payment of the Notes, (iv) to modify the provisions concerning the quorum required at any meeting of Noteholders or the majority required to pass an Extraordinary Resolution, or (v) to modify or cancel the Guarantees, in which case the necessary quorum shall be two or more persons holding or representing not less than 66 per cent. in nominal amount of the Notes for the time being outstanding, or at any adjourned such meeting two or more persons holding or representing not less than 33 per cent. in nominal amount of the Notes for the time being outstanding. An Extraordinary Resolution passed at any meeting of the Noteholders shall be binding on all the Noteholders, whether or not they are present at the meeting, and on all Receiptholders and Couponholders. In addition, a resolution in writing signed by or on behalf of Noteholders of not less than 90 per cent. of the aggregate nominal amount outstanding will take effect as if it were a duly passed Extraordinary Resolution. Such a resolution in writing may be contained in one document or several documents in the same form, each signed by or on behalf of one or more Noteholders.

16.2 Modifications

The Fiscal Agent and the Issuer may agree, without the consent of the Noteholders, Receiptholders or Couponholders, to:

- (a) any modification (except such modifications in respect of which an increased quorum is required as mentioned above) of the Notes, the Receipts, the Coupons or the Agency Agreement which is not prejudicial to the interest of the Noteholders; or
- (b) any modification of the Notes, the Receipts, the Coupons or the Agency Agreement which is of a formal, minor or technical nature or is made to correct a manifest or proven error or to comply with mandatory provisions of the law.

Any such modification shall be binding on the Noteholders, the Receiptholders and the Couponholders and any such modification shall be notified to the Noteholders in accordance with Condition 15 as soon as practicable thereafter. Any determination as to prejudice applying to the interests of the Noteholders pursuant to these Conditions shall be made by the Issuer and none of the Agents shall have any responsibility or liability whatsoever with respect to such determination.

17 Substitution

On or immediately following the effective date of any Group Reorganisation, the Guarantor may, without the consent of the Noteholders, Receiptholders or Couponholders, substitute in its place as guarantor under the Guarantee of the Substitute (as defined below), provided that (i) no payment in respect of the Notes or the Guarantees is at the relevant time overdue, (ii) no event specified in Condition 11 has occurred, and (iii) confirmation from each Rating Agency, then assigning a credit rating to the Notes, is given in writing to the Guarantor and notified to the Noteholders in accordance with Condition 15 that such credit rating will not be downgraded or withdrawn by reason of such substitution. The substitution shall be made by a deed poll (the "Deed Poll"), to be substantially in the form exhibited to the Agency Agreement, and may take place only if (aa) the Substitute shall, by means of the Deed Poll, agree to indemnify each Noteholder against any tax, duty, assessment or governmental charge which is imposed on it by (or by any authority in or of) the jurisdiction of the country of the Substitute's residence for tax purposes and, if different, of its incorporation with respect to any Note and which would not have been so imposed had the substitution not been made, as well as against any tax, duty, assessment or governmental charge, and any cost or expense, relating to the substitution, (bb) where, at the time of the substitution, the Notes carry no rating from any Rating Agency, the obligations of the Substitute under the Deed Poll and the Guarantees shall be unconditionally guaranteed by the Guarantor by means of the Deed Poll, (cc) all action, conditions and things required to be taken, fulfilled and done (including the obtaining of any necessary consents) to ensure that the Deed Poll and the Guarantees represent valid, legally binding and enforceable obligations of the Substitute and, in the case of the Deed Poll of the Guarantor, have been taken, fulfilled and done and are in full force and effect, (dd) the Substitute shall have become party to the Agency Agreement, with any appropriate consequential amendments, as if it had been an original party to it, (ee) legal opinions addressed to the Noteholders shall have been delivered to them (care of the Fiscal Agent) from independent legal advisers with a leading securities practice in each jurisdiction referred to in (aa) above and in England that the Deed Poll is legal, valid, binding and enforceable, that each of the Issuer, the Guarantor and the Substitute have obtained all necessary approvals, authorisations and consents to perform its obligations under the Deed Poll and that each of the Issuer, the Guarantor and the Substitute is duly incorporated and has the corporate capacity and due authority to enter into the Deed Poll, and (ff) the Issuer and/or the Guarantor shall have given at least 30 days' written prior notice of such substitution to the Fiscal Agent and Noteholders, stating that copies, or pending execution the agreed text, of all documents in relation to the substitution which are referred to above, or which might otherwise reasonably be regarded as material to Noteholders, will be available for inspection at the specified office of each of the Paying Agents. References in Condition 11 to obligations under the Guarantees shall be deemed to include obligations under the Deed Poll, and, where the Deed Poll contains a guarantee, the events listed in Condition 11 shall be deemed to include that guarantee not being (or being claimed by the Guarantor not to be) in full force and effect and the provisions of Condition 11(c) to 11(i) inclusive shall be deemed to apply in addition to the Guarantor in its additional capacity.

For the purposes of these Conditions,

"Group Reorganisation" means any reorganisation, restructuring, scheme of arrangement or analogous proceeding (a "Reorganisation") which effects the interposition of a limited liability company (the "Substitute") between the ordinary shareholders of the Guarantor immediately prior to the Reorganisation (the "Existing Shareholders") and the Guarantor provided that:

- (i) only ordinary shares of the Substitute are issued to the Existing Shareholders;
- (ii) immediately after completion of the Reorganisation the only shareholders of the Substitute are the Existing Shareholders or transferees of the Existing Shareholders if such transfers are permitted under the Reorganisation;
- (iii) the Substitute is the only beneficial shareholder of the Guarantor;
- (iv) all Subsidiaries of the Guarantor immediately prior to the Reorganisation (other than the Substitute, if the Substitute is then a Subsidiary of the Guarantor) are Subsidiaries of the Guarantor (or the Substitute) immediately after the Reorganisation; and

(v) the Guarantor (or the Substitute) holds directly or indirectly, the same percentage of the ordinary share capital of those Subsidiaries as was held by the Guarantor immediately prior to the Reorganisation.

18 Further Issues

The Issuer may, from time to time, without the consent of the Noteholders, the Receiptholders or the Couponholders, create and issue further notes having the same terms and conditions as the Notes in all respects (or in all respects except for the first payment of interest on them) and so that such further issue shall be consolidated and form a single series with the Notes. References in these Conditions to the Notes include (unless the context requires otherwise) any other notes issued pursuant to this Condition and forming a single series with the Notes.

19 Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999

No person shall have any right to enforce any term or condition of this Note under the Contracts (Rights of Third Parties) Act 1999, but this does not affect any right or remedy of any person which exists or is available apart from that Act.

20 Governing Law and Submission to Jurisdiction

20.1 Governing law

The Agency Agreement, the Guarantee, the Deed of Covenant, the Notes, the Receipts, the Coupons and the Talons and any non-contractual obligations arising out of or in connection with the Agency Agreement, the Guarantee, the Deed of Covenant, the Notes, the Receipts, the Coupons and the Talons are governed by, and shall be construed in accordance with, English law.

20.2 Submission to Jurisdiction

- (a) Subject to Condition 20.2(c) below, the English courts have exclusive jurisdiction to settle any dispute arising out of or in connection with the Notes, the Receipts and/or the Coupons, including any dispute as to their existence, validity, interpretation, performance, breach or termination or the consequences of their nullity and any dispute relating to any non-contractual obligations arising out of or in connection with the Notes, the Receipts and/or the Coupons (a "Dispute") and accordingly each of the Issuer, the Guarantor and any Noteholders, Receiptholders or Couponholders in relation to any Dispute submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts.
- (b) For the purposes of this Condition 20.2, each of the Issuer and the Guarantor waives any objection to the English courts on the grounds that they are an inconvenient or inappropriate forum to settle any Dispute.
- (c) Notwithstanding Condition 20.2(a) above, to the extent allowed by law, the Noteholders, the Receiptholders and the Couponholders may, in respect of any Dispute or Disputes, take (i) proceedings in any other court with jurisdiction; and (ii) concurrent proceedings in any number of jurisdictions.

20.3 Agent for service of process

Each of the Issuer and the Guarantor irrevocably appoints Elemental Process Agent Limited of 27 Old Gloucester Street, London WC1N 3AX, United Kingdom, as its agent in England to receive service of process in any Proceedings in England. If for any reason the Issuer or the Guarantor, as the case may be, does not have such an agent in England, it will promptly appoint a substitute process agent and notify the Noteholders of such appointment. Nothing herein shall affect the right to serve proceedings in any other manner permitted by law.

USE OF PROCEEDS

The net proceeds from each issue of Notes will be used by the Issuer or HKCG:

- to refinance part of the existing indebtedness of the Group;
- to fund capital expenditures of HKCG or the Group; and/or
- for general corporate purposes.

RISK FACTORS

In addition to other information in this Offering Circular, investors should carefully consider the following risk factors, together with all other information contained in this Offering Circular, before purchasing the Notes. The risks and uncertainties described below may not be the only ones that the Issuer, HKCG or the Group face. Additional risks and uncertainties that the Issuer and HKCG are not aware of or that they currently believe are immaterial may also adversely affect the business, financial condition or results of operations of the Issuer, HKCG or the Group. If any of the possible events described below occurs, the Issuer's, HKCG's or the Group's business, financial condition or results of operations could be materially and adversely affected. In such case, the Issuer or HKCG may not be able to satisfy their obligations under the Notes or the Guarantee (as applicable), and investors could lose all or part of their investment.

Risks Relating to HKCG's Business

Due to the "take-or-pay" nature of HKCG's natural gas purchase contracts for its piped city-gas business, HKCG could be exposed to imbalances between the supply of natural gas by its suppliers and the purchase of gas by its customers.

HKCG's natural gas purchase contracts are "take-or-pay" contracts, pursuant to which it is required to pay for a specified minimum volume of natural gas. In Hong Kong, HKCG has entered into a 25-year natural gas contract with its supplier, Guangdong Dapeng LNG Company Limited ("Guangdong Dapeng"), in which the unit price is subject to a maximum price and a minimum price. See "Description of HKCG – Suppliers and Customers – Suppliers". The "take-or-pay" nature of HKCG's contracts exposes it to imbalances between the purchase of natural gas and the sale of gas. In circumstances where such an imbalance exists, "take-or-pay" provisions could have a material adverse effect on HKCG's financial condition and results of operations.

HKCG relies on a limited number of key suppliers for a significant portion of its supply of natural gas and naphtha in Hong Kong and the PRC. The loss of any of these key suppliers, or a reduction in supply from any of them, could adversely affect HKCG's business and operating results.

For the year ended 31 December 2020, in Hong Kong, HKCG relied on a few suppliers for all of its naphtha supplies and two suppliers for all of its natural gas requirements under term contracts. In the PRC, currently some of HKCG's project companies have not signed long-term supply contracts with upstream suppliers, and as a consequence, HKCG cannot guarantee that these project companies will have stable supplies of natural gas. Compounded with an expected increase in natural gas consumption in the PRC driven by the enforcement of the government's coal-to-gas policy, the lack of stable supply of natural gas may have a material adverse effect on HKCG's financial condition and results of operations. In addition, HKCG's project companies in the PRC rely on a limited number of companies for their natural gas supply and transportation. See "Description of HKCG – Suppliers and Customers – Suppliers". While these suppliers are parties to term contracts, HKCG may be unable to negotiate extensions or replacements of these contracts on favourable terms, if at all. The loss of all or a portion of the volumes of natural gas supplied by these suppliers could also have a material adverse effect on HKCG's financial condition and results of operations.

HKCG relies upon its suppliers to produce, in a timely manner, the quality and volumes of naphtha and natural gas for which they contract with HKCG. In the event that one or more of HKCG's suppliers does not perform in accordance with its contractual obligations, HKCG may be required to seek alternate sources of naphtha and natural gas supply to satisfy its contractual sale obligations. In the event that such supply becomes scarce or the price of raw materials rises significantly, whether as a result of extreme demand, political events, natural disasters or otherwise, HKCG may not be able to satisfy its supply requirements or may be required to pay more to secure incremental naphtha and natural gas supplies, which would have a material adverse effect on its financial condition and results of operations.

If HKCG is unable to renew, extend or replace gas sales contracts with its commercial and industrial customers, if it renews them on less favourable terms, or if it otherwise loses certain key customers, HKCG may suffer a material reduction in its revenues, earnings and cash flows.

HKCG's commercial and industrial customers in Hong Kong and the PRC accounted for approximately 40 per cent. and 76 per cent., respectively, of its total piped city-gas sales by volume in the year ended 31 December 2020. See "Description of HKCG – Suppliers and Customers". Many of HKCG's commercial and industrial gas sales that comprise its revenue are generated under contracts that expire periodically and must be renegotiated and extended or replaced, in some instances on an annual basis. There can be no assurance that HKCG will be able to extend or replace these gas sales contracts for commercial and industrial customers when they expire or that the terms of any renegotiated contracts will be as favourable to HKCG as the existing contracts. If HKCG is unable to renew, extend or replace these contracts or if it renews, extends or replaces them on less favourable terms, HKCG may suffer a material reduction in its revenues, earnings and cash flows, which would adversely affect its financial condition and results of operations.

HKCG's PRC operations rely in part on revenue from gas connection, which may be adversely affected by conditions in the PRC real estate market and fiscal and pricing restrictions introduced by the PRC government.

A substantial proportion of the revenue generated by HKCG's PRC operations is derived from gas connection, which is gas pipeline networks connection under gas connection contracts in order to connect property development projects, commercial or industrial customers to HKCG's gas pipeline networks. Gas connection fees are typically received in stages based on the pipeline construction and will generally achieve a higher gross margin than revenue generated from gas sales.

As a large portion of this gas connection fee income is generated from new residential property development projects, the results of gas connection operations may be affected by the performance of the PRC real estate markets and the general economic conditions in China. In recent years the PRC government and PRC fiscal regulatory bodies have imposed various policies designed to limit or restrict the rate of growth of real estate development in the PRC. While HKCG believes that its geographic coverage, with interests in 282 piped city-gas projects (inclusive of city-gas projects re-invested by the Group's companies) across 23 provinces, autonomous regions and municipalities in the PRC as at 31 December 2020, helps mitigate the risks of adverse property market conditions in individual cities, there can be no assurance that HKCG's PRC operations will not be adversely affected if further property market credit-tightening measures are introduced. In addition, property development projects may be materially and adversely affected by a number of factors, including shortage of equipment or materials, price fluctuations, bad weather, natural disasters, accidents, downturns in the property market, operational conditions and other unforeseeable situations or matters. Should any of these events occur, the completion of the whole or part of the property development project may be postponed and, consequently, the receipt of connection fees may be delayed.

The PRC government, keen to promote consumption of natural gas for environmental reasons, may also seek to regulate, reduce or abolish the one-time gas connection fees charged by the project companies of HKCG. There is no assurance that such regulatory policies will not be extended to all the cities or provinces. On 27 June 2019, the National Development and Reform Commission (the "NDRC"), the Ministry of Housing and Urban-Rural Development and the State Administration for Market Regulation jointly issued the "Guidance to Regulate the Charges of Installation for Urban Gas Projects" (《關於規 範城鎮燃氣工程安裝收費的指導意見》) under which fees charged on installation of urban gas projects will only be levied on assets belonging to users within the building area. For new residential buildings, the installation fee will be included in the housing price instead of charging the users directly and for the installation fees charged for urban gas projects, the ratio of profit to cost shall not exceed 10 per cent. in principle. On 23 December 2020, the General Office of the State Council circulated the "Opinions about Standardizing and Regulating Fees for Water, Electricity, Gas and Heat Supplies in Cities and Towns and Promoting High-quality Development of the Utilities Industry" (《關於清理規範城 鎮供水供電供氣供暖行業收費促進行業高質量發展的意見》) effective from 1 March 2021, which stressed that unreasonable charges in utilities industry must be scrapped, residents should not be asked to pay for the cost of water and gas pipelines outside the residential property project and that construction and installation fees for water and gas pipelines within new commercial housing projects and public housing projects should be covered by property developers, and must not be paid by home

buyers. There is no assurance that HKCG will continue to have the right to charge pipeline connection fees in its existing markets at the levels currently enjoyed by its project companies, or that HKCG will be able to charge similar connection fees in new markets. Any reduction in connection fees will have an adverse impact on HKCG's results of operations and financial condition.

HKCG could be exposed to the credit risk of its customers, and an increase in the non-payment by its customers could affect its business and financial condition.

The risk of non-payment or delayed payment is a major concern in HKCG's business, especially with respect to customers that have high energy consumption or water usage. Although HKCG has the ability to terminate or suspend provision of energy or water to its customers who do not pay, any material increase in non-payment by its customers may materially and adversely affect the operating results, prospects and financial condition of HKCG. Also, for its onshore oilfield project in Thailand, the Group has entered into a sale and purchase agreement with a key customer for the crude oil that the field produces. Depending on the national crude requirement for Thailand, the Group's key customer may adjust its purchase orders and decrease the volume of crude it purchases or it may seek longer creditterms or payment arrangements, which may adversely affect the operating results, prospects and financial condition of HKCG.

HKCG is subject to risks related to non-performance by its suppliers, commercial and industrial customers and other counterparties due to force majeure events.

Substantially all of HKCG's contracts with suppliers, commercial and industrial customers and other counterparties have force majeure provisions that permit such parties to suspend, terminate or otherwise not perform obligations under their contracts with HKCG upon the occurrence of certain events including, but not limited to, strikes and other industrial or labour disturbances, terrorism, restraints of government, civil disturbances, accidents or breakages of machinery or equipment, failure of suppliers, interruptions or delays in transportation, or any natural disaster; all being circumstances not within the control of the party claiming force majeure. A force majeure event under HKCG's long-term natural gas supply contract and term naphtha supply contracts in Hong Kong and term natural gas supply contracts in the PRC includes any act, event or circumstance which merely renders performance uneconomical for either HKCG or its supplier. If one or more of HKCG's commercial and industrial customers, suppliers or other counterparties do not perform under their contracts for any extended period of time, HKCG's results of operations and financial condition could be materially adversely affected.

HKCG faces competition from competing products within the energy industry.

Due to high barriers to entry, HKCG does not currently face any significant direct competition in the provision of piped city-gas in Hong Kong. HKCG does, however, compete against other energy substitutes including coal gas, liquefied petroleum gas ("LPG"), diesel fuel and electricity in Hong Kong and the PRC. Fuel consumers will consider factors such as connection fees, usage charges, energy content, reliability, convenience and safety when choosing a fuel. Most major appliances, such as cooking stoves or hot water heaters, can only run on a single fuel such as gas, LPG, oil products or electricity. There is no assurance that existing end-users will continue to use gas. HKCG's success depends on its ability to compete effectively with the existing and new energy substitutes in Hong Kong and the PRC. Intensified competition among energy sources may result in increased costs and downward pressure on prices, all of which may adversely affect the business and financial condition of HKCG.

There can be no assurance that HKCG will be able to compete successfully against existing and potential energy substitutes or that increased competition within the energy industry will not have an adverse effect on HKCG's business and financial condition. See "Description of HKCG – Competition". Any material decrease in the usage of piped city-gas by either industrial or commercial users or domestic users as a whole may materially and adversely affect the operating results, prospects and financial condition of HKCG.

HKCG is subject to joint venture risks associated with its PRC joint ventures and its Thailand project.

HKCG has interests in many joint ventures engaging in the piped city-gas, water, sewage, coal-related and other energy-related businesses in the PRC and an oilfield project in Thailand. Such joint ventures may involve special risks, including the possibility that the joint venture partner may (i) have economic

or business objectives that are inconsistent with those of HKCG, (ii) experience financial difficulties that may require additional funding from HKCG, or (iii) be unable or unwilling to fulfil its obligations under the joint venture contracts. Certain important decisions of these joint ventures, including (x) amendment of their articles of association, (y) the termination and dissolution of the joint ventures, or (z) the merger of the joint ventures with other economic entities, must be passed by unanimous approval of all joint venture partners. In addition, the transfer of any interest may be subject to a right of first refusal or other restrictions and HKCG's results of operations are partially dependent on the ability of these joint ventures to pay dividends to the shareholders.

Of relevance to HKCG's PRC joint ventures is the "Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries" promulgated by the Ministry of Commerce (the "MOFCOM") and the NDRC in the PRC on 30 November 2004, effective on 1 January 2005, which states that (a) the construction and operation of urban water plants falls within the category of industries in which foreign investment is encouraged, and (b) the construction and operation of fuel gas, heat and water supply and sewage networks in large and medium sized cities falls under the category of industry in which foreign investment is subject to restrictions and the Chinese partners shall hold the majority shareholdings. On 31 October 2007, the MOFCOM and the NDRC jointly issued the revised Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries effective 1 December 2007, under which the construction and operation of fuel gas, heat and water supply and sewage networks in big cities fall under the category of industry in which foreign investment is subject to restrictions and the Chinese partners shall hold the majority shareholdings. On 24 December 2011, the MOFCOM and the NDRC jointly issued the new Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries effective 30 January 2012, which specifies that the construction and operation of fuel gas, heat and water supply and sewage networks in cities with a population of more than 500,000 people fall under the category of industry in which foreign investment is subject to restrictions and Chinese partners shall hold the majority shareholdings. Respectively on 10 March 2015 and 28 June 2017, the MOFCOM and the NDRC jointly issued the Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries (2015 Revised) and the Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries (2017 Revised), under which the construction and operation of fuel gas, heat and water supply and sewage networks in cities with a population of more than 500,000 people remain under the category of industry in which foreign investment is subject to restrictions and Chinese partners shall hold the majority shareholdings. On 28 June 2018, the MOFCOM and the NDRC jointly issued the Special Administrative Measures (Negative List) for Foreign Investment Access (2018 Version) effective from 28 July 2018, under which the construction and operation of fuel gas, heat and water supply and sewage networks in cities with a population of more than 500,000 people is included in the negative list for foreign investment access and Chinese partners shall hold the majority shareholdings. On 30 June 2019, the MOFCOM and the NDRC jointly issued the Special Administrative Measures (Negative List) for Foreign Investment Access (2019 Version) replacing the Special Administrative Measures (Negative List) for Foreign Investment Access (2018 Version) from 30 July 2019 under which the construction and operation of fuel gas and heat in cities with a population of more than 500,000 people was removed from the negative list for foreign investment access, which has been superseded by the Special Administrative Measures (Negative List) for Foreign Investment Access (2020 Version) effective from 23 July 2020. Before 1 January 2020, under the then applicable PRC laws, the establishment and alteration of the foreign invested enterprises which fall within the category of industry as listed in the negative list for foreign investment access shall be approved by competent commerce authorities other than being filed with the commerce authorities. HKCG believes its business is in line with the PRC government's national policy and that local governments are supportive of the business of HKCG. See "The Hong Kong and PRC Gas Industry - PRC Downstream Piped City - Gas Industry". The establishment and the business of HKCG's PRC project companies have in each case been approved by the relevant local commerce authority or MOFCOM except for a few PRC project companies the incorporations of which have not been approved by the relevant commerce authorities, and in many cases, HKCG's joint venture partners are state-owned enterprises. The law stipulated that an approval from the competent commercial administration must be granted before a joint venture can be established. However, there is no specific provision under PRC laws on specific penalties for establishing joint ventures without such approval. In the event, however, that relevant approvals in respect of new projects in the PRC and elsewhere are not granted, HKCG's existing expansion plans and strategies may have to be revised and the operating results, prospects and financial condition of HKCG may be adversely affected. On 15 March 2019, the National People's Congress of the PRC adopted the Foreign Investment Law of the PRC or the Foreign Investment Law with a view toward unifying and streamlining the foreign investment framework into China which came into effect on 1 January 2020, according to which, all foreign invested enterprises, including HKCG's PRC project companies, will be required to follow

the corporate governance rules under the PRC Company Law. However, for foreign invested enterprises formed prior to the adoption of the Foreign Investment Law, the Foreign Investment Law allows for a five-year transition period to bring the corporate governance of such foreign invested enterprises in line with the PRC Company Law.

HKCG may have difficulty implementing and monitoring its corporate policies across its joint ventures in the PRC and in Thailand.

HKCG strives to implement its corporate governance, operational and safety standards at each of its joint venture projects in the PRC and in Thailand. Due to continuous business expansion and the joint venture structure of the projects, implementing and monitoring these standards may prove difficult and failure to do so may result in violations of local regulations or HKCG's own internal policies. There have also been instances that certain of HKCG's PRC project companies were not fully in compliance with PRC laws or regulations relating to competition, pricing, land administration, environmental protection and registration of alterations for foreign invested enterprises and were imposed administrative penalties by PRC governmental or regulatory authorities for such non-compliance. There can be no assurance that HKCG can effectively monitor each joint venture and prevent non-compliance. This may result in violations that could affect HKCG's reputation and business prospects in the PRC and in Thailand, which could materially adversely affect its financial condition and results of operations.

Some of HKCG's PRC project companies do not possess valid land use rights, building ownership certificates or valid leases to certain properties.

Some of HKCG's PRC project companies do not possess valid land use rights or building ownership certificates to certain properties used to conduct business. In addition, certain land and buildings have been leased from third parties who have not provided the relevant land use rights, building ownership certificates or consents of the co-owners (as applicable) mainly for business operation or office purposes, and a substantial portion of the leasehold interests in leased properties have not been registered with the relevant PRC government authorities as required by PRC laws. There can be no assurance that the use of such leased properties will not be challenged.

HKCG's gas businesses in the PRC and its Thailand project are dependent on their ability to maintain their licences and/or concession rights.

HKCG conducts its piped city-gas business in the PRC pursuant to licences from the PRC government which authorises it, in some instances, to provide exclusive gas delivery services in various PRC locales. Although many of the PRC project companies possess valid gas operation licences, some are still in the process of obtaining or renewing such licences. Furthermore, for the project companies that have obtained such licences, the PRC government may revoke HKCG's licences in certain circumstances based on the recommendation of the governmental bodies charged with the regulation of the transportation, distribution, marketing and storage of gas. Although HKCG is not aware of any material adverse breaches and/or potential material adverse breaches of the terms and conditions of its existing licenses, the reasons for which HKCG's licences in the PRC may be revoked include:

- repeated failure to comply with the obligations under its licences and failure to remedy a significant breach of an obligation in accordance with specified procedures;
- total or partial interruption of service for reasons attributable to it that affects transportation capacity during the periods stipulated in its licences;
- sale, assignment or transfer of its essential assets or the placing of encumbrances thereon without prior authorisation, unless such encumbrances serve to finance extensions and improvements to the gas pipeline system;
- its bankruptcy, dissolution or liquidation;
- the gas supplied failing to meet the national standard, which persists after the warnings of relevant regulatory agencies;

- ceasing and abandoning the provision of the licenced service, attempting to assign or unilaterally transfer its licences in full or in part without prior authorisation, or giving up its licences, other than in the cases permitted therein; and
- delegation of the functions granted in such licences without the prior authorisation of or the termination of such licences without regulatory approval of new licences.

If any of HKCG's licences were revoked, it would be required to cease providing gas supply and transportation services in the relevant PRC locale. The impact of a loss of some or all of its licences on HKCG's business, financial condition and results of operations may be material and adverse. The fact that pricing of piped city-gas is subject to the review and approval of relevant PRC local governmental authorities may also adversely affect the financial condition and results of operations.

Further, in respect of HKCG's Thai project, the Group currently holds concession rights for three onshore oilfield blocks in Thailand. The concession rights granted by the Thai authorities for the Thai project are fixed terms, one expired in July 2016 and has been extended by ten years to July 2026, while the other two are expiring in July 2032, and with an option to extend such concession rights by an additional ten years. Certain conditions and restrictions are imposed on the concession rights granted, such as the requirement that concessioner(s) cannot hold the land for any commercial purpose (with an exception permitting the concessioner to resell the appropriate block to revert back to Thai ownership by the end of the applicable concession period). Concessioners will also lose their concession rights in circumstances such as a criminal act under Thai law having been committed or fatal accidents having occurred onsite. Any loss of concession rights for the Thai project may adversely affect the Group's financial performance.

HKCG's PRC piped city-gas projects are subject to competition in the energy market.

In the PRC, HKCG's piped city-gas projects compete with various participants in the energy market including electricity companies, LPG providers, oil products providers, steam providers operating combined heat and power generation and upstream suppliers entering the downstream piped city-gas business. The Group also competes for the right to establish exclusive operations with other piped city-gas companies, whether through a competitive bidding process for a project or otherwise. Most of HKCG's projects have exclusive operation rights in their respective operating areas to supply piped city-gas. However, some piped city-gas projects are still in the process of obtaining such exclusive operation rights, of which some began exclusive operations before the promulgation of the "Administrative Measures on Municipal Utility Concession" in 2004 and the other projects were recently established. Prior to the measures being adopted in the PRC, exclusive concessions were not formally granted. There is no assurance that these projects will successfully obtain exclusive operation rights in these jurisdictions, which may subject them to additional competition risk from other downstream participants. An increase in competition may adversely affect the financial condition and results of operations of these projects.

The Hong Kong government may develop a regulatory environment for the supply and pricing of piped city-gas in ways that may be adverse to HKCG.

In Hong Kong, HKCG is a registered gas supply company. See "Relationship with the Government". The Hong Kong piped city-gas supply market is currently lightly regulated, and HKCG has approximately 74 per cent. penetration rate of domestic households (based on the ratio of the number of HKCG's total residential customers to the total number of Hong Kong domestic households). HKCG cannot give any assurance that the Hong Kong government will not, in the future, seek to develop the regulatory environment for the supply of, and pricing mechanisms related to, piped city-gas in Hong Kong, including requiring existing operators of gas supply infrastructure to provide capacity, such as HKCG's gas pipelines, for additional suppliers in order to encourage competition. The Hong Kong government may also adopt pricing regulations similar to those that apply to other utility companies, or it could revoke, suspend or decline to renew HKCG's registration. Any such development may have a materially adverse effect on HKCG's results of operations or financial position.

Inability to fully pass on natural gas cost fluctuations to piped city-gas end-users in the PRC could adversely affect HKCG's financial condition and results of operations.

In the PRC, downstream piped city-gas tariffs are set by the local pricing bureau and any tariffs adjustment affecting residential users may normally be approved only after a public hearing. City-gas operators need to apply to the pricing bureau to adjust tariffs (although in some instances the city-gas operator is free to adjust tariffs within a pre-approved range). An increasing number of cities, such as Beijing, Chengdu, Jinan and Wuhan, have implemented a cost pass-through mechanism. However, in the event of an increase in the price of natural gas, HKCG may not be able to pass-through the full amount of the increase or there may be delays in the approval of the pass-through. Any delay in obtaining approval to pass on fuel cost fluctuations fully and in a timely manner may result in a material adverse effect on HKCG's financial condition and results of operations.

On June 20, 2017, in order to strengthen the regulation of gas distribution tariff and maintain the healthy development of downstream distribution industry, the NDRC published the Guidelines to Strengthen the Gas Distribution Tariff Regulation (the "Guidelines"). The Guidelines stipulated the principle of "permitted costs plus reasonable returns" governing the return on assets of gas distribution with a 7 per cent. cap for natural gas distributors which is calculated based on the domestic gas prices.

The prices of energy products such as methanol, liquefied coalbed methane, hydrogenated vegetable oil and coal are subject to market fluctuations.

The results of operations of ECO Environmental Investments Limited and its subsidiaries (collectively known as "ECO") are highly dependent upon the prices it receives for its energy products such as methanol, liquefied coalbed methane ("LCBM"), hydrogenated vegetable oil ("HVO") and coal. ECO prices its products largely by reference to domestic market prices for methanol, LCBM, HVO and coal, which have historically fluctuated and may continue to fluctuate in response to resource availability, government policies, costs of production, global and regional economic conditions, demand in end markets for products in which the products are used, technological developments, fluctuations in global production capacity and the level of prices in global markets. Any fluctuation in market prices for methanol, LCBM, HVO and coal will affect ECO's results of operations and cash flows. Extended or substantial market price declines would negatively impact the prices of ECO's products and may also have a material adverse effect on its results of operations and financial condition.

HKCG's operations are subject to the risks, some of which may not be fully covered by insurance, of equipment and systems failure, accidents, interruptions and terrorism.

HKCG's gas transportation and distribution systems, methanol production plant, coalbed methane liquefaction facility, refilling stations, on-shore oilfield exploration and production facility, water system, coal mines and other processing facilities are subject to many operational and technical risks, including the breakdown or failure of equipment, information systems and processes; the performance of equipment below original forecasts (whether due to misuse, unexpected degradation, design flaws or, construction or manufacturing defects); failure to keep on hand adequate supplies of spare parts; operator error; and labour disputes.

In addition, adverse weather due to climate change, natural disaster, catastrophe or other event could result in severe personal injury, property damage and environmental damage, which could curtail HKCG's operations and otherwise materially adversely affect its cash flows and, accordingly, adversely affect its ability to service debt. Substantially all of HKCG's gas-related, water-related, coal-related and other processing operations are exposed to potential natural disasters, including but not limited to typhoons, storms, floods and earthquakes. If one or more facilities that HKCG owns or operates or the facilities of another company that is engaged in petrochemical, energy and other industries that is also subject to the risks discussed above and that is located in one of HKCG's supply areas, are damaged by severe weather or any other disaster, accident, catastrophe or other event, HKCG's operations could be significantly interrupted. Similar interruptions could result from damage to production or other facilities that supply HKCG's facilities or other stoppages arising from factors beyond its control. The occurrence or continuance of any of these or similar events could increase the costs associated with HKCG's operations and reduce its ability to operate its businesses at their intended capacities, thereby reducing revenues. Risks of substantial costs and liabilities, including those from leaks and explosions and similar

events and accidents, are inherent in HKCG's principal operations and HKCG cannot give any assurance that significant costs and liabilities will not be incurred, including those relating to claims for damages to property or persons.

Although HKCG believes it has adequate insurance coverage, HKCG may not be fully insured against all of the risks inherent in its business. If a significant accident or event occurs against which HKCG is not fully insured, its financial condition and results of operations would be adversely affected. In addition, HKCG may not be able to obtain insurance of the type and amount it desires at reasonable rates. Premiums and deductibles for insurance policies may increase substantially, and certain insurance could become unavailable or available only for reduced amounts of coverage. If HKCG were to incur significant liability for which it is not fully insured, such liability could have a material adverse effect on HKCG's financial position and results of operations. In addition, any claims made under any insurance policies maintained by HKCG may not be paid in a timely manner, or at all, and may be insufficient if such an event were to occur.

Labour disruptions could interrupt HKCG's operations.

As at 31 December 2020, HKCG, including its subsidiaries, but not joint ventures or associates employed approximately 53,768 employees in Hong Kong, the PRC and Thailand. See "Description of HKCG – Employees – Employee Relations". Some of HKCG's Hong Kong and PRC employees are currently represented by labour unions and may become fully unionised in the future. In addition, some of HKCG's suppliers, contractors or companies (in each case, especially in the PRC) in which it has investments are or may become unionised in the future or experience labour instability. Although HKCG has enjoyed good labour relations to date and has no reason to expect its labour relations to deteriorate or in any way become disruptive to its businesses, HKCG is unable to predict the outcome of any future labour negotiations and any future conflicts with its employees or contractors and/or their respective unions could arise and have a material adverse effect on its results of operations and financial condition.

HKCG's non-compliance with environmental regulations, including those to be implemented in the future, in Hong Kong, the PRC and Thailand may result in material adverse effects on its results of operations.

A variety of general and industry-specific Hong Kong, PRC and Thai environmental laws and regulations apply to HKCG's gas-related, water-related, coal-to-methanol production, coalbed methane liquefaction, on-shore oilfield exploration and production, coal-mining and processing and other energyrelated operations, including those in Hong Kong, the PRC and Thailand, concerning issues such as damage caused by air emissions, noise emissions, waste water discharges, waste pollution, solid and hazardous waste handling and disposal, requirements for obtaining environmental impact assessments and the investigation and remediation of contamination. Costs and liabilities related to compliance with applicable environmental laws and regulations are an inherent part of the HKCG's business. These laws can impose liability for non-compliance with regulations or clean up liability on generation of hazardous waste and other substances that are disposed of either on- or off-site, regardless of fault or the legality of the disposal activities. Other laws may require HKCG to investigate and remediate contamination at its properties or where it conducts operations, including contamination that was caused in whole or in part by previous owners of its properties or to carry out various environmental impact assessment prior to any exploration activities, which may involve substantial investment in time and resources. Moreover, these laws and regulations are increasingly becoming more stringent and may in the future create substantial environmental compliance or remediation liabilities and costs. While HKCG intends to comply with applicable environmental legislation and regulatory requirements, it is possible that such compliance may prove restrictive and/or costly.

In addition to potential clean up liability, HKCG may become subject to monetary fines and penalties for violation of applicable environmental laws, regulations or administrative orders. For example, some PRC projects have not obtained relevant approvals from the environmental authorities for some of their major projects related to the installation of the pipelines, gas and water supply facilities and other energy infrastructure assets.

This may also result in closure or temporary suspension or adverse restrictions on its operations. HKCG may also, in the future, become involved in proceedings with various regulatory authorities that may require it to pay fines, comply with more rigorous standards or other requirements or incur capital and

operating expenses for environmental compliance. In addition, third parties may sue HKCG for damages and costs resulting from environmental contamination emanating from its properties and/or production facilities.

Although there has been no claim that HKCG's properties and production facilities are not in compliance in all material respects with all applicable environmental laws, unidentified environmental liabilities could arise which could have an adverse effect on HKCG's business and financial condition, profitability and results of operations. See "Description of HKCG – Environmental Matters and Safety".

The Group's planned acquisition of equity interests in Shanghai Gas Co., Ltd. may not proceed or materialise.

On 27 October 2020, HKCG and Towngas China Company Limited ("Towngas China") jointly published an announcement on the Hong Kong Stock Exchange in relation to the execution of a capital increase agreement (the "Capital Increase Agreement") among Towngas China, Shanghai Gas Co., Ltd. (上海燃氣有限公司) ("Shanghai Gas") and Shenergy (Group) Company Limited (申能(集團)有限公司) ("Shenergy Group"), pursuant to which Towngas China agreed to increase the registered capital and capital reserves of Shanghai Gas by way of capital contribution and Towngas China will acquire a 25 per cent. equity interest in Shanghai Gas upon completion (the "Capital Increase"). As at the date of this Offering Circular, completion of the Capital Increase has not yet taken place. Under the Capital Increase Agreement, completion is conditional upon the satisfaction of a number of conditions precedent including the completion of the national security review and the capital verification process. As such, there is no assurance that the planned acquisition will proceed or be completed.

The Group faces contractual risks relating to the Capital Increase Agreement. The Group's failure to complete the proposed transaction in the time required may entitle other contractual parties to claim damages. In addition, should the proposed transaction complete, there can be no assurance that the anticipated benefits arising from such transaction will materialise. For instance, the planned acquisition may fail to broaden the Group's customer base or enhance the Group's future earnings in the amount expected, which could adversely impact the Group's business, financial condition, results of operations or prospects.

HKCG has made significant investment in a number of non-piped city-gas businesses, which if not successful, could adversely affect HKCG's business and financial condition.

HKCG is committed to developing new and clean energy projects. See "Description of HKCG – New and Clean Energy". HKCG may not be successful in implementing new business strategies or penetrating new industries. HKCG's business strategy includes expanding the range of its products and services to diversify its revenue sources which exposes HKCG to a number of risks and challenges, including, among others, the following:

- new business activities may require greater marketing and compliance costs than HKCG's traditional services;
- new business activities may have less growth or profit potential than HKCG anticipates, and there can be no assurance that new business activities will become profitable at the level HKCG desires, or at all;
- the new technology that HKCG relies on to develop its new businesses may not be successful;
- HKCG's competitors may have substantially greater experience and resources to commit to the new business activities HKCG wishes to develop;
- HKCG may not have sufficient expertise amongst its personnel and management who are able to supervise and conduct the relevant new business activities; and
- HKCG may need to dedicate additional resources in order to enhance the capability of its information technology and risk management systems to support a broader range of activities.

New business endeavours may require knowledge and expertise which differ from those used in HKCG's current business operations, including different management skills, risk management procedures, guidelines and systems. HKCG may not be successful in developing such knowledge and expertise or implementing its business strategy. HKCG's inability to implement its business strategy could have a material adverse effect on its business, financial condition and results of operations.

Expansion of HKCG's gas and water businesses is subject to risks, including, without limitation, time and cost overruns, any of which could cause an adverse effect on its business and financial condition.

One of the ways HKCG expects to grow its gas and water businesses is through the construction of additions to its existing processing, transportation and distribution systems in the PRC. The construction of a new pipeline, the expansion of an existing pipeline or the construction of new processing facilities each involves regulatory, environmental, political and legal uncertainties beyond HKCG's control and requires the expenditure of significant amounts of capital that HKCG will be required to finance through borrowings or from operating cash flow. If HKCG undertakes these projects, there can be no assurance that the actual costs incurred, the capacity added or time taken for implementation of these expansion plans will not vary from HKCG's expectations.

HKCG may also rely on estimates of future demand and cash flow projections in its decision to build additional capacity, which may prove to be inaccurate. If HKCG experiences unanticipated or extended delays in generating operating cash flow from any of these new projects, it may need to reallocate or reprioritise financial resources, which may adversely affect its business, prospects, financial condition or results of operations.

HKCG may not succeed in its endeavours to conduct coal exploration, extraction, transportation and chemical processing activities.

One of HKCG's current businesses is to invest in coal-mining and coal infrastructure projects. However, since HKCG has historically focused primarily on operating and developing gas production plants, it may not have the experience or expertise necessary for the successful operation of the coal mines it may develop or acquire or the processing facilities it may operate, whether on its own or in conjunction with a joint venture partner. HKCG may not be successful in developing the requisite knowledge and expertise for successful development of its coal mining and chemical processing businesses. In addition, managing this business will require significant managerial and operational resources. If HKCG fails to manage its diversification and growth strategy or identify or address the risks and uncertainties particularly associated with the exploration, excavation and processing of coal, its strategy may not succeed as anticipated and its business operations and financial performance may be materially and adversely affected.

In addition, the exploration and exploitation of coal reserves in China are subject to the approval of, and registration with, the relevant PRC government authorities. There is no assurance that HKCG will be successful in procuring the necessary exploration or exploitation rights, or that it will be successful in procuring the necessary mining or other permits. Failure to procure exploration or exploitation rights or mining permits could have a material adverse effect on HKCG's business, financial condition and results of operations. The changes of laws and policies in the coal industry will also affect HKCG's investment in coal-mining and coal infrastructure projects. For example, on 1 February 2016, the State Council of the PRC promulgated the "Opinions of the State Council on Resolving Overcapacity in the Coal Industry to Achieve a Turnaround" (《國務院關於煤炭行業化解過剩產能實現脱困發展的意見》) under which, from 2016, within 3 years, examination and approval shall be ceased in principle for new coal mining projects, technical transformation projects to expand production capacity and to increase production capacity. In the case of coal mines with production capacity of less than 600,000 tonnes per year in Shanxi, Inner Mongolia, Shaanxi and Ningxia or less than 300,000 tonnes per year in Hebei, Liaoning, Jilin, Heilongjiang, Jiangsu, Anhui, Shandong, Henan, Gansu, Qinghai and Xinjiang or less than 90,000 tonnes per year in other regions, the government shall guide the relevant enterprises to quit coal mining through comprehensive measures such as granting policy support. On 19 August 2019, the NDRC and other five governmental authorities jointly issued the "Notice to Circulate the Working Plan on Classified Disposal of Coal Mines less than 300,000 Tonnes Per Year" (《關於印發 < 30萬噸/年以下 煤礦分類處置工作方案 > 的通知》) aiming to decrease the number of coal mines with production

capacity of less than 300,000 tonnes per year nationwide to no more than 800 by the end of 2021 with the enterprises of such production capacity in northern China and northwest region (excluding the south Xinjiang) generally quitting coal mining.

HKCG's coal mining operations are subject to mining safety regulations and accidents at HKCG's coal mines or neighbouring coal mines could have a material adverse effect on HKCG's business and the safety of HKCG's coal operations.

Coal mining operations involve significant risks and occupational hazards that are inherent in such activities and may not be completely eliminated through the implementation of preventive measures. Factors such as insufficient attention to safety or maintenance and working conditions associated with overproduction could result in accidents. In particular, underground mining activities are dangerous if the mines have high concentrations of methane gas, as such mining activities generate sparks which may ignite a build-up of methane gas and/or coal dust and result in explosions and water leaking. To prevent underground gas explosions, HKCG has to closely monitor its coal mining operations and carefully determine the amount of coal produced in each of its underground coal mines based on the level of methane gas concentration and the condition of the ventilation system in each of such mines in accordance with the PRC government's safety requirements.

Although HKCG has not experienced any major accidents at its coal mines, there is no assurance that the safety measures currently implemented by HKCG in its coal mines and the ventilation and methane gas sensor systems utilised by HKCG are sufficient to prevent all potential accidents. An accident at any of HKCG's coal mines may have a material adverse effect on HKCG's business and financial condition, results of operations and corporate image. Furthermore, even if accidents do not occur at HKCG's coal mines, accidents or safety hazards occurring at neighbouring mines could create safety hazards affecting HKCG's coal mining operations or even result in a suspension of HKCG's coal mining operations by the relevant authorities. There have been a number of significant mining accidents in China in the last decade which have prompted the PRC government to strengthen safety regulations, and future accidents may result in the imposition of further regulations. HKCG may be required to devote financial and other resources to comply with such regulations.

HKCG maintains insurance typical in the PRC coal mining industry and in amounts that HKCG believes to be adequate. However, there can be no assurance that the insurance maintained by HKCG will provide adequate coverage in certain circumstances.

HKCG may fail to obtain or renew required government approvals, permits and licenses for the operating activities in the PRC.

It is required to obtain certain government approvals, permits and licenses for HKCG's operating activities in gas, water, and coal mining industry in the PRC. HKCG's ability to carry on business is therefore subject to its ability to obtain, and the PRC government's willingness to issue, renew and not revoke, such requisite approvals, permits and licenses. Certain of HKCG's PRC project companies are in the process of applying for the issuance or extension of the governmental licenses or permits required for the operations including, without limitation, certain gas operation permits, hygiene permits, work safety permits, pollutant discharge licenses and road transportation permits. In addition, the construction of piped gas, water and coal mining infrastructure in the PRC requires various governmental approvals, licenses or permits including but not limited to project verification approvals, planning permits, construction permits and certificates or confirmations of completion and acceptance. Certain of HKCG's PRC project companies are currently in the process of applying for the relevant governmental approvals or permits for the construction of certain projects. There can be no assurance that HKCG will be able to obtain or renew its existing approvals, permits and licenses on commercially reasonable terms in a timely manner, or at all, and such approvals, permits and licenses may be revoked by the relevant authorities. HKCG could be subject to fines or penalties imposed by the relevant government authorities, or be required to cease the construction or operation of certain of the projects due to non-compliance with the terms of the government approvals, permits and licenses. Any such fines, penalties or orders for the cessation of construction or operation could materially and adversely affect HKCG's business, financial condition and results of operations.

HKCG is required to comply with environmental laws and regulations in the PRC, and could be exposed to risk relating to environmental and health and safety issues.

HKCG is required to comply with numerous national and local laws and regulations in the PRC, including ones that require the obtaining of licenses and/or approvals relating to the protection of the environment and land use, which are constantly changing. The requirements to obtain such licenses and/or approvals may be made more stringent in the future and such license and/or approvals may not be renewed when they expire. There have been instances where some of HKCG's PRC project companies were not in full compliance with the applicable environmental laws, such as the requirement to undergo and pass an environmental impact assessment and to obtain an environmental approval for certain project. Several of HKCG's PRC project companies have not undergone an environmental impact assessment before commencing construction or obtained an environmental acceptance approval upon completion. There have also been instances where certain of HKCG's PRC project companies were imposed administrative penalties including fines by relevant environmental authorities for noncompliance with relevant environmental protection requirements. In addition, some of HKCG's PRC project companies are currently in the process of obtaining or renewing the pollutant discharge licenses for certain projects.

Failure to obtain any such licenses and/or approvals or to comply with any environmental laws and regulations could have a material adverse effect on HKCG, including closure of individual facilities not in compliance, as well as the imposition of civil or criminal liability and the imposition of liens or fines, and expenditures to bring its facilities into compliance. In addition, compliance with new environmental laws and regulations may result in significantly increased costs for HKCG.

In addition, the water resources, water supply, water plant development and coal mining operations in the PRC could expose HKCG to risk of substantial liability relating to environmental and health and safety issues, such as those resulting from discharge of pollutants into the environment, the handling, storage and disposal of solid or hazardous materials or waste and the investigation and remediation of contaminated sites. HKCG may be responsible for the investigation and remediation of environmental conditions at currently and formerly operated sites. HKCG may also be subject to associated liabilities, including liabilities for natural resource damage, third-party property damage or personal injury resulting from lawsuits brought by the government or private litigants as a result of the activities.

HKCG's oil exploration operation is subject to the fluctuation of oil prices

Oil price is the primary factor in deciding whether a reserve is economically feasible and often, the operation cannot be shut down and be restarted instantly when it becomes unprofitable due to oil price movement. Therefore, any fluctuation in the price of oil may have an unpredictable impact on the bottom line of HKCG.

HKCG may not succeed in its endeavours to conduct oil exploration, extraction and production activities.

HKCG holds a 60 per cent. effective stake in an onshore oil exploration and production project in Thailand Blocks SW1A, L33/43 and L44/43, and the Group has entered into a sale and purchase agreement with a key customer for the crude oil that the field produces.

There can be no assurances that the Thai oil exploration and production project will yield crude oil reserves or otherwise or produce sufficient quantities of crude oil. If HKCG does not succeed in its endeavours to conduct oil exploration, extraction and production activities, the Group's results of operations may be affected.

The expansion strategy of HKCG in the PRC relies, in part, on the continued economic development of its operational locations in the PRC.

Although HKCG carries out financial, audit and legal due diligence in respect of each project before it enters into a joint venture contract with a local joint venture partner, there is no guarantee that new PRC locations into which HKCG expands will develop or grow as projected or that there will be sufficient customer demand to justify such expansion. Given the substantial capital investment at the early stages

of each project, any unexpected adverse changes in the economic growth of an operational location may materially adversely affect the performance of the relevant project and hence, the performance and financial conditions of HKCG.

HKCG may be unable to execute fully its growth strategy if it encounters difficulties in accessing capital and credit markets.

HKCG's strategy contemplates growth through the development and acquisition of a wide range of downstream, midstream, upstream, water business and other energy and resources infrastructure assets while maintaining a strong balance sheet. This strategy includes constructing and acquiring additional assets and businesses to enhance HKCG's ability to compete effectively and diversify its asset portfolio, thereby providing more stable cash flow.

HKCG regularly considers and enters into discussions regarding the construction or acquisition of additional assets, stand-alone development projects and other transactions that it believes will present opportunities to realise synergies and increase its cash flow. HKCG may require substantial new capital to finance the future development and acquisition of assets. Limitations on HKCG's access to capital will impair its ability to execute this strategy. If HKCG's cost of capital is high, it may not be able to finance the construction or acquisition of assets necessary to implement its business strategy. HKCG may be unable to raise the necessary funds on satisfactory terms, if at all.

The global economic and financial conditions remain unstable, following the global financial and economic crisis, including the intensifying trade tension among major economies such as that between the United States and the PRC, the potential withdrawal of countries from the Euro-zone and the UK's exit from the European Union on 31 January 2020, a slump in commodity prices, interest rate hikes, fears of a slowdown in the PRC and global economies and volatility in the PRC and other stock markets. In particular, there have been recent escalations in the trade tensions between the United States and the PRC. The imposition of tariffs by the United States on products from the PRC from July 2019 and the retaliation by the PRC have caused even greater volatility in the global markets. Although the United States and the PRC entered into a "phase one" economic and trade agreement in January 2020 as an initial step towards resolving the trade disputes between them, the effect of such an agreement and the amicable resolution of such a trade war remain elusive and the lasting impact any trade war may have on the global economy and the industries that the Group operates in remain uncertain. There remains considerable uncertainty as to the timeline and outcome of the trade negotiations between the United States and the PRC. Failure of trade negotiations between the United States and the PRC may lead to material adverse consequences on the economies of Hong Kong and other Asia Pacific countries, which could, in turn, harm the Group's business and growth prospects.

Global market conditions could also have an adverse impact on HKCG's ability to fund its borrowing activities on acceptable terms, or at all. The markets for commercial paper and asset-backed securities, for example, have seen decreased liquidity since the onset of the sub-prime market disruptions. Reduced liquidity in the global capital markets could impact the Hong Kong or PRC markets and limit HKCG's ability to diversify its funding sources.

Given the volatility of the credit markets and potential adverse effects therefrom, to the extent that turmoil in the credit markets continues and/or intensifies, it may have the potential to affect HKCG's business, financial condition and results of operations in a materially adverse manner.

HKCG is exposed to market conditions in respect of equity and debt securities held by HKCG for investment.

HKCG holds equity and debt securities, including structured products, for investment and may maintain large trading and investing positions. Declining equity price levels, rising interest rates or general market fluctuations and volatility may adversely affect the value of those positions or may reduce HKCG's willingness to enter into new transactions. From time to time HKCG may incur significant trading losses in periods of market turbulence.

HKCG's profit and cash flows are subject to risks due to changes in interest rates and exchange rates.

HKCG's profit and cash flows are subject to volatility stemming from movements in interest rates. As at 31 December 2020, approximately 33 per cent. of HKCG's loans were on a floating interest rates basis. HKCG is exposed to interest rate fluctuations on its floating rate loans, which would cause its finance costs to increase in a rising rate environment, and on the interest cost of future debt issues. An increase in HKCG's finance costs could adversely affect its financial condition, prospects, and results of operations. HKCG's profit and cash flows are also subject to volatility stemming from fluctuations in exchange rates, especially Renminbi, as substantial part of HKCG's revenue is generated by its PRC operating subsidiaries and is denominated in Renminbi. The devaluation of Renminbi could adversely affect HKCG's profit and cash flows when translated or converted from Renminbi to other currencies.

HKCG depends on key personnel, the loss of whom may result in an insufficient number of qualified employees.

HKCG believes that its ability to implement its business strategy and its future success depends on the continued service of its senior management team, which has extensive experience in the industry and is vital in maintaining some of its major customer and governmental relationships. In addition, the loss of technical knowledge, management and industry expertise of any of HKCG's key officers, directors and senior managers could make it difficult for HKCG to execute its business plan effectively and could result in delays in new projects being completed as well as loss of major customers while HKCG seeks employee replacements.

The future growth and success of HKCG will depend to a large extent on its ability to retain or recruit qualified individuals to strengthen its management, operational and research teams. With HKCG's expansion into the PRC and diversification of its overall business, there may be a lack of sufficient management staff to oversee sales and operating, administrative and financial procedures and controls, which may in turn materially adversely affect the business of HKCG.

Henderson Land Development Company Limited owns a significant stake in HKCG's shares and its interests may differ significantly from those of the Noteholders.

As at 31 December 2020, Henderson Land Development Company Limited ("Henderson Land") was beneficially interested in approximately 41.53 per cent. of HKCG's shares. The interests of Henderson Land may differ significantly from or compete with HKCG's interests or the interests of Noteholders, and there can be no assurance that Henderson Land will exercise influence over HKCG's business in a manner that is in the best interests of the Noteholders.

HKCG is subject to the general risks inherent in property ownership and operation of commercial properties.

HKCG has, and expects that it will continue to have, property interests in Hong Kong, including an approximately 15.8 per cent. interest in the company that owns 100 per cent. of the International Finance Centre complex in Hong Kong (the "IFC"). Historically, the Hong Kong property market has been volatile and cyclical, with Hong Kong property values affected by supply and demand of comparable properties, the amount of new land made available by the Hong Kong government as well as political and economical developments in Hong Kong and the PRC, among other factors.

HKCG is also subject to the general risks incidental to the ownership and operation of commercial properties including, among other things, competition for tenants, changes in market rental levels, inability to collect rent and the need to renovate, repair and re-let space periodically and pay for the associated costs. Rental values are also affected by factors such as political developments, governmental regulations and changes in planning or tax laws, interest rate levels and inflation.

Any decline in property values or rental yields could have an adverse effect on HKCG's business, financial condition or results of operations.

HKCG is subject to the cybersecurity risks.

The business operations of HKCG are dependent on information technology systems that are vulnerable to cyber-attacks, critical system failure, leakage or loss of sensitive information, all of which would adversely affect HKCG's operations and corporate image. Also, the advanced technology may lead to cyber-attacks (such as hacking and use of ransom-ware) resulting in data loss and privacy leakage, exposing HKCG's businesses to non-compliance with the required data privacy regulations.

HKCG's network may be vulnerable to unauthorised access, computer viruses and other disruptive problems. Costs incurred in rectifying any of such disruptive problems may be high and may adversely affect HKCG's business, financial condition or results of operations. Eliminating these security problems may result in interruptions, delays or termination of user access to HKCG's website.

HKCG's subsidiaries may be subject to restrictions on the payment of dividends to HKCG.

A significant part of the Group's business is conducted through HKCG's subsidiaries, and HKCG depends in part on the receipt of dividends from subsidiaries to satisfy its obligations, including HKCG's obligations under the Guarantee. The ability of HKCG' subsidiaries to pay dividends may be subject to, among other things, distributable earnings, cash flow conditions, restrictions contained in the constitutional documents of these companies, applicable laws and restrictions contained in the debt instruments of such companies. For example, some of the loan agreements entered into by HKCG's subsidiaries prohibit the payment of dividends to their shareholders until the relevant loan is no longer outstanding. HKCG cannot assure that its subsidiaries will have distributable earnings or will be permitted to distribute their distributable earnings to HKCG as it anticipates, or at all. In addition, dividends payable to HKCG by these companies are limited by the percentage of HKCG's equity ownership in these companies. These factors could reduce the payments that HKCG receives from its subsidiaries, which may reduce HKCG's ability to meet its payment obligations under the Guarantee.

Risks Relating to Hong Kong and the PRC

HKCG may be affected by an economic downturn in Hong Kong.

HKCG generates substantial revenues in Hong Kong. HKCG's performance and the quality and growth of its assets are necessarily dependent on the overall economy in Hong Kong. As a result, any downturn in the Hong Kong economy may adversely affect HKCG's business, financial condition or results of operations. Hong Kong's real gross domestic product ("GDP") decreased by 1.2 per cent. year-on-year in 2019 and fell by 6.1 per cent. year-on-year in 2020. HKCG expects the continued growth in the Hong Kong economy to depend in part upon the economic performance of the United States, the European Union and the PRC, as well as certain developed countries. There can be no assurance that future global events will not have an adverse effect on the Hong Kong economy and HKCG's business.

HKCG is dependent on the political, economic, regulatory and social conditions in Hong Kong.

Hong Kong is a special administrative region of the PRC, with its own government and legislature. The Joint Declaration between the Chinese and British governments and the Basic Law provide that Hong Kong will have a high degree of legislative, judicial and economic autonomy, that the socialist system and policies of the PRC will not be practised in Hong Kong, and that Hong Kong's capitalist system and way of life shall remain unchanged for 50 years. Since 1 July 1997, when the PRC resumed the exercise of sovereignty over Hong Kong, Hong Kong has enjoyed autonomy. However, if there were any change in the political or legal environment in Hong Kong, HKCG's business and financial condition could be adversely affected.

Civil unrest could have an adverse impact on HKCG's business, financial condition results of operations.

Civil unrest, protests, demonstrations or rioting causing mass disruption to businesses and transportation may also affect HKCG's operations. There is no assurance that any unforeseeable interruptions to the business and operations can be mitigated or avoided. Moreover, prolonged civil unrest and an uncertain political environment, including any declaration by the Chief Executive of Hong Kong of a state of emergency pursuant to the Emergency Regulations Ordinance (Cap. 241) which confers on the Chief

Executive power to make any regulations whatsoever which he/she may consider desirable in the public interest in an occasion of emergency or public danger, may impact the Hong Kong economy and result in an economic slowdown. Civil unrest and instability may also dampen market confidence and sentiments. Civil unrest is outside the control of HKCG. Any demonstrations, protests or riots causing disruption to the city, the authorities' reaction to any such protests or riots if they recur, the Chief Executive's decision to make any declaration of a state of emergency and the instability of the political and economic conditions in the region, could adversely impact HKCG's business, financial condition and results of operations and the price of the Notes traded in the secondary market.

HKCG is dependent on the political, economic, regulatory and social conditions in the PRC.

HKCG plans to continue to develop its business and operations in the PRC in the future. Accordingly, HKCG's performance and the quality and growth of its assets are necessarily dependent on the overall economy in the PRC. The general economic, political, legal and social conditions prevailing in the PRC will directly and indirectly affect HKCG's financial performance and operations. Particularly, any changes in the policies implemented by the government in the PRC which result in currency and interest rate fluctuations, capital restrictions, regulation of the energy and water industry and changes in duties and taxes detrimental to HKCG's business may materially adversely affect its operations, financial performance and future growth.

The economy of the PRC differs from the economies of most developed countries in many respects, including the:

- level of government involvement;
- level of development;
- growth rate;
- level of capital reinvestment;
- control of capital reinvestment;
- control of foreign exchange; and
- allocation of resources.

Before its adoption of reform and open-door policies in 1978, the PRC was primarily a planned economy. Since then, the PRC government has been reforming the PRC's economic system and has in recent years also begun reforming the government structure. These reforms have resulted in significant economic growth and social progress. Although the PRC government still owns a significant portion of the productive assets in the PRC, economic reform policies since the late 1970s have emphasised autonomous enterprises and the utilisation of market mechanisms. While HKCG believes these reforms will have a positive effect on its overall and long-term development, there is no assurance that such policies will continue to prevail in the future. Economic reform policies may be adjusted, modified or applied inconsistently from industry to industry or across different regions of the country. As a result, HKCG may not continue to benefit from all, or any, of these policies. HKCG cannot predict whether changes in the PRC's political, economic and social conditions, laws, regulations and policies will have any material adverse effect on its business, sales, operating results and financial condition.

The economy of the PRC experienced rapid growth over the past 30 years. There has been a slowdown in the growth of the PRC's GDP since the second half of 2013 and this has raised market concerns that the historic rapid growth of the economy of the PRC may not be sustainable.

The future performance of the PRC's economy is not only affected by the economic and monetary policies of the PRC government, but has been, and in the future will continue to be, materially affected by geo-political, economic and market conditions, including factors such as the liquidity of the global financial markets, the level and volatility of debt and equity prices, interest rates, currency and commodities prices, investor sentiment, inflation, and the availability and cost of capital and credit.

While the International Monetary Fund expects global economic growth to strengthen to 6 per cent. in 2021, moderating to 4.4 per cent. in 2022, there are a number of uncertainties ahead. The ongoing trade dispute between the PRC and the United States and the increase in tariffs that the United States plans to impose on Chinese imports have contributed to increased market volatility, weakened business and consumer confidence and diminished expectations for economic growth around the world. In Europe, the exit of the United Kingdom from the European Union, and any prolonged period of uncertainty which results, could have a significant negative impact on international markets.

The implications for the world and HKCG are significant. First, a rise in global trade protectionism will negatively impact the trade-dependent economies in Asia. Second, the interplay of United States fiscal and monetary policies, and aggressive quantitative easing programmes in Japan and Europe may lead to more volatile global capital flows, which could in turn impact global growth. Third, financial market volatility and increased uncertainty may have a broader global economic impact that may in turn have a material adverse effect on HKCG's businesses, financial condition and results of operations.

Economic growth in the PRC has also historically been accompanied by periods of high inflation. Increasing inflation rates were caused by many factors beyond HKCG's control, such as rising production and labour costs, high lending levels, changes in national and international governmental policies and regulations as well as movements in exchange rates and interest rates. It is impossible to accurately predict future inflationary trends. Further inflationary pressures within the PRC may have a material adverse effect on the HKCG's businesses, financial condition or results of operations.

Recently, concerns have arisen over deflationary pressures in the PRC as a result of weak domestic demand and a slowing economy. Inflation rates within the PRC have been on a downward trend in recent years. A prolonged period of deflation may result in falling profits, closure of plants and shrinking employment and incomes by companies and individuals, any of which could adversely affect HKCG's businesses, financial condition or results of operations.

Introduction of new laws or changes to existing laws by the PRC government may adversely affect HKCG's business.

HKCG's business and operations in the PRC and the business and operations of its customers and suppliers in the PRC are subject to the laws and regulations promulgated by the PRC government. The PRC government is still in the process of developing a comprehensive set of laws and regulations in the course of the PRC's transformation from a centrally planned economy to a freer market oriented economy. Since 1979, the PRC government has promulgated laws and regulations in relation to economic matters such as foreign investment, corporate organisation and governance, commerce, taxation and trade with a view to developing a comprehensive system of commercial laws. However, due to the fact that these laws and regulations have not been fully developed and because of the limited volume of published cases and their non-binding nature, the interpretation of PRC laws and regulations still involves a significant degree of uncertainty and is less developed than those applicable to companies incorporated in Hong Kong, the United States, the United Kingdom and other developed countries or regions. As the legal system in the PRC is still in a state of flux, laws and regulations or the interpretation of the same may be subject to change. For example, on 14 September 2015, the NDRC issued the "Circular on Promoting the Reform on of the Filing and Registration System on the Issuance by Enterprises of Foreign Debt" (《關於推進企業發行外債備案登記制管理改革的通知》) (the "NDRC Circular") requiring enterprises domiciled within the PRC and their overseas subsidiaries or branches to file and register with the NDRC prior to issuance of debt instruments outside China and to file a postissuance report within 10 working days after the issuance. On 12 June 2017, the NDRC posted an announcement on its website referring to the NDRC Circular and required certain offshore companies controlled by individuals to register their offshore bonds with the NDRC. While HKCG believes that the NDRC Circular does not apply to the issuance of the Notes, there remains uncertainties over the interpretation, implementation and enforcement of the NDRC Circular. If there is any change in the interpretation and implementation of the NDRC Circular and HKCG fails to complete such filing in accordance with the relevant requirements, it may be subject to penalties or other enforcement actions by relevant PRC government authorities. In addition, the NDRC may also make oral amendments or modifications to the requirements of, and certificates or approvals issued under, the NDRC Circular on a case by case basis. Furthermore, any change in the political and economic policy of the PRC government may also lead to similar changes in the laws and regulations or the interpretation thereof. Such changes may adversely affect HKCG's operations and business in the PRC.

The PRC legal system is a codified legal system made up of written laws, regulations, circulars, administrative directives and internal guidelines as well as judicial interpretations. Unlike common law jurisdictions such as Hong Kong, decided cases do not form part of the legal structure of the PRC and thus have no binding effect. As such, the administration of PRC laws and regulations may be subject to a certain degree of discretion by the authorities. This has resulted in the outcome of dispute resolutions not having the level of consistency or predictability as in other countries with more developed legal systems. Due to such inconsistency and unpredictability, if HKCG should be involved in any legal dispute in the PRC, it may experience difficulties in obtaining legal redress or in enforcing its legal rights.

From time to time, changes in law and regulations (such as establishment of the Counter-Terrorism law, Cybersecurity law, carbon trading platform, gas price and city-gas connection fee reform, reinforcement of Anti-Monopoly law) or the implementation thereof may also require HKCG to obtain additional approvals and licences from the PRC authorities for the conduct of its operations in the PRC. In such event, HKCG may need to incur additional expenses to comply with such requirements. This will in turn affect HKCG's financial performance as its business costs will increase. Furthermore, there can be no assurance that such approvals or licences will be granted to HKCG promptly or at all. If HKCG experiences delay in obtaining, or inability to obtain, such required approvals or licences, its operations and business in the PRC, and hence its overall financial performance will be adversely affected.

In the PRC, gas distribution companies which invest in and operate the piped city-gas supply business in urban areas are under the supervision of a number of government ministries and departments, including the MOFCOM, the NDRC, the Ministry of Construction (原建設部) (the "MOC", which has been superseded by the Ministry of Housing and Urban-Rural Development or the "MOHURD"), the Ministry of Human Resources and Social Security and the Ministry of Public Security. Companies conducting business in the coal industry in the PRC are also subject to extensive regulations and under the supervision of relevant PRC regulatory authorities, principally including the NDRC, the Ministry of Land and Resources (the "MLR", which has been reorganised as the Ministry of Natural Resources), the National Coal Mine Safety Administration (the "NCMSA", which has been superseded by the National Mine Safety Administration or the NMSA), the State Administration of Work Safety (the "SAWS", which has been superseded by the Ministry of Emergency Management), and the Ministry of Environmental Protection (which has been reorganised as the Ministry of Ecology and Environment). HKCG must comply with the relevant requirements of certain regulations, including without limitation the "Regulations on Administration of Fuel Gas in Towns and Cities" (《城鎮燃氣管理條例》or the "Fuel Gas Regulations"), the "Coal Law of the PRC" (《中華人民共和國煤炭法》), the "PRC Safety Production Law" (《中華人民共和國安全生產法》), and the "PRC Mining Safety Law" (《中華人民共和 國礦山安全法》). In addition, HKCG must comply with the relevant requirements and policies of local authorities where HKCG's projects are situated. For example, any proposed increase in gas usage charges levied by HKCG exceeding the original approved charge requires the consent of the local pricing bureau. There is no assurance that any increases will be approved.

Exclusive rights or rights of first refusal to provide piped city-gas are granted by local governments pursuant to policies of promoting environmental protection and encouraging the use of natural gas and the construction of natural gas supply facilities. There can be no assurance that the above regulatory regime and policies (including the granting of exclusive rights or rights of first refusal to supply piped city-gas in operational locations) will not be changed. HKCG's operations and profitability may be materially adversely affected if changes that occur are not favourable to HKCG.

The occurrence of a severe communicable disease or a pandemic in Hong Kong or the PRC, could materially and adversely affect the Group's business operations, financial condition and results of operations.

Contagious diseases and pandemics which are beyond the Group's control may adversely affect the economy, infrastructure and livelihood of the people in Hong Kong and the PRC. Hong Kong and certain regions in the PRC, including the cities in which the Group operates, are under the threat of severe communicable diseases such as severe acute respiratory syndrome, avian influenza, swine influenza or more recently, the novel coronavirus ("COVID-19").

The outbreak of COVID-19 globally since late 2019 could materially and adversely affect the overall business sentiment and environment in Hong Kong and the PRC, particularly if such outbreak is inadequately controlled. In particular, the Group's Hong Kong gas business and PRC utility business were most significantly impacted by the outbreak of COVID-19. With the suspension of operations and production of Hong Kong and PRC manufacturers and the imposition of mandatory home quarantine and other travel restrictions by local government as well as closure of catering services, outlets, clubhouse and party room services in the first quarter of 2020, the gas sales volume of the Group in the commercial and industrial segments are negatively affected. In Hong Kong, the gas sales dropped by 12 per cent. to 3,300 million MJ for the three months ended 31 March 2020 as compared to the same period in 2019. Similarly, in the PRC, the gas sales volume in the commercial and industrial segments dropped by 18 per cent. to 4.1 billion cubic metres for the three months ended 31 March 2020 as compared to the same period in 2019.

As a socially responsible public utility, the Group has adopted a series of relief measures to alleviate the operating pressure of its customers in its utility business impacted by COVID-19 including the grant of credit period extensions and payment deferrals – if a customer failed to settle its gas bills on time as a result of COVID-19, there would be undisrupted gas supply while the payment due date was postponed by the Group to the extent appropriate. Also, HKCG provided aid to qualifying restaurants in the form of an interest-free kitchen equipment rental and purchase scheme. These relief measures, if expanded or maintained for an extended period of time, may have an adverse impact on the Group's margins, financial condition and results of operations. In addition, the Group has incurred additional costs in in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, such as the cost of disinfecting facilities the Group relies on for its operations and of providing necessary personal protective equipment to the Group's employees. These increased costs and expenses may not be fully recoverable or adequately covered by insurance.

The Group's revenue is currently derived mainly from its PRC operations, and any labour shortages, fall in occupancy rates or contraction or slowdown in the growth of domestic consumption in Hong Kong or the PRC could materially and adversely affect its business, sales, operating results and financial condition. In addition, if its employees are affected by any severe communicable disease including COVID-19, it could adversely affect or disrupt the Group's production and operations at the relevant plants and materially and adversely affect its business, sales, operating results and financial condition, which may also involve a closure of the Group's facilities to prevent the spread of the disease. The spread of any severe communicable disease in Hong Kong or the PRC may also affect the operations of the Group's customers and suppliers, which could materially and adversely affect its business, sales, operating results and financial condition.

The COVID-19 pandemic is ongoing and evolving rapidly. The duration and ultimate impact of the outbreak cannot be reasonably estimated at this time. While COVID-19 vaccines have been developed and made available by a number of biopharmaceutical manufacturers, there remains uncertainty regarding the efficacy, safety and durability of such vaccines. The restrictions imposed to contain the outbreak may be further broadened or continue for extended periods of time. Such measures may not be successful in stabilizing markets or containing the economic or other impacts of the outbreak. Even if the current COVID-19 situation were to improve, there can be no assurance that (i) there will not be another outbreak of COVID-19 or another contagious disease in the future or (ii) that governments will not re-impose restrictive measures that significantly disrupt economic activities in the event that there is a resurgence of the pandemic. As a result, the global economy is facing significant uncertainties and global financial markets are experiencing significant volatilities which may adversely affect the Hong Kong and PRC economies, the Group and its business and financial condition, results of operations, prospects, liquidity, capital position and the value of the Notes. Investors must exercise caution before making any investment decisions.

The Group is subject to restrictions on remittance of RMB into and out of the PRC and governmental controls on currency conversion and may be affected by the risks relating to fluctuations in exchange rates in the future which could materially affect the Group's financial condition and the results of its operations.

The PRC government imposes controls on the convertibility of Renminbi into foreign currencies and the remittance of currency out of the PRC. The Notes are denominated in US dollars, while a substantial part of the Group's revenue is generated by its PRC operating subsidiaries and is denominated in

Renminbi, a portion of which may need to be converted into other currencies in order to meet the Group's foreign currency obligations, such as payments of dividends, overseas acquisitions, and payments of principal and interests under the Notes or other foreign currency denominated debt, if any.

Under existing PRC laws and regulations on foreign exchange, payments of current account items, including profit distributions, interest payments and trade and service-related foreign exchange transactions, can be made in foreign currencies without prior approval from State Administration of Foreign Exchange ("SAFE") provided that certain procedural requirements are complied with. Approval from, or registration with, competent government authorities is required where Renminbi is to be converted into foreign currency and remitted out of the PRC to pay capital expenses such as the repayment of loans denominated in foreign currencies. More restrictions and extensive vetting processes have been put in place by SAFE to regulate cross-border transactions under the capital account, such as the Notice of the SAFE on Further Promoting the Reform of Foreign Exchange Administration and Improving Authenticity and Compliance Review (國家外匯管理局關於進一步推進外匯管理改革完善真 實合規性審核的通知). The PRC government may, at its discretion, take measures to restrict access to foreign currencies for current account and capital account transactions under certain circumstances. If the foreign exchange control system prevents the Group from obtaining sufficient foreign currencies to satisfy the Group's foreign currency demands, the Group may not be able to make interest payments and/or principal repayment to the Noteholders or holders of other foreign currency denominated debt, if any. In addition, there can be no assurance that new laws or regulations will not be promulgated in the future that would have the effect of further restricting the remittance of Renminbi into or out of the

The value of Renminbi against the U.S. dollar and other foreign currencies is subject to changes in the PRC's policies, as well as international economic and political developments. Pursuant to reforms of the exchange rate system, Renminbi-to-foreign currency exchange rates are allowed to fluctuate within a band of 2.0 per cent. above or below the central parity rate against a basket of foreign currencies, effective from 17 March 2014. In August 2015, the People's Bank of China ("PBOC") changed the way it calculates the mid-point price of Renminbi against the US dollar, requiring the market-makers who submit for the PBOC's reference rates to consider the previous day's closing spot rate, foreign-exchange demand and supply as well as changes in major currency rates. This change, and other changes such as widening the trading band that may be implemented, may increase volatility in the value of the Renminbi against foreign currencies. On 11 December 2015, the China Foreign Exchange Trade System ("CFETS"), a sub-institutional organisation of PBOC, published the CFETS Renminbi exchange rate index for the first time which weighs Renminbi against 24 currencies, to guide the market in order to measure the Renminbi exchange rate from a new perspective. The PRC government may adopt further reforms of its exchange rate system, including making the Renminbi freely convertible in the future. If such reforms were implemented and resulted in devaluation of the Renminbi against the US dollar, the Group's financial condition and results of operations could be adversely affected because of its US dollar denominated indebtedness and other obligations. Such devaluation could also adversely affect the value, translated or converted into US dollars or otherwise, of the Group's earnings and its ability to satisfy its obligations under the Notes.

Further to the PBOC's adjustment in August 2015, the value of Renminbi depreciated significantly against the U.S. dollar. In January and February 2016, Renminbi experienced further fluctuation in value against the U.S. dollar. There can be no assurance that Renminbi will not experience significant depreciation or appreciation against the U.S. dollar or against any other currency in the future. There remains significant international pressure on the PRC government to adopt more flexible currency policies. In the event of material fluctuations in the exchange rates of the U.S. dollar against Renminbi, the Group's ability to pay its obligations in foreign currencies may be materially and adversely affected. Such fluctuations may also cause the Group to incur foreign exchange losses and affect the relative value of any dividends distributed by its PRC subsidiaries. In addition, appreciation or depreciation in the value of Renminbi relative to the U.S. dollar may affect the Group's financial results in U.S. dollars without giving effect to any underlying change in its businesses or results of operations.

The Issuer or HKCG may be treated as a PRC resident enterprise for PRC tax purposes, which could result in unfavourable tax consequences to its financial condition and the Noteholders.

Under the Enterprise Income Tax Law of the PRC (the "EIT Law") and the implementation rules, which both took effect on 1 January 2008, enterprises established outside the PRC whose "de facto management bodies" are located in China are considered "resident enterprises" for PRC tax purposes. The implementation rules define the term "de facto management body" as a management body that exercises full and substantial control and management over the business, personnel, accounts and properties of an enterprise. In April 2009, the State Taxation Administration specified certain criteria for the determination of the "de facto management bodies" for foreign enterprises that are controlled by PRC enterprises. However, there have been no official implementation rules regarding the determination of the "de facto management bodies" for foreign enterprises that are controlled by individuals or foreign enterprises (including companies such as ourselves).

Although it is unclear under PRC tax law whether the Issuer or HKCG have a "de facto management body" located in China for PRC tax purposes, the Issuer and HKCG take the position that they are not a PRC resident enterprise for tax purposes. The Issuer and HKCG cannot assure you that the PRC tax authorities will agree with this position. If the Issuer or HKCG is deemed to be a PRC resident enterprise for PRC tax purposes, it would be subject to the PRC enterprise income tax at the rate of 25 per cent. on its worldwide income. Furthermore, if the Issuer is deemed to be a PRC resident enterprise for PRC tax purposes, the Issuer would be obligated to withhold PRC income tax of up to 10 per cent. on the payments on the Notes to investors that are non-PRC resident enterprises (or 20 per cent. in the case of individuals), if such payments are regarded as being derived from sources within the PRC. In addition, if the Issuer or HKCG fails to do so, it may be subject to fines and other penalties. Similarly, any gain realised by such non-PRC resident enterprise investors from the transfer of the Notes may be regarded as being derived from sources within the PRC and would accordingly be subject to a 10 per cent. PRC withholding tax (or 20 per cent. in the case of individuals).

If the Issuer or HKCG is required under the EIT Law to withhold PRC income tax on interest paid to Noteholders who are "non-resident enterprises," it will be required, subject to certain exceptions, to pay such additional amounts as will result in receipt by a Noteholder of such amounts as would have been received by the Noteholder had no such withholding been required. The requirement to pay additional amounts will increase the cost of servicing interest payments on the Notes, and could have a material adverse effect on the Issuer's and HKCG's ability to pay interest on, and repay the principal amount of, the Notes, as well as their profitability and cash flow.

It may be difficult to effect service of process or to enforce any judgments obtained from non-PRC courts against the Group.

The Terms and Conditions of the Notes and the transaction documents are governed by English law and the Issuer and HKCG have submitted to the exclusive jurisdiction of the English courts. However, certain companies in the Group are incorporated in the PRC and a substantial amount of the Group's assets and companies are located in the PRC. Therefore, investors may encounter difficulties in effecting service of process from outside PRC upon the Group or its management.

Moreover, it is understood that the enforcement of foreign judgments in the PRC is still subject to uncertainties. The PRC does not have treaties providing for the reciprocal recognition and enforcement of judgements of courts with the United States, the United Kingdom, Japan or most other western countries. Therefore, it may be difficult for investors to effect service of process upon the Group in the PRC or enforce against the Group in the PRC any judgements obtained from non-PRC courts.

Any occurrence of force majeure events, natural disasters or other adverse incidents in the PRC may materially and adversely affect the Group's businesses, financial condition and results of operations.

Any future occurrence of force majeure events or natural disasters may materially and adversely affect the Group's businesses and results of operations. The PRC has experienced natural disasters such as earthquakes, floods and droughts in the past few years. As the Group's businesses are dependent on economic conditions in the PRC as a whole, any future occurrence of severe natural disasters in the PRC may adversely affect its economy and, in turn, the Group's businesses and results of operations. There is no assurance that any future occurrence of natural disasters or the measures taken by the PRC

government or other countries in response to such events will not seriously disrupt the Group's operations or those of the Group's business partners or prospective investors in the Group's, which may have a material adverse effect on the Group's results of operations.

The Group's labour costs may increase for various reasons including the implementation of the PRC Labour Contract Law or inflation in the PRC.

The PRC Labour Contract Law (中華人民共和國勞動合同法) became effective on 1 January 2008 in the PRC and was amended on 28 December 2012 and became effective on 1 July 2013. It imposes more stringent requirements on employers in relation to entry into fixed-term employment contracts and dismissal of employees. Pursuant to the PRC Labour Contract Law, the employer is required to make a compensation payment to a fixed-term contract employee when the term of their employment contract expires, unless the employee does not agree to renew the contract even though the conditions offered by the employer for renewal are the same or better than those stipulated in the current employment contract. In general, the amount of compensation payment is equal to the monthly wage of the employee multiplied by the number of full years that the employee has worked for the employer. A minimum wage requirement has also been incorporated into the PRC Labour Contract Law. In addition, unless otherwise prohibited by the PRC Labour Contract Law or objected to by the employees themselves, the employer is also required to enter into non-fixed-term employment contracts with employees who have previously entered into fixed-term employment contracts for two consecutive terms.

In addition, under the Regulations on Paid Annual Leave for Employees (職工帶薪年休假條例), which became effective on 1 January 2008, employees who have worked continuously for more than one year are entitled to paid annual leave ranging from 5 to 15 days, depending on the length of the employees' service. Employees who consent to waive such annual leave at the request of employers shall be compensated an amount equal to three times their normal daily salaries for each day being waived. Under the National Leisure and Tourism Outline 2013-2020 (國民旅遊休閑綱要2013-2020) which became effective on 2 February 2013, regulations on paid annual leave of employees shall have been implemented on a general basis by 2020. As a result of the PRC Labour Contract Law, the Regulations on Paid Annual Leave for Employees and the National Leisure and Tourism Outline 2013-2020, the Group's labour costs (inclusive of those incurred by contractors) may increase. Further, under the PRC Labour Contract Law, when an employer terminates its PRC employees' employment, the employer may be required to compensate them for such amount which is determined based on their length of service with the employer, and the employer may not be able to efficiently terminate non-fixed-term employment contracts under the PRC Labour Contract Law without cause. In the event the Group decides to significantly change or decrease its workforce, the PRC Labour Contract Law could adversely affect its ability to effect these changes in a cost-effective manner or in the manner that the Group desires, which could result in an adverse impact on the Group's businesses, financial condition and results of operations. In addition, inflation in the PRC has increased in recent years. According to the National Bureau of Statistics of the PRC, consumer price inflation in the PRC was 2.9 per cent. and 2.5 per cent. in 2019 and 2020, respectively. Inflation in the PRC increases the costs of labour and the costs of raw materials the Group must purchase for production. Rising labour costs may increase the Group's operating costs and partially erode the cost advantage of the Group's PRC-based operations and therefore negatively impact the Group's profitability.

Risks Relating to Notes denominated in RMB ("RMB Notes")

The RMB is not freely convertible; there are significant restrictions on remittance of RMB into and outside the PRC.

The RMB is not freely convertible at present. The PRC government continues to regulate conversion between the RMB and foreign currencies, including the Hong Kong dollar, despite the significant reduction over the years by the PRC government of control over trade transactions involving import and export of goods and services as well as other frequent routine foreign exchange transactions. These transactions are known as current account items. Currently, participating banks in Hong Kong and a number of other jurisdiction (the "Applicable Jurisdiction") have been permitted to engage in the settlement of current account trade transactions in Renminbi.

However, remittance of Renminbi by foreign investors into and out of the PRC for purposes such as capital contributions, known as capital account items, is generally only permitted upon obtaining specific approvals from or registration with the relevant authorities and subject to a strict monitoring systems. Regulations in the PRC on the remittance of Renminbi into the PRC for settlement of capital account items are developing gradually.

Although starting from 1 October 2016, the Renminbi has been added to the Special Drawing Rights basket created by the International Monetary Fund and policies further improving accessibility to Renminbi to settle cross-border transactions in foreign currencies were implemented by the PBOC in 2018, there is no assurance that the PRC government will liberalise the control over cross-border Renminbi remittances in the future or that new regulations in the PRC will not be promulgated in the future which have the effect of restricting or eliminating the remittance of Renminbi into or outside the PRC. In the event that funds cannot be repatriated outside the PRC in Renminbi, HKCG will need to source Renminbi offshore to finance its obligations under the Notes, and its ability to do so will be subject to the overall availability of Renminbi outside the PRC.

There is only limited availability of RMB outside the PRC, which may affect the liquidity of the RMB Notes and HKCG's ability to source RMB outside the PRC to service such RMB Notes.

As a result of the restrictions by the PRC government on cross-border RMB fund flows, the availability of RMB outside the PRC is limited.

Currently, licensed banks in Singapore and Hong Kong may offer limited RMB-denominated banking services to Singapore residents, Hong Kong residents and specified business customers. The PBOC has also established a RMB clearing and settlement system for participating banks in the Applicable Jurisdictions through settlement agreement (the "Settlement Agreement") on the Clearing of RMB Business with financial institutions in a number of financial centres and cities (each, a "RMB Clearing Bank") and these RMB Clearing Banks have been permitted to engage in the settlement of RMB trade transactions.

RMB business participating banks do not have direct RMB liquidity support from PBOC. The relevant RMB Clearing Bank only has access to onshore liquidity support from PBOC to square open positions of participating banks for limited types of transactions. The relevant RMB Clearing Bank is not obliged to square for participating banks any open positions resulting from other foreign exchange transactions or conversion services and the participating banks will need to source RMB from the offshore market to square such open positions.

Although it is expected that the offshore RMB market will continue to grow in depth and size, its growth is subject to many constraints as a result of PRC laws and regulations on foreign exchange. There is no assurance that new PRC regulations will not be promulgated or the Settlement Agreement will not be terminated or amended in the future which will have the effect of restricting availability of RMB offshore.

The limited availability of RMB outside the PRC may affect the liquidity of the Notes. To the extent HKCG is required to source RMB in the offshore market to service the Notes, there is no assurance that HKCG will be able to source such RMB on satisfactory terms, if at all.

Investment in the Notes is subject to exchange rate risks.

The Issuer will make all payments of interest and principal with respect to the RMB Notes in Renminbi unless otherwise specified. The value of Renminbi against other foreign currencies fluctuates from time to time and is affected by changes in the PRC and international political and economic conditions as well as many other factors. In August 2015, the PBOC implemented changes to the way it calculates the midpoint against the U.S. dollar to take into account market-maker quotes before announcing the daily midpoint. This change, among others that may be implemented, may increase the volatility in the value of the Renminbi against other currencies. In January and February 2016, Renminbi experienced further fluctuation in value against the U.S. dollar. With an increased floating range of the Renminbi's value against foreign currencies and a more market-oriented mechanism for determining the mid-point exchange rates, the Renminbi may further appreciate or depreciate significantly in value against the U.S. dollar or other foreign currencies in the long-term. As a result, the value of these RMB payments may

vary with the changes in prevailing exchange rates in the marketplace. If the value of RMB depreciates against the U.S. dollar or other foreign currencies, the value of investment in U.S. dollar or other applicable foreign currency terms will decline.

Investment in RMB Notes is subject to interest rate risks.

The PRC government has gradually liberalised the regulation of interest rates in recent years. Further liberalisation may increase interest rate volatility. The RMB Notes may carry a fixed interest rate. Consequently, the trading price of such RMB Notes will vary with fluctuations in interest rates. If a holder of RMB Notes tries to sell any RMB Notes before their maturity, they may receive an offer that is less than the amount invested.

Payments in respect of the RMB Notes will only be made to investors in the manner specified in the RMB Notes.

Investors may be required to provide certificates and other information (including Renminbi account information) in order to be allowed to receive payments in Renminbi in accordance with the Renminbi clearing and settlement system for participating banks in Hong Kong. All Renminbi payments to investors in respect of the RMB Notes will be made solely (i) whilst the RMB Notes are represented by a Global Note deposited with a sub-custodian for CMU, by transfer to a RMB bank account maintained in Hong Kong in accordance with prevailing CMU rules and procedures, (ii) for so long as the RMB Notes are represented by a Global Note held with the common depositary for Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg or any alternative clearing systems, by transfer to a RMB bank account maintained in Hong Kong or a financial centre in which an RMB Clearing Bank clears and settle Renminbi, if so specified in the final terms, in accordance with prevailing Euroclear and/or Clearstream, Luxembourg rules and procedures, or (iii) for so long as the Notes are in definitive form, by transfer to a RMB bank account maintained in Hong Kong or a financial centre in which an RMB Clearing Bank clears and settles Renminbi, if so specified in the final terms in accordance with prevailing rules and regulations.

Investment in Notes may be subject to PRC tax.

In considering whether to invest in the Notes, investors should consult their individual tax advisers with regard to the application of PRC tax laws to their particular situations as well as any tax consequences arising under the laws of any other tax jurisdictions. The value of the Noteholder's investment in the Notes may be materially and adversely affected if the Noteholder is required to pay PRC tax with respect to acquiring, holding or disposing of and receiving payments under those Notes.

Factors that may affect the Issuer's ability to fulfil its obligations under the Notes

The Notes will be effectively subordinated to debt of HKCG's subsidiaries as well as its own debt.

In addition to operating itself, HKCG is also a holding company that operates through its subsidiaries and other Group entities. As a result, (i) HKCG's obligations under the Notes will be effectively subordinated to all existing and future obligations of the existing or future Group entities and (ii) all claims of creditors of the existing or future subsidiaries or other Group entities, including trade creditors, lenders and all other creditors, and rights of holders of preferred shares of such entities (if any) will have priority as to the assets of such entities over HKCG's claims and those of its creditors, including the holders of Notes. As at 31 December 2020, HKCG's total outstanding indebtedness was approximately HK\$42,139 million.

The Issuer is dependent on the business and financial condition of HKCG and its subsidiaries and other Group entities to make payments under the Notes.

The Issuer is a wholly owned subsidiary of HKCG formed for the principal purposes of financing the Group's operations and will on-lend all or part of the proceeds from the issue of the Notes to HKCG and its subsidiaries and other Group entities. The Issuer's ability to make payments under the Notes depends on timely payments under such on-lent loans and the availability of funds from HKCG and its subsidiaries and other Group entities. In the event that HKCG and its subsidiaries or other Group

entities do not make such payments due to limitation in such loans or other agreements, lack of available cash flow or other factors, the Issuer's ability to make payments under the Notes could be adversely affected.

The Issuer may be unable to redeem the Notes.

On certain dates, including a Put Event and at maturity of the Notes, the Issuer may, and at maturity, will be required to, redeem all the Notes. If such an event were to occur, the Issuer may not have sufficient cash and may not be able to arrange financing to redeem the Notes in time, or on acceptable terms, or at all. The ability to redeem the Notes in such event may also be limited by the terms of other debt instruments. Failure to repay, or redeem tendered Notes by the Issuer would constitute an event of default, which may also constitute a default under the terms of other indebtedness of HKCG.

Considerations which are material for the purpose of assessing the market risks associated with the Notes issued under the Programme

Notes may not be a suitable investment for all investors.

Each potential investor in any Notes must determine the suitability of that investment in light of its own circumstances. In particular, each potential investor should:

- (i) have sufficient knowledge and experience to make a meaningful evaluation of the relevant Notes, the merits and risks of investing in the relevant Notes and the information contained or incorporated by reference in this Offering Circular or any applicable supplement;
- (ii) have access to, and knowledge of, appropriate analytical tools to evaluate, in the context of its particular financial situation, an investment in the relevant Notes and the impact such investment will have on its overall investment portfolio;
- (iii) have sufficient financial resources and liquidity to bear all of the risks of an investment in the relevant Notes, including where principal or interest is payable in one or more currencies, or where the currency for principal or interest payments is different from the potential investor's currency;
- (iv) understand thoroughly the terms of the relevant Notes and be familiar with the behaviour of any relevant indices and financial markets; and
- (v) be able to evaluate (either alone or with the help of a financial adviser) possible scenarios for economic, interest rate and other factors that may affect its investment and its ability to bear the applicable risks.

Some Notes may be complex financial instruments and such instruments may be purchased as a way to reduce risk or enhance yield with an understood, measured, appropriate addition of risk to their overall portfolios. A potential investor should not invest in Notes which are complex financial instruments unless it has the expertise (either alone or with the help of a financial adviser) to evaluate how the Notes will perform under changing conditions, the resulting effects on the value of such Notes and the impact this investment will have on the potential investor's overall investment portfolio.

The regulation and reform of "benchmarks" may adversely affect the value of Notes linked to or referencing such "benchmarks".

Interest rates and indices which are deemed to be or used as "benchmarks", (including the London interbank offered rate ("LIBOR") and the euro interbank offered rate ("EURIBOR")) are the subject of recent national and international regulatory guidance and proposals for reform. Some of these reforms are already effective whilst others are still to be implemented. These reforms may cause such benchmarks to perform differently than in the past, to disappear entirely, or have other consequences which cannot be predicted. Any such consequence could have a material adverse effect on any Notes referencing such a benchmark.

Regulation (EU) 2016/1011 (the "EU Benchmarks Regulation") applies, subject to certain transitional provisions, to the provision of benchmarks, the contribution of input data to a benchmark and the use of a benchmark within the EU. Among other things, it (i) requires benchmark administrators to be authorised or registered (or, if non-EU-based, to be subject to an equivalent regime or otherwise recognised or endorsed) and (ii) prevents certain uses by EU supervised entities of benchmarks of administrators that are not authorised or registered (or, if non-EU based, not deemed equivalent or recognised or endorsed). Regulation (EU) 2016/1011 as it forms part of domestic law by virtue of the European Union (Withdrawal) Act 2018 (the "UK Benchmarks Regulation") among other things, applies to the provision of benchmarks and the use of a benchmark in the UK. Similarly, it prohibits the use in the UK by UK supervised entities of benchmarks of administrators that are not authorised by the FCA or registered on the FCA register (or, if non-UK based, not deemed equivalent or recognised or endorsed).

The EU Benchmarks Regulation and/or the UK Benchmarks Regulation, as applicable, could have a material impact on any Notes linked to or referencing a benchmark in particular, if the methodology or other terms of the benchmark are changed in order to comply with the requirements of the EU Benchmarks Regulation and/or the UK Benchmarks Regulation, as applicable. Such changes could, among other things, have the effect of reducing, increasing or otherwise affecting the volatility of the published rate or level of the relevant benchmark.

More broadly, any of the international or national reforms, or the general increased regulatory scrutiny of benchmarks, could increase the costs and risks of administering or otherwise participating in the setting of a benchmark and complying with any such regulations or requirements.

Specifically, the sustainability of LIBOR has been questioned as a result of the absence of relevant active underlying markets and possible disincentives (including as a result of benchmark reforms) for market participants to continue contributing to such benchmarks. The UK Financial Conduct Authority ("FCA") has indicated through a series of announcements that the continuation of LIBOR on the current basis cannot and will not be guaranteed after 2021.

Separately, the euro risk free-rate working group for the euro area has published a set of guiding principles and high level recommendations for fallback provisions in, amongst other things, new euro denominated cash products (including bonds) referencing EURIBOR. The guiding principles indicate, among other things, that continuing to reference EURIBOR in relevant contracts (without robust fallback provisions) may increase the risk to the euro area financial system.

The potential elimination of the LIBOR benchmark or any other benchmark, or changes in the manner of administration of any benchmark, could require an adjustment to the terms and conditions, or result in other consequences, in respect of any Notes linked to such benchmark (including but not limited to Floating Rate Notes whose interest rates are linked to LIBOR). Such factors may have the following effects on certain benchmarks: (i) discouraging market participants from continuing to administer or contribute to a benchmark; (ii) triggering changes in the rules or methodologies used in the benchmark and/or (iii) leading to the disappearance of the benchmark. Any of the above changes or any other consequential changes as a result of international or national reforms or other initiatives or investigations, could have a material adverse effect on the value of and return on any Notes linked to or referencing a benchmark.

The Terms and Conditions of Notes provide for certain fallback arrangements in the event that LIBOR and/or any page on which such benchmark may be published (or any other successor service) becomes unavailable or a Benchmark Event (as defined in the Terms and Conditions) otherwise occurs. Such fallback arrangements include the possibility that the Rate of Interest could be set by reference to a Successor Rate or an Alternative Reference Rate (both as defined in the Terms and Conditions), with or without the application of an adjustment spread and may include amendments to the Terms and Conditions of the Notes to ensure the proper operation of the successor or replacement benchmark, all as determined by the Issuer (acting in good faith and in consultation with an Independent Adviser). An adjustment spread, if applied could be positive or negative and would be applied with a view to reducing or eliminating, to the fullest extent reasonably practicable in the circumstances, any economic prejudice or benefit (as applicable) to investors arising out of the replacement of the relevant benchmark. However, it may not be possible to determine or apply an adjustment spread and even if an adjustment is applied, such adjustment spread may not be effective to reduce or eliminate economic

prejudice to investors. If no adjustment spread can be determined, a Successor Rate or Alternative Reference Rate may nonetheless be used to determine the Rate of Interest. The use of a Successor Rate or Alternative Reference Rate (including with the application of an adjustment spread) will still result in any Notes linked to or referencing a Reference Rate performing differently (which may include payment of a lower Rate of Interest) than they would if the relevant benchmark were to continue to apply in its current form.

If, following the occurrence of a Benchmark Event, no Successor Rate or Alternative Reference Rate is determined, the ultimate fallback for the purposes of calculation of the Rate of Interest for a particular Interest Period may result in the Rate of Interest for the last preceding Interest Period being used. This may result in the effective application of a fixed rate for Floating Rate Notes based on the rate which was last observed on the Relevant Screen Page. Due to the uncertainty concerning the availability of Successor Rates and Alternative Reference Rates, the involvement of an Independent Adviser and the potential for further regulatory developments, there is a risk that the relevant fallback provisions may not operate as intended at the relevant time

Investors should consult their own independent advisers and make their own assessment about the potential risks imposed by the EU Benchmarks Regulation and/or the UK Benchmarks Regulation, as applicable, or any of the international or national reforms in making any investment decision with respect to any Notes linked to or referencing a benchmark.

Future discontinuance of LIBOR may adversely affect the value of Floating Rate Notes which reference LIBOR.

On 27 July 2017, the chief executive of the FCA, which regulates LIBOR, announced that it does not intend to continue to persuade, or use its powers to compel, panel banks to submit rates for the calculation of LIBOR to the administrator of LIBOR after 2021. On 5 March 2021, the FCA announced the future cessation or loss of representatives of the 35 LIBOR benchmark settings currently published by ICE Benchmark Administration ("IBA"), the administrator of LIBOR, after taking into account the results of the consultation conducted by the IBA that closed on 25 January 2021 (the "FCA Announcement"). The FCA will now consult on requiring the IBA to continue to publish certain LIBOR settings for a further period on a changed methodology (also known as a 'synthetic') basis. However, following the FCA Announcement, it is now clear that all 35 LIBOR settings will either cease to be provided or no longer be representative after the respective dates set out in such FCA Announcement. This may cause LIBOR to perform differently than it did in the past and may have other consequences that cannot be predicted.

Investors should be aware that, if LIBOR were discontinued or otherwise unavailable, the rate of interest on Floating Rate Notes which reference LIBOR will be determined for the relevant period by the fallback provisions applicable to such Notes. Depending on the manner in which the LIBOR rate is to be determined under the Terms and Conditions of the Notes, this may in certain circumstances (i) be reliant upon the provision by reference banks of offered quotations for the LIBOR rate which, depending on market circumstances, may not be available at the relevant time or (ii) result in the effective application of a fixed rate based on the rate which applied in the previous period when LIBOR was available. Any of the foregoing could have an adverse effect on the value or liquidity of, and return on, any Floating Rate Notes which reference LIBOR.

Risks related to the structure of a particular issue of Notes

A wide range of Notes may be issued under the Programme. A number of these Notes may have features which contain particular risks for potential investors. Set out below is a description of certain such features:

Notes subject to optional redemption by the Issuer.

An optional redemption feature is likely to limit the market value of Notes. During any period when the Issuer may elect to redeem Notes, the market value of those Notes generally will not rise substantially above the price at which they can be redeemed. This also may be true prior to any redemption period.

The Issuer may be expected to redeem Notes when its cost of borrowing is lower than the interest rate on the Notes. At those times, an investor generally would not be able to reinvest the redemption proceeds at an effective interest rate as high as the interest rate on the Notes being redeemed and may only be able to do so at a significantly lower rate. Potential investors should consider reinvestment risk in light of other investments available at that time.

Index Linked Notes and Dual Currency Notes.

The Issuer may issue Notes with principal or interest determined by reference to an index or formula, to changes in the prices of securities or commodities, to movements in currency exchange rates or other factors (each, a "Relevant Factor"). In addition, the Issuer may issue Notes with principal or interest payable in one or more currencies which may be different from the currency in which the Notes are denominated. Potential investors should be aware that:

- (i) the market price of such Notes may be volatile;
- (ii) they may receive no interest;
- (iii) payment of principal or interest may occur at a different time or in a different currency than expected;
- (iv) the amount of principal payable at redemption may be less than the nominal amount of such Notes or even zero:
- (v) a Relevant Factor may be subject to significant fluctuations that may not correlate with changes in interest rates, currencies or other indices;
- (vi) if a Relevant Factor is applied to Notes in conjunction with a multiplier greater than one or contains some other leverage factor, the effect of changes in the Relevant Factor on principal or interest payable likely will be magnified; and
- (vii) the timing of changes in a Relevant Factor may affect the actual yield to investors, even if the average level is consistent with their expectations. In general, the earlier the change in the Relevant Factor, the greater the effect on yield.

The historical experience of an index should not be viewed as an indication of the future performance of such index during the term of any Index Linked Notes. Accordingly, each potential investor should consult its own financial and legal advisers about the risk entailed by an investment in any Index Linked Notes and the suitability of such Notes in light of its particular circumstances.

Partly-paid Notes.

The Issuer may issue Notes where the issue price is payable in more than one instalment. Failure to pay any subsequent instalment could result in an investor losing all of its investment.

Variable rate Notes with a multiplier or other leverage factor.

Notes with variable interest rates can be volatile investments. If they are structured to include multipliers or other leverage factors, or caps or floors, or any combination of those features or other similar related features, their market values may be even more volatile than those for securities that do not include those features.

Inverse Floating Rate Notes.

Inverse Floating Rate Notes have an interest rate equal to a fixed rate minus a rate based upon a reference rate such as LIBOR. The market values of such Notes typically are more volatile than market values of other conventional floating rate debt securities based on the same reference rate (and with otherwise comparable terms). Inverse Floating Rate Notes are more volatile because an increase in the reference rate not only decreases the interest rate of the Notes, but may also reflect an increase in prevailing interest rates, which further adversely affects the market value of these Notes.

Fixed/Floating Rate Notes.

Fixed/Floating Rate Notes may bear interest at a rate that the Issuer may elect to convert from a fixed rate to a floating rate, or from a floating rate to a fixed rate. The Issuer's ability to convert the interest rate will affect the secondary market and the market value of such Notes since the Issuer may be expected to convert the rate when it is likely to produce a lower overall cost of borrowing. If the Issuer converts from a fixed rate to a floating rate, the spread on the Fixed/Floating Rate Notes may be less favourable than then prevailing spreads on comparable Floating Rate Notes tied to the same reference rate. In addition, the new floating rate at any time may be lower than the rates on other Notes. If the Issuer converts from a floating rate to a fixed rate, the fixed rate may be lower than then prevailing rates on its Notes.

Notes issued at a substantial discount or premium.

The market values of securities issued at a substantial discount or premium to their nominal amount tend to fluctuate more in relation to general changes in interest rates than do prices for conventional interest-bearing securities. Generally, the longer the remaining term of the securities, the greater the price volatility as compared to conventional interest-bearing securities with comparable maturities.

Risks related to Notes generally

Modification and waivers.

The Conditions of the Notes contain provisions for calling meetings of Noteholders to consider matters affecting their interests generally. These provisions permit defined majorities to bind all Noteholders including Noteholders who did not attend and vote at the relevant meeting and Noteholders who voted in a manner contrary to the majority.

Change of law.

The Conditions of the Notes are based on English law in effect as at the date of issue of the relevant Notes. No assurance can be given as to the impact of any possible judicial decision or change to English law or administrative practice after the date of issue of the relevant Notes.

Notes where denominations involve integral multiples: definitive Notes.

In relation to any issue of Notes which have denominations consisting of a minimum Specified Denomination plus one or more higher integral multiples of another smaller amount, it is possible that such Notes may be traded in amounts that are not integral multiples of such minimum Specified Denomination. In such a case a holder who, as a result of trading such amounts, holds an amount which is less than the minimum Specified Denomination in his account with the relevant clearing system at the relevant time may not receive a definitive Note in respect of such holding (should definitive Notes be printed) and would need to purchase a principal amount of Notes such that its holding amounts to a Specified Denomination.

If definitive Notes are issued, holders should be aware that definitive Notes which have a denomination that is not an integral multiple of the minimum Specified Denomination may be illiquid and difficult to trade.

If the Issuer does not satisfy the Issuer's obligations under the Notes, Noteholders' remedies will be limited.

Payment of principal of the Notes may be accelerated only in the event of certain events involving the Issuer's bankruptcy, winding-up or dissolution or similar events or otherwise if certain conditions have been satisfied. See "Terms and Conditions of the Notes – Events of Default".

The Notes are subject to restrictions on resales and transfers.

The Notes and the Guarantees have not been and will not be registered under the Securities Act or any state securities laws, and the Notes may not be offered or sold within the United States except pursuant to an exemption from, or in a transaction not subject to, the registration requirements of the Securities Act and applicable state securities laws. Accordingly, the Notes may be offered and sold only pursuant to offers and sales that occur outside the United States in compliance with Regulation S.

Risks related to the market generally

Set out below is a brief description of certain market risks, including liquidity risk, exchange rate risk, interest rate risk and credit risk:

The secondary market generally.

Notes issued under the Programme will be new securities which may not be widely distributed and Notes may have no established trading market when issued, and one may never develop. If a market does develop, it may not be liquid. Therefore, investors may not be able to sell their Notes easily or at prices that will provide them with a yield comparable to similar investments that have a developed secondary market. This is particularly the case for Notes that are especially sensitive to interest rate, currency or market risks, are designed for specific investment objectives or strategies or have been structured to meet the investment requirements of limited categories of investors. These types of Notes generally would have a more limited secondary market and more price volatility than conventional debt securities. Illiquidity may have a severely adverse effect on the market value of Notes.

Exchange rate risks and exchange controls.

The Issuer will pay principal and interest on the Notes and HKCG will make payments under the Guarantee in the Specified Currency. This presents certain risks relating to currency conversions if an investor's financial activities are denominated principally in a currency or currency unit (the "Investor's Currency") other than the Specified Currency. These include the risk that exchange rates may significantly change (including changes due to devaluation of the Specified Currency or revaluation of the Investor's Currency) and the risk that authorities with jurisdiction over the Investor's Currency may impose or modify exchange controls. An appreciation in the value of the Investor's Currency relative to the Specified Currency would decrease (1) the Investor's Currency-equivalent yield on the Notes, (2) the Investor's Currency equivalent value of the principal payable on the Notes and (3) the Investor's Currency equivalent market value of the Notes.

Government and monetary authorities may impose (as some have done in the past) exchange controls that could adversely affect an applicable exchange rate. As a result, investors may receive less interest or principal than expected, or no interest or principal.

Interest rate risks.

Investment in Fixed Rate Notes involves the risk that subsequent changes in market interest rates may adversely affect the value of Fixed Rate Notes.

Credit ratings may not reflect all risks.

One or more independent credit rating agencies may assign credit ratings to an issue of Notes. The ratings may not reflect the potential impact of all risks related to structure, market, additional factors discussed above, and other factors that may affect the value of the Notes. A credit rating is not a recommendation to buy, sell or hold securities and may be revised or withdrawn by the rating agency at any time.

Legal investment considerations may restrict certain investments

The investment activities of certain investors are subject to legal investment laws and regulations, or review or regulation by certain authorities. Each potential investor should consult its legal advisers to determine whether and to what extent (1) Notes are legal investments for it, (2) Notes can be used as collateral for various types of borrowing and (3) other restrictions apply to its purchase or pledge of any Notes. Financial institutions should consult their legal advisers or the appropriate regulators to determine the appropriate treatment of Notes under any applicable risk-based capital or similar rules.

DESCRIPTION OF THE ISSUER

The Issuer, a wholly owned subsidiary of HKCG, was incorporated with limited liability under the laws of Hong Kong on 21 November 2005. Its registered office is located at 23rd Floor, 363 Java Road, North Point, Hong Kong. The Issuer, whose primary purpose is to act as a financing subsidiary of HKCG, will remain a wholly owned subsidiary of HKCG as long as the Notes are outstanding and will utilise the net proceeds of the Notes as set out in "Use of Proceeds".

The directors of the Issuer are Mr. Chan Wing-kin, Mr. John Ho Hon-ming, Mr. Lo Wing-keung (as Alternate Director to Mr. Chan Wing-kin) and Mr. Chan Wai-keung (as Alternate Director to Mr. John Ho Hon-ming). The below lists the names, titles and professional experience of the Issuer's present Directors (except Alternate Directors) and the dates of their respective appointments.

Mr. Chan Wing-kin was appointed as a Director of the Issuer on 29 November 2005. He is also the Managing Director of HKCG. Mr. Chan was appointed to the Board of Directors (the "Board") of HKCG in January 1997 and as the Managing Director in May 1997. Mr. Chan is a director of major local and overseas subsidiary companies of HKCG. He is also the Chairman and President of Hong Kong & China Gas Investment Limited, HKCG's investment holding company in the PRC, and chairman, vice chairman or a director of a number of project companies in the PRC. Mr. Chan is the Chairman of Towngas China Company Limited, the Vice Chairman of Shenzhen Gas Corporation Ltd. and Foran Energy Group Co., Ltd. (formerly known as Foshan Gas Group Co., Ltd.), and was previously a Non-executive Director of the tenth session of the board of directors of Shanghai Dazhong Public Utilities (Group) Co., Ltd., all of which are listed public companies. He is an Honorary President of The Hong Kong Management Association and a Vice Chairman of China Gas Association. Mr. Chan is a Member of the Standing Committee on Judicial Salaries and Conditions of Service of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (the "HKSAR"). He was previously the Deputy Chairman of the Council of The Hong Kong Institute of Education (now known as The Education University of Hong Kong) and a Member of the Board of Stewards of The Education University of Hong Kong Foundation. Mr. Chan received the Executive Award under the DHL/SCMP Hong Kong Business Awards 2005, the Director of the Year Awards - Listed Companies (SEHK -Hang Seng Index Constituents) Executive Directors from The Hong Kong Institute of Directors in 2006, the Leadership Award in Gas Industry Award 2015 from the Institution of Gas Engineers & Managers and the Energy and Utilities Alliance of the United Kingdom, "The CEO of the Year 2017" Award from China Newsweek in 2017 and was named consecutively as one of "The 100 Best-Performing CEOs in the World" by Harvard Business Review from 2015 to 2019. He was awarded an Honorary Fellowship by The Hong Kong Institute of Education (now known as The Education University of Hong Kong) in 2016. Mr. Chan, a Chartered Engineer, is also Honorary Fellow of the Energy Institute of the United Kingdom, Fellow of The Hong Kong Institution of Engineers, Fellow of The Institution of Mechanical Engineers, Fellow of the Institution of Gas Engineers & Managers of the United Kingdom and Honorary Fellow of International Institute of Utility Specialists.

Mr. John Ho Hon-ming was appointed as a Director of the Issuer on 1 July 2008. He is also the Executive Director, Chief Financial Officer and Company Secretary of HKCG. He was appointed to the Board of HKCG in October 2020. He was appointed as an Executive Director and the Company Secretary of Towngas China in March 2007. He holds directorships in various subsidiaries of HKCG. Mr. Ho is a director of Changchun Gas Co., Ltd., Shenzhen Gas Corporation Ltd. and Foran Energy Group Co., Ltd. (formerly known as Foshan Gas Group Co., Ltd.), all of which are listed public companies. He is the Vice Chairman of the General Committee of the Chamber of Hong Kong Listed Companies and the Vice Chairman of the Taxation Committee of the Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce. He is a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales, a Fellow of the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and a Fellow of the Hong Kong Institute of Directors. Mr. Ho graduated from the University of Manchester in the United Kingdom with an honourable Bachelor of Arts degree in Economics and Social Studies (Accounting and Finance). He completed the Advanced Management Program from Harvard Business School in the United States, the Senior Executive Program offered by Harvard Business School, Tsinghua University School of Economics and Management and China Europe International Business School, and the Chief Executive Program from Singapore Institute of Management. Mr. Ho has over 42 years of experience in accounting, corporate finance and investments.

The Issuer does not have any employees or subsidiaries.

The issued share capital of the Issuer is HK\$100, divided into 100 ordinary shares. No part of the equity securities of the Issuer is listed or dealt on any stock exchange and no listing or permission to deal in such securities is being or is proposed to be sought.

In May 2009, the Issuer established the Programme which was updated in May 2012 with the size increased to U.S.\$2 billion. In November 2017, under the Programme, the Issuer issued its inaugural green bonds based on a newly established Towngas Green Bond Framework, which was prepared in accordance with the Green Bond Principles 2017 of the International Capital Market Association. The inaugural 10-year green bonds, amounting to HK\$600 million and JPY2 billion, has allowed it to tap into a new base of green bond investors as an additional funding source for financing the Group's environmentally green projects under the Towngas Green Bond Framework. In July 2019 the Programme was updated with the size increased to U.S.\$3 billion. As at 31 December 2020, the Issuer issued notes in the total amount of HK\$20,742 million with maturity terms of 3 to 40 years in Australian dollar, Japanese yen, Renminbi and Hong Kong dollar under the Programme.

Since 30 April 2009, the Issuer has included its audited annual financial statements in its annual return to be filed with the Companies Registry of Hong Kong. The Issuer's financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2020 were audited by PricewaterhouseCoopers, its independent auditor.

Except as disclosed above, there has been no material change in HKCG's consolidated capitalisation and indebtedness since 31 December 2020. HKCG usually pays dividends twice annually, and occasionally issues bonus shares to its shareholders. For the year ended 31 December 2020, HKCG paid interim and proposed final dividends of a total of HK\$6,220.0 million at HK\$0.35 per ordinary share.

RELATIONSHIP WITH THE GOVERNMENT

Hong Kong

HKCG does not hold any concession or franchise granted by the Hong Kong government for HKCG's gas supply business in Hong Kong.

HKCG is a registered gas supply company under the Gas Safety (Registration of Gas Supply Companies) Regulations (the "Regulations") under the Gas Safety Ordinance (Cap. 51 of the Laws of Hong Kong). HKCG possesses a certificate of registration as a gas supply company first issued by Hong Kong's Gas Authority on 20 February 1992 as evidence of such registration under the Regulations. The registration remains valid unless cancelled or suspended. HKCG is also a registered gas contractor under the Gas Safety (Registration of Gas Installers and Gas Contractors) Regulations under the Gas Safety Ordinance. HKCG possesses a certificate of registration as a gas contractor issued by the Hong Kong Gas Authority on 16 December 1994, as evidence of such registration. The registration remains valid unless cancelled or suspended.

The Regulations contain provisions regarding the general self-regulating duty of every registered gas supply company, so far as is reasonably practicable, to ensure the work-related health and safety of all its employees and to conduct its operations in a manner consistent with public safety with respect to gas-related risks. In addition to the Gas Safety Ordinance and related regulations, the gas supply operations of HKCG are also subject to codes of practise in relation to gas safety issued by the Gas Authority.

On 3 April 1997, HKCG voluntarily entered into a three-year Information and Consultation Agreement (the "ICA") with the Hong Kong government, which has subsequently been extended seven times for a term of three years each. The current ICA came into effect for a period of three years with effect from 3 April 2021. The purpose of the ICA is to increase the transparency of HKCG's tariff and fixed monthly maintenance charge setting mechanism, and adjustments thereto. The ICA outlines certain procedures for HKCG to consult the Hong Kong government in the event of tariff or fixed monthly maintenance charge adjustments and major system additions that have the effect of increasing HKCG's total fixed assets by a substantial increment. Under the ICA, HKCG is also required to provide the Hong Kong government with a written statement containing specified categories of information relating to financial, operational, environmental and safety matters, and to make available the information to the general public on an annual basis. Except as provided under the ICA, HKCG is not subject to any price or profit regulation by the Hong Kong government.

HKCG has been granted certain easements, licences and way leaves by the Hong Kong government to allow HKCG's gas pipeline network to pass-through public areas in a number of places in Hong Kong. HKCG has also been granted certain licences by the Hong Kong government to lay cables, ducts and fibres for the purpose of provision of fixed telecommunication network services inside HKCG's low pressure system.

PRC

HKCG's project companies in the PRC are required to comply with laws, regulations and administrative measures regulating the gas and water supply industries as well as coal industry.

Gas Industry

On 19 November 2010, the State Council issued the Fuel Gas Regulations, which became effective on 1 March 2011 and was amended on 6 February 2016, to regulate the fuel gas (including, but not limited to, natural gas, manufactured gas, and LPG) industry, such as fuel gas operation and services, use of fuel gas, protection of fuel gas facilities, the prevention and handling of accidents concerning fuel gas safety and related activities. Pursuant to the Fuel Gas Regulations, an enterprise which carries on fuel gas operation business in the PRC must meet the following requirements to obtain a fuel gas operation licence from the local government at or above the county level in charge of gas administration:

(1) conforming to the fuel gas development planning requirements, having gas sources and gas facilities that meet national standards,

- (2) having fixed business premises, a safety management system and a sound management plan,
- (3) assigning a principal responsible person from the enterprise, personnel for the administration of production safety and operation and personnel for maintenance and repair who have received professional training and passed relevant examinations, and
- (4) other requirements provided by PRC laws, rules and regulations.

On 19 November 2014, the MOHURD published the "Administrative Measures on the Fuel Gas Operation Licence and Administrative Measures on the Professional Training and Assessment for the Employees of the Fuel Gas Operation Enterprise" (《關於印發 < 燃氣經營許可管理辦法 > 和 < 燃氣經營 企業從業人員專業培訓考核管理辦法 > 的通知》,the "Fuel Gas Measures"),to strengthen the administration of the fuel gas operation licence.

According to the Fuel Gas Measures, the enterprise shall obtain fuel gas operation licence for gas operation and shall apply for relevant changes of such licence when its name, registered address or its legal representative changed. Particularly, if the legal representative changes, the new legal representative shall obtain the Qualification Certificate for the Professional Training and Assessment of Personnel in Fuel Gas Operation. In addition, if (i) the operation categories, operation areas or supply modes changes, or (ii) the division or merger of the enterprise happens, such enterprise shall reapply for the gas operation licence.

From 10 June 2018, the PRC government has formally aligned the reference residential gate price with reference non-residential gate price, allowing the former to increase by no more than RMB0.35 per cubic meter in 2018. The actual residential price will be determined via negotiation, but it will not exceed 20 per cent. of the increased reference price, instead of being capped at the reference price of previous level.

Water Supply Industry

HKCG's subsidiaries and joint ventures in the water supply industry are principally governed under the following laws and regulations:

Under the "Circular on Establishing and Approval Items that Really Need to Be Preserved" (《國務院對確需保留的行政審批專案設定行政許可的決定》) issued by the State Council on 29 June 2004 and amended on 29 January 2009 and other relevant regulations, water supply enterprises should obtain Hygiene Permits (《衛生許可證》) from the hygiene authorities at the county or city (with districts) level. The qualification verification procedures with competent local construction authorities pursuant to the "Regulations on Urban Water Supply" (《城市供水條例》), which became effective as at 1 October 1994, was abolished under Guo Fa 2002 No. 24.

Concession Administration

HKCG's project companies as urban gas operators or water suppliers are required to operate under a concession system according to the "Opinions on Accelerating the Market Pace of Urban Public Utilities" (《關於加快市政公用行業市場化進程的意見》) issued by the MOC on 27 December 2002.

Pursuant to the MOC's "Administrative Measures on Municipal Utility Concession" (《市政公用事業特許經營管理辦法》) (the Concession Measures) effective as at 1 May 2004 and as amended on 4 May 2015, HKCG's project companies in the gas and water supply industries should obtain concession rights (特許經營權) from the municipal utility authorities at the county or municipality level. According to the Concession Measures, the utility concession usually is granted by public bidding or other legal means. HKCG's project companies should enter into concession agreements with local governments on an exclusive basis which specifies, among other details the geographical area delineated, business activities carried on (such as the distribution of piped city-gas, products and/or services provided) and the related pricing mechanism. Generally, the maximum concession period of HKCG's project companies will not exceed 30 years and is dependent on the operation model, investment structures and business activities, size of operation and service provided.

On 25 April 2015, the NDRC, the Ministry of Finance, the MOHURD, the Ministry of Transport, the Ministry of Water Resources and the PBOC jointly promulgated the "Measures for the Administration of Concession for Infrastructure and Public Utilities" (《基礎設施和公用事業特許經營管理辦法》) which took effect from 1 June 2015, to encourage using social capital in the infrastructure and public utilities for the protection of the public benefits and safety. The government authorities in charge of public utilities at or above the county level may propose plans to implement such concession projects based on the social development and choose the concession operator through competitive modes including bidding and competitive negotiation. Where concession projects have specific construction and operation standards and supervision requirements, and the market competition in the relevant sector is adequate, concessionaires shall be chosen through bidding. The concession agreement shall be executed for the concession. Further, if applicable, the government may provide subsidy to concession operators if their compensations cannot cover the construction and business operation costs as well as its reasonable profits. The concession term for infrastructure and public utilities concession projects with significant investment scale and long investment return cycle, government or its authorised department may discretionarily grant a concession term of more than 30 years, depending on the actual situation of projects. After the term expires, governments may re-select the concessionaire based on the relevant procedures.

Coal Industry

The coal industry of the PRC is subject to extensive regulations by the PRC government. These regulations govern a wide range of areas, including, among others, investments, exploration, production, mining rights, distribution, trading, transportation and exports related to coal, including coalbed methane and coal mine methane. In addition, coal operations are subject to fees and taxes, as well as safety and environmental protection laws and regulations. The most important PRC regulatory authorities overseeing coal operations include the NDRC, the Ministry of Natural Resources, the NMSA, the Ministry of Emergency Management and the Ministry of Ecology and Environment. HKCG's project companies in the coal industry are principally governed under the following PRC laws and regulations:

According to the "Coal Law of the PRC" (《中華人民共和國煤炭法》) and the "Mineral Resources Law of the PRC" (《中國人民共和國礦產資源法》) each promulgated by the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress of the PRC respectively on 29 August 1996 and 19 March 1986 (as amended), and other applicable PRC laws and regulations, exploration and exploitation of coal, including coalbed methane, is subject to supervision by the MLR and relevant local mineral resource bureau. Upon approval, an exploration licence for each proposed mine or a mining right permit for each mine will be granted. On 15 June 2006, the State Council issued the "Opinions to Facilitate the Utilisation and Drainage of Coal Bed Methane (Coal Mine Methane)" (《國務院辦公邊關於加快煤層氣(煤礦瓦斯)抽採利用的若干意見》) to speed up the development of coalbed methane of the PRC. Subsequently, the relevant regulatory authorities issued measures to implement the aforesaid opinions of the State Council, including without limitation the "Circular on Strengthening the Administration of Comprehensive Exploration and Exploitation of Coal and Coal Bed Methane Resources" (《國土資源部 關於加強煤炭和煤層氣資源綜合勘查開採管理的通知》) issued by the MLR on 17 April 2007, the "Twelfth Five-year Plan of the Development and Utilisation of Coal Bed Methane (Coal Mine Methane)" (《煤層氣(煤礦瓦斯)開發利用"十二五"規劃》) jointly issued by the NDRC and the National Energy Administration on 26 November 2011 and the "Coal Bed Methane Industry Policy" (《煤層氣產 業政策》) issued by the National Energy Administration on 22 February 2013. On 14 September 2013, the State Council issued the "Opinions to Further Facilitate the Utilisation and Drainage of Coal Bed Methane (Coal Mine Methane)" (《國務院辦公廳關於進一步加快煤層氣(煤礦瓦斯)抽採利用的意見》). On 1 February 2016, the State Council of the PRC promulgated the "Opinions of the State Council on Resolving Overcapacity in the Coal Industry to Achieve a Turnaround" (《國務院關於煤炭行業化解過 剩產能實現脱困發展的意見》) under which, from 2016, examination and approval shall be ceased within three years for new coal mine projects, technical transformation projects with new capacity and projects of increased capacity upon review in principle and decrement substitution shall be employed for necessary new coal mines. On 24 November 2016, the National Energy Administration promulgated the "13th Five-year Plan of the Development and Utilisation of Coal Bed Methane (Coal Mine Methane)" (《煤層氣(煤礦瓦斯)開發利用"十三五"規劃 》). On 19 August 2019, the NDRC and other five governmental authorities jointly issued the "Notice to Circulate the Working Plan on Classified Disposal of Coal Mines less than 300,000 Tonnes Per Year" (《關於印發 < 30萬噸/年以下煤礦分類處置 工作方案 > 的通知》) aiming to decrease the number of coal mines with production capacity of less than

300,000 tonnes per year nationwide to no more than 800 by the end of 2021 with the enterprises of such production capacity in northern China and northwest region (excluding the south Xinjiang) generally quitting coal mining.

The NMSA is the PRC government authority exercising control over and supervision of the safety of coal and non-coal production, including coalbed methane production. In order to proceed with the construction of a coal mine or coalbed methane project, the project's safety designs and procedures must be examined and approved by the NMSA or its local offices. Upon the completion of a coal mine or coalbed methane construction project and before the commencement of production, further inspection and approval by the NMSA or its local offices of the facilities and conditions is required. The NMSA also conducts regular safety inspections of coal producers pursuant to the "PRC Safety Production Law" (《中華人民共和國安全生產法》) and the "PRC Mining Safety Law" (《中華人民共和國礦山安全法》) each promulgated by the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress of the PRC respectively on 29 June 2002 and 7 November 1992 (as amended), and other applicable safety laws and regulations. Producers who fail to comply with safety regulations are subject to penalties, including fines and suspension of operations. In addition, it is required that any safety accident shall be reported within one hour to the local government authorities in charge of work safety at county level or above. Moreover, under the "Implementation Measures for Coal Production Safety Permits" (煤礦企業安全生產許可證實 施辦法》) issued by the SAWS effective 1 April 2016 (as amended), each operating coal mine is required to apply for a coal production safety permit from the NMSA or its local offices, which will be valid for an initial period of three years and subject to renew upon expiration.

Project Verification

Under the "Administrative Measures on Approval and Filing for Enterprise Investment Projects" (《企業 投資項目核准和備案管理辦法》) issued by the NDRC on 8 March 2017 and effective from 8 April 2017, projects which relate to national security or involve, among others, nationwide significant productivity layout, development of strategic resources and significant public interest shall be subject to approval administration. Other projects shall be subject to filing administration. The scope of projects subject to approval administration, the approval authorities and approval limits shall be determined in accordance with the "List of Government-approved Investment Projects" (《政府核准的投資項目目錄》, the "Catalogue") promulgated by the State Council on 12 December 2016.

Under the Catalogue, to invest in the construction of fixed-asset investment projects listed in the Catalogue, enterprises must report the relevant projects to the project confirmation authorities for confirmation in accordance with the relevant provisions. Where enterprises invest in the construction of projects beyond the Catalogue, such projects shall be subject to filing administration. From 2016, examination and approval shall be ceased within three years for new coal mine projects, technical transformation projects of new capacity and projects of capacity increased upon review in principle and decrement substitution shall be employed for necessary new coal mines.

On 14 January 2017, the NDRC issued the "Circular on Effectively Implementing Foreign Capital-related Work in the List of Government-approved Investment Projects (2016 Version)" (《關於做好貫徹 落實 < 政府核准的投資項目目錄(2016年本) > 有關外資工作的通知》), according to which, 1) any project of the restricted category with a total investment (including capital increase) for U.S.\$300 million or above as included in the Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries shall be approved by the NDRC, and any project with a total investment (including capital increase) for U.S.\$2 billion and above shall be submitted to the State Council for filing, 2) any project of the restricted category with a total investment (including capital increase) for less than U.S.\$300 million as included in the Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries shall be approved by the provincial government, and 3) the foreign investment projects beyond the scope of projects subject to approval and not in the prohibited category as provided in the Catalogue for the Guidance of Foreign Investment Industries shall be presented to local development and reform commissions for filing. Foreign investment permitted or encouraged projects which fall into the Catalogue (not the articles for foreign investments).

Thailand

HKCG currently has limited operations in Thailand after acquiring a 60 per cent. stake in an onshore oil exploration and production project in 2012, which holds all necessary licences, as well as concession rights for certain onshore oilfield blocks, and is in compliance with applicable Thai laws and regulations. See "Description of HKCG – Other Business Lines – International Upstream Project".

THE HONG KONG AND PRC GAS INDUSTRY

This section provides an overview of the gas industry in Hong Kong and the PRC. The information presented in this section has been extracted from publicly available documents and reports prepared by third parties, which have not been independently verified by the Issuer, HKCG, the Arranger or any of its affiliates or advisers. It does not consider any other facets of regulation such as Hong Kong company law and taxation law.

Hong Kong Downstream Piped City-Gas Industry

Natural Gas Production and Consumption in Hong Kong

Natural gas is a component of Hong Kong's primary energy consumption mix. Hong Kong imports 100 per cent. of its natural gas.

Gas Supply Situation in Hong Kong

Town gas and LPG are the types of fuel gas used in Hong Kong for domestic, commercial and industrial purposes. LPG is also used as a fuel by taxis and light buses while natural gas is used for electricity generation and production of town gas. According to Hong Kong Government Statistics, Hong Kong has about 2.3 million gas customers in the domestic, commercial and industrial sectors.

LPG is imported into Hong Kong by sea and stored at five terminals on Tsing Yi Island before being distributed to approximately 420,000 customers and 67 LPG filling stations.

Natural gas is imported from the gas fields in the South China Sea via a 780-kilometre submarine pipeline, and the Second West-East Natural Gas Pipeline through Shenzhen Daichan Island to the Black Point and Castle Peak Power Stations for electricity generation. Since early 2013, this power station also receives gas from the new extension of the Second West-East Gas Pipeline with a LNG Terminal in Shenzhen. Since 2006, the Guangdong Dapeng LNG Receiving Terminal in Shenzhen started to supply natural gas through a 93-kilometre submarine pipeline to Lamma Power Station for electricity generation. The same LNG terminal also supplies natural gas through a pair of 34-kilometre submarine pipelines to HKCG's Tai Po plant for the production of town gas. On 28 August 2008, the Hong Kong government and the National Energy Administration signed the Memorandum of Understanding (the "MoU") on the enhanced supply of natural gas to Hong Kong. After signing the MoU, the Hong Kong and the PRC governments and the energy enterprises on both sides have been working together to take forward the planning and development of the NG supply infrastructure.

Gas Demand Situation in Hong Kong

As can be seen in the table provided below, Hong Kong's gas consumption levels have been relatively steady in the past few years; domestic consumption has always accounted for over 50 per cent. of total gas consumption.

Key Players in the Hong Kong Downstream Piped City-Gas Sector

At present, there are 25 companies in Hong Kong that have been granted registered gas supply company status by the Hong Kong Gas Authority. Of these 25 companies, nine provide downstream city-gas, including LPG and piped city-gas. These companies include: HKCG, ExxonMobil Hong Kong Limited, Shell Hong Kong Limited, Chevron Hong Kong Limited, Sinopec (Hong Kong) Petroleum Holding Company Limited, Concord Oil (Hong Kong) Limited, Rise Smart Industrial Limited, DSG Energy Limited and Esso LPGas (Hong Kong) Limited.

PRC DOWNSTREAM PIPED CITY-GAS INDUSTRY

Natural Gas Production and Consumption in the PRC

In its push to accelerate the conversion to clean fuels, the PRC government has stated in its Fourteenth five year plan for 2021–2025 its plan to achieve carbon neutrality by 2060, setting major key performance indicators on economic and social development, including a 13.5 per cent. reduction in China's energy consumption per unit of GDP and 18 per cent. cut in China's CO2 emission per unit of GDP. The PRC government intends to achieve this goal by increasing energy consumption from cleaner fuels such as natural gas, hydroelectric power and other renewable energy sources such as biomass and wind power. The PRC government has provided strong support to the development of clean energy led by natural gas. China's President Xi recently stated at the General Assembly of the United Nations that China's emissions would peak around 2030 and China would strive to achieve carbon neutrality by 2060. Under the Energy Production and Consumption Revolution Strategy 《能源生產及消費革命戰略》(2016–2030), the PRC government targets to increase the proportion of natural gas in China's total primary energy consumption to 15 per cent. by 2030.

In recent years, gas consumption has been growing rapidly. According to BP Statistical Review 2020, domestic gas consumption in 2019 grew by 8.6 per cent. year-on-year, amounting to 307.3 BCM accelerating with supply not able to keep pace. Such growth was partly driven by strong economic growth and the PRC government's initiatives to curb air pollution by reducing reliance on coal and moving to the cleaner gas alternative.

The majority domestic gas production in China originates from three onshore regions, namely the Sichuan Basin in Southwest China, the Xinjiang Province and Qinghai Province with the Tarim, Junggar, and Qaidam Basins in Northwest China, and the Ordos Basin in Shanxi Province to the North. According to BP Statistical Review 2020, China produced 177.6 BCM of gas in 2019, representing a year-on-year growth of 9.9 per cent..

Natural Gas Infrastructure in the PRC

In order to encourage natural gas usage and improve the supply infrastructure, the PRC government and key Chinese oil and gas upstream participants have made significant investments in the construction of gas pipelines that bring natural gas from the gas-rich provinces to the regions of the country where natural gas consumption is high. The table below summarises key natural gas pipeline projects in the PRC currently in operation.

PipeChina (國家石油天然氣管網集團有限公司)

China established China Oil & Gas Pipeline Network Corporation ("PipeChina"), a national pipeline company, in December 2019. PipeChina was created to incentivise gas exploration and production investment in China. Since its incorporation, it has acquired LNG pipeline assets from major PRC domestic oil and gas companies. For example, it acquired the Yulin-Jinan pipeline from Sinopec Kantons Holding Ltd. ("Sinopec") in July 2019 for RMB3.22 billion. Furthermore, in September 2020, China National Offshore Oil Corp, PetroChina Company Limited and Sinopec transferred their oil and gas infrastructure (including pipelines) and personnel to PipeChina. After the transfer, such oil and gas infrastructure are operated by PipeChina as a whole.

Natural Gas Import into the PRC

The PRC currently has seventy operational LNG regasification terminals in Fujian, Guangdong, Jiangsu, Liaoning and Zhejiang provinces. A further three terminals are currently under construction or planning in the PRC. With significant regasification capacity under development, LNG will play a key role in helping to meet the PRC's growing gas demand requirements.

China is an importer of gas as a mean to bridge the domestic gap between supply and demand. Gas is primarily transported globally via pipeline or as LNG. According to BP Statistical Review 2020, China's total gas imports increased by 9.2 per cent. from approximately 121.3 BCM to 132.5 BCM from 2018 to 2019. The majority of China's increase in imports was from LNG, which increased by 11.3 BCM, from 73.5 BCM to 84.8 BCM, representing an increase of 15.4 per cent.. China has overtaken South Korea and becomes the second largest LNG importer globally. China's pipeline gas imports also increased during the period from 2017 to 2019 by 7.8 BCM, from 39.9 BCM to 47.7 BCM, representing an increase of 19.5 per cent.. In 2017, China's LNG gas imports exceeded its pipeline gas imports.



DESCRIPTION OF HKCG

Overview and History

HKCG is a leading clean energy supplier in Hong Kong and the PRC. The Group is engaged in diverse businesses whose principal activities include the production, distribution and marketing of gas, water supply and emerging environmentally-friendly energy businesses in Hong Kong and the PRC. HKCG's non-core business activities include holding of commercial properties, telecommunications, engineering, manufacturing and international upstream projects. Founded in 1862, HKCG has been listed on the Hong Kong Stock Exchange since 1960 and had a market capitalisation of approximately HK\$239.9 billion as at 31 May 2021. Its registered office is situated at 23rd Floor, 363 Java Road, North Point, Hong Kong.

HKCG's core business, the distribution of piped city-gas in Hong Kong, served approximately 1.94 million customers as at 31 December 2020. In addition, HKCG has approximately 74 per cent. penetration rate to Hong Kong households (based on the ratio of the number of HKCG's total residential customers to the total number of Hong Kong domestic households). HKCG's piped city-gas, referred to as town gas, is distributed in Hong Kong through an approximately 3,650 km underground pipeline network that is owned and operated by HKCG. HKCG's businesses in Hong Kong accounted for 27 per cent. (HK\$11,029.7 million) of HKCG's total revenue for the year ended 31 December 2020.

For HKCG's operations outside of Hong Kong, including gas, water and new energy businesses, revenue was HK\$29,897.3 million, representing 73 per cent. of HKCG's total revenue for the year ended 31 December 2020. HKCG (including subsidiaries, joint ventures and associates) is now a leading piped city-gas operator in the PRC in terms of volume of piped city-gas sold. HKCG's PRC businesses, which began with the first joint venture in Guangdong province in 1994, continue to expand as HKCG views the PRC as an important aspect of its growth and diversification strategies. Strengths

HKCG holds a leading and stable position in the Hong Kong piped city-gas market.

HKCG has a long track record and leading position in the Hong Kong piped city-gas market. Founded in 1862, HKCG was the first public utility company established in Hong Kong. HKCG has been listed on the Hong Kong Stock Exchange since 1960 and has been one of the constituent companies of the Hang Seng Index since 1964. HKCG is the supplier of reliable piped city-gas services to a diversified household consumer, commercial and industrial customer base in Hong Kong. As at 31 December 2020, HKCG served approximately 1.94 million customers in Hong Kong. HKCG has approximately 74 per cent. penetration rate to Hong Kong households. HKCG maintains an approximately 3,650 km underground pipeline network, which HKCG believes is within easy reach of approximately 86 per cent. of Hong Kong households. HKCG also has a sound safety track record, with a continuing commitment to implement on-going safety measures.

HKCG holds a strong and sustainable position in the geographical markets in which it operates.

HKCG is the only piped city-gas operator in Hong Kong and does not expect significant competition to emerge due to high barriers to entering the market, such as governmental approvals for, and significant initial investment in, the development of piped city-gas infrastructure. With rising oil and electricity prices, HKCG believes that its piped-gas services in Hong Kong are cost-competitive when compared with other energy sources, such as electricity and piped and bottled LPG. HKCG charges its customers a basic tariff and a fuel cost adjustment and so its piped city-gas margins are shielded from feedstock cost fluctuations. The pass-through mechanism enables HKCG to fully pass through fluctuations in fuel costs to the end-user in Hong Kong. HKCG expects to maintain its stable financial position in the coming years. Further, HKCG's principal supplies are natural gas and naphtha, the two feedstocks used in the production of town gas. HKCG's natural gas for its Hong Kong operations is mainly supplied under the terms of a 25-year agreement it has signed with its natural gas supplier, Guangdong Dapeng, in 2004 on favourable terms relative to world prices. The agreement commenced from the first LNG shipment in 2006. Guangdong Dapeng and another supplier now supply approximately 60 per cent. of HKCG's feedstock requirements. The use of dual feedstocks of natural gas and naphtha means that HKCG's town

gas production facilities can switch to naphtha should natural gas supply problems occur. HKCG has term contracts with several suppliers from Southeast Asian countries and Australia to ensure reliability of the supply of naphtha. In Hong Kong, HKCG also has internal pipeline construction capabilities via its wholly owned subsidiary, U-Tech Engineering Company Limited ("U-Tech"), for gas, water, drainage, sewage, electricity and telecommunications pipeline projects. U-Tech employs "trenchless" technology to carry out many pipeline construction projects without the need to excavate long trenches in roads. This process ensures minimal disturbance to the environment and reduces the inconvenience caused to the general public. Having built a niche as a successful participant in the "trenchless" technology market, U-Tech has been extending this specialist knowledge to a number of leading utilities and property developers throughout Hong Kong.

Additionally, HKCG has been operating joint venture projects in the PRC since 1994 and has developed a significant foothold in a number of provinces and regions. HKCG maintains good relationships with and receives support from the PRC government authorities, as many of HKCG's joint venture partners are provincial or local governments or government-owned entities. As at 31 December 2020, HKCG, through its Group entities, maintained interests in 282 piped city-gas projects (inclusive of city-gas projects re-invested by the Group's companies) and 14 midstream transportation projects across 23 provinces, municipalities and autonomous regions. Many of HKCG's piped city-gas projects have been granted exclusive operation rights, usually for terms of 30 years. Revenue from HKCG's operations outside of Hong Kong, including the gas, water and new energy businesses, increased by 2 per cent. to HK\$29,897.3 million in the year ended 31 December 2020. HKCG further benefits from the favourable industry backdrop for natural gas consumption in the PRC, which has grown at a CAGR of 13 per cent. from 2009 to 2019 according to the BP Statistical Review of World Energy 2020. The industry is further supported by the construction of large-scale natural gas infrastructure projects, such as the West-to-East project and the natural gas infrastructure project with Russia.

HKCG has a stable Hong Kong business complemented by its gas, water and new energy businesses outside of Hong Kong.

HKCG maintains a conservative financial profile, supported by a stable income and cash flow that is primarily a result of its strong Hong Kong piped city-gas business. HKCG believes that the PRC holds high growth opportunities for the Group because of economic growth, urbanisation and the PRC government's support for clean energy. As a result, HKCG believes that it is well positioned for expansion in the PRC's expanding piped city-gas industry.

HKCG's new energy business started operation in 2000 by running of LPG filling stations in Hong Kong which provided an environmental friendly alternative for Hong Kong's over 21,000 taxis and light buses instead of traditional heavier polluting fuels. HKCG developed its emerging environmentally-friendly energy businesses in Hong Kong and the PRC, including converting landfill gas into a methane-based heating fuel, coalbed methane liquefaction, clean coal chemicals, conversion and utilisation of biomass, utilisation of industrial and agricultural waste as well as natural gas refilling stations. HKCG's new energy business have earned a strong reputation for innovative research and the development of alternative energy sources such as turning low-grade waste materials into high-value energy products. In the year ended 31 December 2020, the new energy business initiatives made a positive contribution to the Group's total revenue and total profit.

HKCG's management team has rich experiences in the gas and distribution businesses and HKCG has a committed substantial shareholder.

HKCG's management and operational teams have extensive experiences in numerous aspects of the gas industry such as business operations, technical know-how, engineering, safety and sales and marketing. The management team maintains a high standard of corporate governance, prudence in financial controls and strict adherence to environmental and safety policies. In respect of both Hong Kong and the PRC, HKCG's management and operational teams also have strong contacts with local and provincial governmental departments and authorities in Hong Kong and the PRC. HKCG also appoints some board members and key managers for each of HKCG's project companies in the PRC, and in most cases, the general managers, to establish and maintain HKCG's corporate governance and operational standards and to lend their expertise to the new ventures.

HKCG's primary substantial shareholder is Henderson Land. As at 31 December 2020, Henderson Land held the beneficial interest in approximately 41.53 per cent. of HKCG's shares.

HKCG has a strong and conservative financial profile.

HKCG has strong financials supported by stable income and cash flow primarily derived from its Hong Kong piped city-gas business. HKCG also exercises a prudent financial policy and maintains its key leverage ratios at conservative and serviceable levels.

Strategy

Continued focus on the core Hong Kong piped city-gas business.

HKCG maintains a leading position in the Hong Kong piped city-gas market and will seek to consolidate its position by competing with providers in the wider energy market. In doing so, HKCG will seek to develop more gas-use opportunities, particularly in laundry, food processing, hotels, restaurants and hospitals, as well as introduce innovative gas-related services and products, such as gas appliances, promoting a "quality living" standard for its customers.

Strategically expand its PRC businesses.

HKCG sees the PRC as a key driver of its growth and diversification and is committed to expanding its current operations and joint venture projects. In March 2007, HKCG acquired a significant interest in Towngas China by injecting ten of its existing piped city-gas projects into Towngas China, which extended the geographical reach of HKCG's piped city-gas projects in northeastern and southwestern PRC by adding 25 piped city-gas projects into the Group's portfolio. As at 31 December 2020, the Group maintained interests in 282 piped city-gas projects (inclusive of city-gas projects re-invested by the Group's companies) of which 118 were owned by HKCG and 164 were owned by Towngas China. As at 31 December 2020, the Group held approximately 68.21 per cent. of the issued share capital of Towngas China.

HKCG seeks to implement downstream piped city-gas projects in cities with natural gas availability and good economic growth prospects that will increase demand for piped city-gas in the commercial, industrial and residential sectors. In addition, HKCG aims to expand its 14 midstream projects by establishing a strong strategic link to a secure natural gas supply, which will complement its downstream piped city-gas projects and also gain a foothold in geographic areas where HKCG does not currently operate. HKCG also intends to build upon its upstream projects in order to partially supplement its demand, which is currently sourced from third parties. HKCG expects to experience growth in existing projects and commence new projects, in particular, by seeking business opportunities in locations near to its existing projects and existing and future long haul transportation pipelines.

A Strategic Partnership with Shanghai Gas

In October 2020, Towngas China signed the Capital Increase Agreement with Shanghai Gas and Shenergy Group to acquire a 25 per cent stake in Shanghai Gas, one of the largest city-gas operators in mainland China, with a customer base of 6.3 million accounts and annual gas sales of over 9,000 million cubic metres. Shanghai Gas also owns a pipe network of over 25,000 km and has an LNG import volume of six billion cubic metres and LNG storage capacity of 1.2 million cubic metres.

The partnership will create regional synergies between the projects currently operated by Towngas China, Shanghai Gas and Shenergy Group and help HKCG to expand into Shanghai and recently developed surrounding areas, including Lingang New District, Qingpu New District and the Yangtze River Delta Integrated Development Demonstration Zone. As a result, HKCG's market position in the eastern part of mainland China is set to be further strengthened. The synergy will increase HKCG's and Towngas China's combined customer base to around 40 million accounts.

Moreover, Shanghai Gas and Shenergy Group have two liquefied natural gas (LNG) receiving terminals at Wuhaogou and Yangshan Port. Combined with HKCG's underground salt cavern gas storage facility in Jintan, Changzhou, Jiangsu province, the receiving terminals will create synergy and assurance for HKCG's gas supply, thereby establishing a solid foundation for its entry into the natural gas trading

market. Shanghai is a wealthy municipality, with a population of over 24 million. Through the partnership, HKCG has an opportunity to extend its businesses to the strong customer base of Shanghai Gas, including space heating systems, insurance services, gas appliances and kitchen and bathroom products.

Development of new and clean energy.

As a result of rising internal demand for consumer goods and progressive urbanisation in the PRC, the demand for clean energy is increasing and HKCG will continue to focus on new and clean energy sources and activities. In addition, as the PRC government sources energy alternatives to oil, HKCG will seek to capture the potential market for alternative fuels. HKCG already operates many clean energy projects, including five LPG filling stations and three landfill gas project in Hong Kong, approximately forty CNG/LNG filling station projects and a coalbed methane ("CBM") project in the PRC. Future planned clean energy initiatives include additional CNG/LNG filling stations and alternative coal-based chemical and biomass activities in the PRC. Further, in October 2006, HKCG began using natural gas as a partial feedstock in the production of its town gas in Hong Kong. Natural gas is less expensive than naphtha, the other feedstock in town gas, and produces less carbon dioxide emissions. HKCG anticipates that new and clean energy projects will provide a base for further diversification and its future expansion.

Shift towards higher quality customer base and higher margin business segments with lower risk profiles.


In the PRC, HKCG aims to increase its customer base in the more attractive commercial and industrial market segments as opposed to the residential market segment. In the commercial and industrial market segments, HKCG's project companies have greater pricing power due to their relatively relaxed government controls, the price competitiveness of piped city-gas and the ability to deliver piped city-gas in bulk at higher margins. For the year ended 31 December 2020, HKCG's gas sales by volume in the PRC were approximately 76 per cent. to commercial and industrial customers and approximately 24 per cent. to residential customers. Similarly, in Hong Kong, HKCG aims to increase its current share of commercial and industrial customers. During the year ended 31 December 2020, HKCG successfully gained new commercial and industrial customers who started to convert to the use of town gas in Hong Kong. Due to enhanced COVID-19 social distancing measures and restrictions on restaurant operating hours by the government in 2020, many of HKCG's residential customers chose to cook at home. This, in turn, led to a rise in residential gas consumption. For the year ended 31 December 2020, HKCG's gas sales by volume in Hong Kong were approximately 40 per cent. to commercial and industrial customers and approximately 60 per cent. to residential customers.

Leverage existing experience and infrastructure.

HKCG owns and operates an approximately 3,650 km underground pipeline infrastructure in Hong Kong, and indirectly through its project companies, operates an underground infrastructure system in each of its downstream piped city-gas locations in the PRC. It also operates a pipeline network of approximately 123,689 km in the PRC. As a result, HKCG can efficiently meet growing demand for piped city-gas by expanding and maintaining its pipeline network in both Hong Kong and the PRC. In addition, HKCG intends to continue to utilise and leverage its infrastructure to generate revenues in other businesses, such as telecommunications. For instance, the pipeline infrastructure in Hong Kong carries fibre optic cables, part of the capacity of which is sold to telecommunications providers and operators.

Organisation

The following is a simplified diagram of HKCG's corporate structure as at 31 December 2020:

- As Hong Kong & China Gas (China) Limited (HK&CG (China)) was a wholly-owned subsidiary of Towngas International Company Limited ("TICL"), which in turn was a wholly-owned subsidiary of HKCG, each of TICL and HKCG was therefore taken to be interested in the 1,850,656,677 shares of Towngas China held by HK&CG (China) by virtue of Part XV of the Securities & Futures Ordinance (the "SFO"). In addition, as Planwise Properties Limited ("Planwise") and Superfun Enterprises Limited ("Superfun") were wholly-owned subsidiaries of Towngas Investment Company Limited ("TICL-HK"), which in turn was a wholly-owned subsidiary of HKCG, each of TICL-HK and HKCG was therefore taken to be interested in 174,442,738 shares of Towngas China, which included (i) the 171,524,099 shares of Towngas China held by Planwise; and (ii) the 2,918,639 shares of Towngas China held by Superfun by virtue of Part XV of the SFO. The approximate percentage figures of interest of (i) HKCG, (ii) TICL and HK&CG (China), (iii) TICL-HK and (iv) Planwise in the shares of Towngas China were 68.21 per cent., 62.33 per cent., 5.88 per cent. and 5.78 per cent. respectively.

Gas Business Lines

The gas industry can be broadly categorised into three segments: upstream production, midstream transportation and downstream piped city-gas distribution. HKCG's core business is the processing, transportation and distribution of piped city-gas in Hong Kong, with a growing downstream piped city-gas business in the PRC. The PRC also presents midstream and upstream growth opportunities. The following discussion provides a description of HKCG's gas pipelines, its gas processing, its gas delivery processes in Hong Kong and the PRC, its downstream piped city-gas transportation and distribution in Hong Kong and the PRC, and a summary of the Group's PRC projects.

Overview

The following is a general industrial description of the gas delivery process. Natural gas production mainly involves underground exploration, drilling, extraction and purification. After extraction from a gas well, natural gas is transmitted to nearby facilities for removal of water content and impurities. The natural gas is then transported from the facilities via long haul pipelines under high pressure so that it may be supplied to multiple locations near such pipelines.

In Hong Kong, HKCG owns and operates its network pipeline infrastructure, and in the PRC, HKCG operates, indirectly through its project companies, the gas pipeline infrastructure of each piped city-gas project location (including the intermediate pipelines, the city gates, the main pipelines and the branch pipelines). In the PRC, HKCG primarily engaged in downstream activities by way of purchasing natural gas from oil and gas exploration and production companies and distributing natural gas to end-users. The downstream company determines the method of delivering natural gas to its desired destination after taking into account factors such as the distance between the collection and delivery points and the expected demand for gas from the relevant gas supply locations. Apart from pipeline transportation and distribution, there are alternative means of natural gas transportation including the delivery of liquefied or compressed natural gas by truck to a processing station from gas wells or stations located along the relevant long haul pipeline.


Main pipelines are laid within a piped city-gas operational location and represent the backbone of the gas delivery system. Different sections of the main pipelines operate at slightly different pressures, with computer-controlled regulators controlling the flow of natural gas for delivery to end-users via the branch pipelines. When there is a demand for a connection of gas to a particular area within a location, the downstream company will invest in the construction of the branch pipelines to connect the main pipelines to the pressure-regulating boxes located in the end-users' buildings or premises. The pressure-regulating box reduces the natural gas to a lower pressure before the natural gas is transported to the end users' buildings or premises.

Piped City-Gas Business in Hong Kong

Gas delivery

HKCG provides an uninterrupted, safe and reliable supply of piped city-gas to its Hong Kong customers. HKCG is the primary downstream piped city-gas supplier in Hong Kong with approximately 3,650 km of underground pipeline infrastructure that HKCG believes is within easy connection-reach of approximately 86 per cent. of all households.

The following diagram reflects key aspects of HKCG's pipeline network in Hong Kong as at 31 December 2020:



HKCG received PAS 55-1:2004 certification during 2007 and is among the first gas companies in the region to receive this well-recognised asset management certification. Subsequently, HKCG has been certified to ISO55001:2014 standard across its gas production plants and its transmission and distribution network.

HKCG continues to expand its supply network with new pipeline projects throughout Hong Kong. The first of these, the Eastern Transmission Pipeline project, which consists of a high-pressure pipeline from Ma On Shan via Sai Kung to eastern Kowloon, was completed during 2008. The pipeline provides an additional supply point and brings better supply capacities and service reliability to the area.

To facilitate the use of landfill gas as fuel for town gas production, a pipeline from the northeastern New Territories landfill site to HKCG's Tai Po plant was completed and commissioned in early 2007. See "New and Clean Energy". The pipeline was further extended in 2017 to supply landfill gas to the first combined heat and power system in Hong Kong at the Alice Ho Miu Ling Nethersole Hospital in Tai Po.

The laying of a 15 km pipeline to carry natural gas from Tai Po to the Ma Tau Kok ("MTK") gas processing plant was completed in 2014. The pipeline has aided to partially replacing naphtha as feedstock for the production of town gas.

To maintain a high level of supply reliability, HKCG have been forming a ring-feed transmission network in the New Territories. The last 9 km of transmission pipelines linking Tuen Mun and Tsuen Wan were mostly completed in 2020, with commissioning expected in 2021. Satisfactory progress was made in reinforcing the supply to major commercial and industrial customers in Tai Po and Yuen Long Industrial Estates, as well as the two theme parks in Hong Kong.

HKCG continues to make progress on the network design for the residential developments in Kai Tak, Kwu Tung North, Fanling North, Hung Shui Kiu, Yuen Long South and Tung Chung New Town Extension.

HKCG will continue working with the Hong Kong government to coordinate gas requirements of the new developments and to ensure necessary supplies when such developments are completed.

Gas processing


HKCG produces its town gas at two production plants located at Tai Po and Ma Tau Kok in Hong Kong. Over 97 per cent. of HKCG's gas is currently processed at the Tai Po plant. The Tai Po plant has stringent requirements on quality, environmental protection and occupational safety and health management. The management systems in quality, environmental protection and occupational safety and health are accredited with the ISO 9001, ISO 14001 and ISO 45001 international standards, respectively. HKCG also conducts annual internal and external audits on both of its plants.

Located in the Tai Po Industrial Estate, the Tai Po plant has a total area of 11.71 hectares and a total investment of HK\$2.7 billion as at 31 December 2020. It was constructed in two phases-the first phase commenced operation in December 1986 and the second phase was completed in 1992. HKCG completed further modifications to the plant in 2006 and 2020 to cope with increasing customer demand. There are eight gas-making trains at the Tai Po plant, capable of supplying a maximum of 10.22 million standard cubic metres of town gas per day ("SCMD"). In comparison, the total production capacity of the Ma Tau Kok plant is 2.6 million SCMD.

HKCG uses naphtha (a light petroleum distillate) and natural gas to produce town gas, with an increasing focus on natural gas. The use of dual feedstocks means HKCG's gas-making trains can switch to naphtha if natural gas supply problems occur. HKCG adopted naphtha as a feedstock in the 1970s, replacing coal and heavy oil. Naphtha has a low sulphur content of five parts per million, resulting in lower emissions of sulphur dioxide, a key component of acid rain, during the gas production process. Similarly, first introduced in October 2006, natural gas provides a clean feedstock in the production of town gas and also constitutes a more economical and reliable energy source for Hong Kong. HKCG secured a 25-year supply of natural gas in 2004 with Guangdong Dapeng at favourable rates relative to current natural gas prices, and as a result, customers received a reduction of up to 23 per cent. in their gas bills during 2008. See "Suppliers and Customers - Suppliers". The natural gas is piped from the LNG receiving terminal at Dapeng, Shenzhen to HKCG's Tai Po plant via a pair of 34 km high pressure submarine pipelines laid across the Tolo Harbour seabed. To prepare for the introduction of natural gas, HKCG undertook modifications at the Tai Po plant beginning in 2003, including the construction of new facilities such as a natural gas receiving station and an air compressor station, while eight gas-making trains were modified for dual feedstock production. In 2007, HKCG completed its first full year of natural gas usage in the production of town gas, which helps reduce carbon dioxide emissions.

At the Tai Po plant, all eight gas-making trains use the catalytic rich gas ("CRG") Series 'A' process to produce town gas. CRG is a continuous, high-pressure process that, for the production process using naphtha as feedstock, begins with the conversion of naphtha into a methane-rich gas through low-temperature steam reforming. Part of this rich gas is then passed into a catalytic tubular reformer where it reacts further with additional steam at a high temperature, producing lean gas. The resulting lean gas is then mixed with the rich gas in accordance with a fixed ratio to achieve the required calorific value of town gas. The carbon monoxide present in the reformed gas product is reduced by the shift reaction in a high temperature converter, increasing the content of hydrogen. To achieve the specific gravity of town gas, the content of carbon dioxide is reduced by a hot potassium carbonate solution. Part of the converted gas is then cooled, and the carbon dioxide content is lowered to 1 per cent. before the gas is mixed with the rest of the converted gas. The gas is then cooled and dried, and an odorant is added to the gas to give town gas a distinctive smell before the town gas production cycle is completed.

The following diagram illustrates the CRG production process at the Tai Po plant:



Where the production process utilises natural gas as feedstock, naphtha is converted into a methane-rich gas through low-temperature steam reforming. Natural gas is delivered to a catalytic tubular reformer in which it reacts to steam at a high temperature, becoming a lean gas. The resulting lean gas is mixed with rich gas in a fixed ratio to achieve the required calorific value of town gas. The rest of the process is similar to the pure naphtha production process except that there is no need to reduce the carbon dioxide content.

Town gas is ultimately distributed at a maximum pressure of 3,450 kilopascals as a clean, gaseous fuel that is about half the density of air.

Piped city-gas customers

Despite the maturity of the market in Hong Kong, HKCG's downstream piped city-gas operations throughout the territory continue to form its core business and revenue generator, in addition to providing the platform for the diversification of its activities into the PRC. HKCG's objective in Hong Kong is to provide reliable and energy efficient services that will create a quality lifestyle for its customers.

HKCG has provided downstream piped city-gas services to Hong Kong customers since 1864. HKCG's services, which are provided in Hong Kong under the Towngas brand, include gas for cooking and water heating. As at 31 December 2020, HKCG served approximately 1.94 million customers, of which about 17,160 were commercial and industrial customers. HKCG's revenue breakdown based on consumption profile was, for the year ended 31 December 2020, approximately 62 per cent. residential and approximately 38 per cent. commercial and industrial. Overall, HKCG has approximately 74 per cent. penetration rate to Hong Kong households. In the face of an increasingly mature market, as at 31 December 2020, HKCG's customer base increased by 10,050 customers since 31 December 2019.

In the commercial and industrial sector, HKCG seeks to improve its market position by developing the commercial and industrial use of gas and gas-related products in the competitive energy market. HKCG believes these efforts, which have been particularly effective in the laundry, food processing, restaurant, theme park, hotel and hospital industries, are based on its close relationships with customers. HKCG uses its industry knowledge and expertise to offer innovative and cost-effective solutions for its customers. In the past few years, HKCG introduced a range of eco-friendly gas equipment/applications, i.e. gas absorption chiller, combined heat & power system and gas dehumidifier in various market fields. In addition, HKCG had marketed automatic catering machines such as jet oven and programmable meat roaster in response to manpower shortage. In 2012, HKCG's "Four Treasures" cool kitchen series of kitchen equipment products have received a number of design awards, including the Hong Kong Awards for Industries for 2011 and the Hang Seng Pearl River Delta Environmental Award-Silver Award for 2012 for their energy saving properties. The "Four Treasures" cool kitchen series of kitchen equipment products come equipped with a waste energy recycle system designed to provide gas usage savings for users. In 2018, a new series of high efficiency (>95 per cent.) steaming appliances was introduced to customers in view of the energy saving objective. Regular newsletters, e-marketing, active public relations and business events and continuous involvement in the market also keep HKCG's business customers notified of new service initiatives as well as the latest product information.

An exceptionally promising market is for the desiccant dehumidification system HKCG has developed, which provides significant improvements to indoor air quality (IAQ). This compact integrated Desiccant +Primary Air Unit, or D-PAU, has already been installed at H Zentre on Middle Road and in a ward at Hong Kong Baptist Hospital. Its ability to provide better indoor air quality as well as improved humidity control has since been further enhanced by integrating other air quality control devices, such as an Electrostatic Precipitator (EP) and UV Photocatalytic Oxidation (PCO) component for filtering fine particles and eliminating microbes.

Potential customers for HKCG's D-PAU system include hospitals with hydrotherapy pools and operating theatres, as well as pharmacies, laundries, rehabilitation centres and homes for the elderly.

HKCG expects that it will benefit from a potential healthy growth in the commercial sector due to completion of several major infrastructure projects in the coming years, including the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge, the Express Rail Link and three-runway system of the Hong Kong International Airport. These connections will stimulate the tourism industry and overnight visitors. HKCG continues to see strong performance in laundry industry with its continuous penetration into the industry throughout the past years and has won the contract with the largest laundry in South East Asia, which HKCG expects to see strong demand for its gas. With more exhibits being fuelled by gas, coupled with increasing patronage, usage at Hong Kong's theme parks is also growing.

HKCG operates 21 customer centres, including a holistic lifestyle centre called Towngas Avenue in Hong Kong to promote flame cooking gastronomy and the convenience, benefits and safety of town gas in the home. In addition to HKCG's safe and reliable gas supplies, HKCG provides a range of innovative and sophisticated gas appliances for residential, industrial and commercial use. Apart from providing convenient and comprehensive one-stop services to its Hong Kong customers, HKCG's kitchen appliances are especially well received among customers for their convenience and safety. In keeping with its smart kitchen concept, these appliances come with functions such as an automatic shut-off feature for unattended appliances, an anti-scorch function and the ability to control an appliance through a mobile phone app. As the demand for smart appliances grows, HKCG will continue to develop and launch new smart features that its customers look.

Since 2010, HKCG has expanded the kitchen cabinets business from standalone projects with business customers to retail market with the aim to provide total kitchen solutions to its customers. In 2020, HKCG saw an increase in sales for its Mia Cucina line of kitchen cabinets, which are popular among residential customers and property developers for their high quality. During the year, a total of 4,085 kitchen cabinets were sold to property developers. To promote sales, HKCG showcased different Mia Cucina kitchen projects and shared design tips on digital platforms and in home décor magazines, with the aim of providing design inspiration and increasing brand awareness among customers planning to renovate their kitchens. HKCG also renovated the North Point Mia Cucina showroom to introduce its latest kitchen designs and kitchen cabinet materials.

Pricing and billing

HKCG's bills consist of a basic tariff and a fuel cost adjustment. The Hong Kong pricing scheme for HKCG's piped city-gas is not regulated. The basic tariff is determined by a number of factors including the cost of supply, competition, general economic conditions, inflation, and customer profile. HKCG raised its basic tariff by HK\$0.011 per megajoule, representing 4.4 per cent. of the basic tariff, on 1 August 2019. About 73 per cent. of its residential customers will pay no more than HK\$10 extra for their gas consumption each month. HKCG has also promised to freeze its basic tariff for two years after the increase. In addition, HKCG has the ability to pass-through fluctuations in fuel costs directly to customers. HKCG determines the fuel cost adjustment based on a reference price, and any increases or decreases HKCG pays relative to the reference price is passed on, or rebated, as the case may be, to the customer. See "Relationship with the Government".

In respect of residential customer billing, HKCG sends a bill to its customers every two months comprising a basic tariff and a fuel cost adjustment. No connection fees are charged other than an initial connection to the network, which, if charged, is usually paid by the property developer of large scale new developments.

Gas consumption

The residential gas charge is based on gas consumption, and consumption is determined by metre readings by HKCG every four months, self-reading by customers or by estimated readings based on past usage. Once a customer receives a bill, payment is due within eight business days and may be made through a variety of methods including automatic debit, cheque, the internet, automatic teller machines, convenience stores and post offices. Most of HKCG's customers pay within the prescribed period. HKCG also maintains a deposit, paid upon the opening of each new account, ranging from HK\$300 to HK\$600 that may be set off against bad debts.

In respect of commercial and industrial customers, the process described above is generally the same. However, since the consumption by these customers is significantly higher, metre readings are conducted and bills are sent on a monthly basis. A higher deposit (either in cash or by a bank guarantee) is also maintained. HKCG's bad debt profile for commercial and industrial customers is very low.

PRC Gas Projects

Overview

HKCG's PRC business began with the first joint venture in the Guangdong province in 1994 and it is HKCG's strategy to expand in the PRC, as HKCG views the PRC as an important aspect of its growth and diversification strategy. HKCG maintains a presence in many of the PRC's most economically vibrant cities and regions, and as at 31 December 2020, the Group maintained interests in 282 downstream piped city-gas projects (inclusive of piped gas projects re-invested by the Group's companies), 14 midstream transportation projects and four upstream projects across 23 provinces, municipalities and autonomous regions. In the downstream piped city-gas segment, HKCG seeks to implement projects in developing cities with natural gas availability, high-living standards and good economic growth prospects to service utility needs and industrial infrastructure growth. In the midstream transportation segment, HKCG aims to expand its 14 midstream projects by establishing a strong strategic link to a reliable natural gas supply for its downstream piped city-gas operational areas. In the upstream segment, HKCG has established four upstream projects to supplement and secure the source of gas supply, which partially offset reliance on other third party suppliers.

HKCG acquired a significant interest in Towngas China in March 2007, which complements HKCG's strategy, extending the geographical reach of HKCG's piped city-gas projects in northeastern and southwestern PRC. On 17 March 2010, Hong Kong & China Gas (China) Limited, a wholly-owned subsidiary of HKCG, entered into a sale and purchase agreement with Towngas China whereby the Group agreed to dispose of its entire equity interests in six piped city-gas project companies in Liaoning and Zhejiang provinces to Towngas China in exchange for the allotment and issue of 485 million new ordinary shares by Towngas China. The transaction was approved by Towngas China's independent shareholders at an extraordinary general meeting held on 29 April 2010. As a result of the transaction which was completed on 15 July 2010, the Group's interest in Towngas China increased from approximately 893 million shares to approximately 1,378 million shares and the Group's shareholding was raised from approximately 45.5 per cent. (as at 30 June 2010) to approximately 56.3 per cent. On 13 November 2010, HKCG agreed to take a placing of 250 million shares in Towngas China placed by Kenson Investment Limited through Morgan Stanley & Co. International plc at the aggregate consideration of HK\$908.4 million (including stamp duty), increasing HKCG's shareholding in Towngas China to approximately 66.49 per cent. In January 2013, Towngas China issued and sold 150 million new ordinary shares by placement at a price of HK\$6.31 per share, as a result of which the Group's interest in Towngas China was slightly diluted to 62.37 per cent. After exercising certain share options, as at 30 June 2013, the Group held approximately 62.31 per cent. of the issued share capital of Towngas China. Towngas China, formerly known as Panva Gas Holdings Limited, was listed on the Growth Enterprises Market of the Hong Kong Stock Exchange in April 2001 and subsequently transferred their listing to the Main Board of the Hong Kong Stock Exchange in December 2005. From 2015 to 2020, after several open market purchases of shares and receipt of shares dividends, HKCG held 68.21 per cent. with 2,025,099,415 shares as at 31 December 2020. Going forward, HKCG expects Towngas China to be an integral part of its PRC expansion. See "Certain Relationships and Related Party Transactions".

In June 2015, Standard & Poor's upgraded the long-term corporate credit rating of Towngas China from "BBB" to "BBB+", while maintaining its rating outlook as "stable". In July 2015, Moody's Investors Service upgraded the issuer rating of Towngas China from "Baa2" to "Baa1" with a "stable" outlook rating. These ratings have been affirmed by respective credit agencies in 2020. These ratings, and the ongoing enhancement in HKCG's credit standing in particular, reflect the credit rating agencies' recognition of Towngas China's stable business and credit profile.

In line with the escalating concern for sustainable development, businesses in the international community have started to focus on companies with environmental sustainable operations. In this regard, Towngas China's admission as a constituent stock to the "Hang Seng Corporate Sustainability Index Series" in Hong Kong in 2012 highlighted the industry's recognition of the Group's efforts to fulfil corporate social responsibilities and performance in sustainable development.

Downstream piped city-gas in the PRC

Overview

HKCG's piped city-gas business forms the core of its activities in the PRC. HKCG first began operations in the PRC in 1994, at which time it served approximately 5,000 customers. As at 31 December 2020, HKCG maintained interests in 282 piped city-gas projects (inclusive of piped gas projects re-invested by the Group's companies) in 23 provinces, municipalities and autonomous regions and served, through the Towngas brand, approximately 31.8 million commercial, industrial and residential customers. HKCG, together with Towngas China, is an integral part of its PRC expansion strategy. HKCG continues to invest in new piped city-gas projects from time to time in furtherance of this strategy.

For the 282 downstream piped city-gas projects (inclusive of city-gas projects re-invested by the Group's companies), HKCG expects growth to come primarily from (i) expansion of HKCG's gas pipeline infrastructure by each project, (ii) future development of additional projects, (iii) an increase in gas consumption by the commercial and industrial customers as a result of economic development, (iv) an increase in natural gas as a component of total energy consumption and (v) planned construction of long haul pipelines by the PRC government. Accordingly, HKCG believes that there is potential for expansion, which is also evidenced by the PRC government's policy implementations to emphasise the role of natural gas as a source of energy. See "The Hong Kong and PRC Gas Industry – PRC Downstream Piped City-Gas Industry – Natural Gas Production and Consumption in the PRC". HKCG aims to capture both an increased market share and a steady income stream from an established customers base. Generally, the existing downstream piped city-gas projects focus on attracting large industrial and commercial customer base, as their gas usage rates are of a higher yield than residential customers. For the year ended 31 December 2020, gas sales by volume by HKCG in the PRC were 76 per cent. to commercial and industrial customers and 24 per cent. to residential customers.

HKCG also designs and sells quality gas appliances to customers under its own Bauhinia brand, which it launched in September 2005. See "Intellectual Property". As at 31 December 2020, about 7.3 million Bauhinia units have been sold since its launch. In 2011, Bauhinia received its "certificate of energy conservation" from the Chinese government placing the appliances on the country's official list of energy efficient products. They were also cited as a "model for the industry" at the Gas and Heating China 2011 event held in Chengdu. As at 31 December 2020, about 291 customer centres were in operation offering value-added gas services to customers in addition to providing a showcase for HKCG's products. HKCG is also working closely with manufacturers to build on its experience in Hong Kong to design and produce innovative and effective products that will meet the needs of its customers with built-in safety features.

Pricing and billing

HKCG's gas usage charges in the PRC are based on actual usage on a per cubic metre basis. The gas usage charges per cubic metre vary among the piped city-gas operational locations. HKCG determines the gas usage charges after taking into consideration the wholesale price of gas, operating costs, the price of substitute products and the purchasing power of local residents, subject to the approval of the local pricing bureau.

Connection fees are determined after a detailed analysis of factors such as estimated capital expenditure, number of users, growth in penetration rates, income levels and affordability for local residents. For the year ended 31 December 2020, consolidated gas sales accounted for approximately 83 per cent., and consolidated connection fees accounted for approximately 12 per cent., of consolidated revenues of the piped gas and related business in the PRC, respectively. Both connection fees and gas usage fees are subject to the approval of the local pricing bureau. Future price increases are also subject to the same approval process. Prior to increasing gas usage charges, the local pricing bureau may consider factors such as increases in the wholesale price of gas or operating expenses, inflation and additional capital expenditure. See "The Hong Kong and PRC Gas Industry – PRC Downstream Piped City-Gas Industry – Government Policies Related to the PRC Downstream Piped City-Gas Sector".

Generally, HKCG mails bills each month to its residential, commercial and industrial customers. HKCG reads the metres of the majority of its customers each month so that bills accurately reflect usage, especially the high-volume consumption of its commercial and industrial customers. Customers have the option to pay by cheque, auto-pay, at banks or online. In some PRC piped city-gas locations, customers are also given the option to use pre-paid cards that are purchased and refilled at Towngas customer service centres. The pre-paid cards are inserted into the customers' gas units and gas volume is deducted based on usage. Because most of HKCG's gas sales in the PRC are commercial and industrial, and correspondingly, HKCG's ability to turn off the supply of gas due to non-payment is relatively easy, the bad debt rate is very low.

The following tables summarise the Group's principal piped city-gas project companies in the PRC, separated by HKCG and Towngas China, as at 31 December 2020:

Midstream projects in the PRC

HKCG has also made investments in midstream transportation projects that connect the upstream supplier and the downstream piped city-gas provider. These types of midstream investments complement downstream piped city-gas projects, thus enabling HKCG to strengthen its piped city-gas market interests in the relevant PRC regions and also provide a foothold in cities where HKCG currently does not have a presence.

As at 31 December 2020, HKCG maintained interests in 14 midstream projects. Nine of the projects are traditional midstream transportation projects, three are LNG terminal projects that supply natural gas to downstream piped city-gas provider and the other two are natural gas storage facility projects in underground salt caverns in Jintan district in order to help the Group supplement and regulate gas supplies during the peak winter period for a number of its city-gas projects in eastern China. The projects generate revenues via wholesale and charging downstream customers for each cubic metre of gas shipped from the upstream supplier.

Upstream project in the PRC

HKCG, together with 12 project companies in the southwest region, jointly launched the project to build a shale gas liquefaction plant and gas storage facilities. Upon completion, the project will be able to cater for peak requirements for gas storage in the southwestern region. Going forward, the Group will achieve its goals to interconnect company pipeline networks in the region and provide direct supplies of regular gas from gas source locations to businesses in the vicinity.

New and Clean Energy

HKCG is committed to its activities as a forward-looking, environmental responsible clean energy supplier with a primary focus on gas. HKCG's LPG filling stations provide an environmental friendly alternative for Hong Kong's over 21,000 taxis and light buses instead of traditional heavier polluting fuels. HKCG developed its emerging environmentally-friendly energy businesses in Hong Kong and mainland China, including converting landfill gas into a methane-based heating fuel, coalbed methane liquefaction, clean coal chemicals, conversion and utilisation of biomass, utilisation of industrial and agricultural waste as well as natural gas refilling stations, through its wholly-owned subsidiary ECO Environmental Investments Limited and its subsidiaries (collectively known as "ECO"), which was established in 2000 as the Group's platform for new energy projects. Since its founding, ECO has earned a strong reputation for innovative research and the development of alternative energy sources such as turning low-grade waste materials into high-value energy products. In the year ended 31 December 2020, the new energy business initiatives made a positive contribution to the Group's total revenue and total profit.

Hong Kong

HKCG proactively develops environmental friendly energy businesses in Hong Kong. The Group's activities in connection with of new and clean energy commenced in 1999, when HKCG participated in a pilot project-Hong Kong's first commercial landfill gas utilisation project-that converts landfill gas into a methane-based heating fuel. Other HKCG's environmental friendly energy projects in Hong Kong include:

- using landfill gas as a substitute for naphtha;
- operating five LPG filling stations for taxis and light buses in Hong Kong; and
- using natural gas as feedstock in town gas production.

In 2000, ECO was awarded a 21-year contract for the design, construction and operation of dedicated LPG filling stations in support of the Hong Kong government's initiative to improve urban air quality. There are 12 dedicated LPG stations, five of which are operated by ECO. ECO has filling stations in Chai Wan, Mei Foo, Tuen Mun, West Kowloon and Wan Chai. These five strategically located stations are open 24 hours a day, and are collectively able to serve more than 7,700 taxi visits per day. With Hong Kong's over 18,000 taxi fleet, over 3,200 public light buses and 1,100 private light buses currently running on this environmental friendly fuel, ECO expects demand for LPG to remain steady. ECO's annual gas sales amount to over 50,000 tonnes, or approximately 25 per cent. of the gas sales of the transportation LPG market in Hong Kong, and in 2020, ECO's revenue from this business reached HK\$276 million.

ECO has commissioned the Tseung Kwan O South East New Territories Landfill Gas Utilisation Project in 2017. The collected landfill gas is converted into synthetic natural gas in a treatment facility at the landfill site, then transmitted to the offtake station in Tseng Lan Shue through a 12 km pipeline and finally integrated into the gas supply network. As one of the largest energy conservation and emission reduction environmental projects in Hong Kong, this waste-to-energy project is expected to reduce the emission of carbon dioxide considerably.

PRC

ECO believes the demand exists for environmental friendly energy in the PRC. The PRC's primary energy consumption in 2020 was approximately 3,800 billion cubic metres ("BCM"), which was largely supplied by coal and the importation of crude oil. With the PRC government's restructuring of the mainland's energy mix and the possibility of on-going high international oil prices, HKCG is also attempting to develop alternative energy projects. See "Gas Business Lines – PRC Gas Projects". To capture these new opportunities, ECO is growing and diversifying its various activities in anticipation of market needs. ECO believes these efforts are progressing well, and going forward, the exploitation and utilisation of alternative energy sources, which can be used as substitutes for petroleum products, are expected by ECO to have good prospects, creating more investment opportunities for ECO in the energy sector.

As LNG is in short supply in the PRC, one of HKCG's key strategies in the PRC is to develop a reliable supply of this fuel by converting various types of feedstock such as CBM, into new form of clean energy. Its plant in Shanxi province, where there is an abundant supply of CBM, uses the latest cryogenic technology to convert CBM into LNG. The plant has currently an annual production capacity of 250 million cubic metres. LCBM operation achieved a remarkable profit growth due to the much higher market price of LNG.

By participating in upstream resources development, HKCG will be able to provide additional sources of gas for its downstream piped city-gas projects. These activities, though not currently large in scale, will complement HKCG's piped city-gas activities by providing additional sources of supply, and the knowledge and experience gained will enable its further expansion into similar projects in the future. In 2006, HKCG established a joint venture to create HKCG's CBM liquefaction project in two phases. The operational location makes use of the substantial coal reserves in Shanxi province to turn CBM into LNG. HKCG completed the construction of this liquefaction plant in Jincheng, Shanxi province in December 2008, turning CBM into LCBM. Phase I was completed in 2009 with a designed daily production rate of 250,000 cubic metres.

The liquefaction plant holds a 30-year supply contract with a local coal mine facility, taking advantage of the abundant CBM supplies in the Qinshui Basin. With the extraction of the methane before the commencement of mining activities, significantly less CBM is emitted into the atmosphere when the coal is excavated. LCBM is a substitute for other fossil fuels and it also reduces the emission of greenhouse gases. With a delivery range of over 1,000 km, HKCG's liquefaction plant in Jincheng supplies LCBM to its city-gas projects in Anhui and Jiangxi provinces.

Phase II was commissioned in the first quarter of 2011 and increased the annual production capacity of HKCG's liquefaction plant in Jincheng to approximately 250 million cubic metres of LCBM. This CBM liquefaction and utilisation project became the largest of its kind in China. This project provides an additional gas source for the Group's city-gas projects.

In addition, ECO is devoted to converting waste into energy. In year 2019, ECO has collaborated with a coking plant in Wuzhong City, Ningxia and converts its coke-oven-gas ("COG") into LNG, which would otherwise be flared to atmosphere. The plant construction has been completed with a designed annual production rate of 83,000 metric tons. Its testing and commissioning is scheduled in the second quarter of 2021.

In September 2008, ECO's first large capacity CNG filling station commissioned in Shaanxi province serving heavy duty trucks. The station provides enough clean energy for 250 trucks, mainly engaged in the hauling of coal along dedicated routes in the region. In 2010, HKCG's first LNG filling station came into service in Dalian Development Area, Liaoning province. CNG and LNG, which provides a clean alternative to diesel oil, brings both economic and environmental benefits to the area-truck operators enjoy reduced fuel costs, while lower vehicle emissions contribute to better air quality in the locality. ECO is also providing liquefied natural gas refilling facilities for incoming and outgoing heavy duty trucks and river transport vessels at the logistics port in Jining city, Shandong province, which serves as a link between an upstream railway and the nearby downstream Beijing-Hangzhou canal. These stations provide clean and economic fuel for heavy-duty trucks and public buses in the region.

Despite China's huge coal reserves, the use of coal in its traditional form, (i.e. burning it directly for its energy), is, while convenient, also highly polluting. ECO has therefore been focusing on clean coal utilisation techniques, based on the gasification of coal, to create synthesis gas. Such synthesis gas can in turn be modified chemically into a range of useful products, including methanol, a highly efficient and clean burning fuel, and ethylene glycol-a chemical product which has high economic value as it can be used to produce polyester. ECO has built a coal-based chemical project employing clean coal technology in Erdos, Inner Mongolia. The project was successfully commissioned in 2011 and achieved its capacity of 280,000 tonnes of methanol a year. In 2018, the plant was modified to facilitate ethylene glycol production with designed annual capacity of 240,000 tonnes and Phase I trial production of 120,000 tonnes annual capacity started in May 2018. The project has become the first of its kind which successfully switched from methanol production to ethylene glycol production and the conversion has largely increased the product flexibility of the plant which in turn to optimise its profitability.

With the rapid development of the world economies and the acceleration of industrialisation, air pollution and other climate issues have impassioned the rising awareness and activities in environmental protection. ECO's team combined its own waste oil upgrading technology and ground-breaking processing technology to produce hydrogenated vegetable oil (HVO) as a substitute for petrochemical diesel oil using biological waste oils (including used cooking oil and palm oil mill effluent etc). The plant is situated in Zhangjiagang, Jiangsu Province with Phase I & II total designed capacity of 250,000 tonnes a year. Current diesel facilities including from storage, distribution system and automotive engines system are no need to modify but to apply HVO as drop-in fuels at any mixing ratio up to 100 per cent. Since commissioning from Q3 2020, the HVO facility produced a total of 88,000 tonnes of HVO which is target to European market. One step further for Zhangjiagang Facility is to carry out capacity debottlenecking to reach annual production to 350,000 tonnes per annum, of which 50,000 tonnes are target at Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF). Modification is planned to complete and commissioning by Q4 2021. SAF supply is now working closely with a few regional airlines.

Modern societies rely very heavily on crude oil-derived chemicals and polymers in daily lives. According to reports from the International Energy Agency (IEA), until 2023 the fastest-growing source of global crude oil demand will be from petrochemicals. Besides, millions of tonnes of agricultural are burnt and not utilised. Open burning of such waste releases carbon dioxide, particulate matter (PM) and other pollutants to open air. In order to build a sustainable economy and combat climate change, companies in the energy and chemical industry are required take up the role to innovate and develop better use of renewable feedstock, such as agricultural waste.

ECO has developed a patented novel method to utilise biomass (e.g. corn cob, corn stover, wheat stalk) and extract valuable material and chemicals from it. ECO has started its first biomass utilisation project in Hebei Province with Phase I designed capacity of 240,000 tonnes of agricultural waste a year. The project will be on trial production in 2021.

For sustainable development of the energy industry and the chemical industry, biomass is considered to be the best choice to replace fossil resources with its unique renewability and environmental protection. ECO has developed a high-efficiency utilisation technology of agricultural and forestry waste resources which are the main causes of air pollution in China. The technology avoids burning of the agricultural waste and makes more efficient use of the natural composition and chemical structure of biomass. ECO is developing two innovative environmentally-friendly projects respectively in Tangshan city and Cangzhou city, Hebei province. Both projects employ the self-developed patented technology to undertake hydrolysis separation and further processing of domestic agricultural and forestry waste. The project not only reduced pollution and the use of resources, but also increased local farmers' income, local employment and taxation, and ultimately benefited the country and the people.

In addition, ECO is also progressing in the direction of utilising industrial waste coal tar to produce new types of carbon materials for various purposes. The promotion and development in this field play an important role in the wide application of new energy vehicles and the development of new green materials and smart cities.

Other Business Lines

HKCG owns or wholly owns a number of subsidiaries engaged in a variety of business services, including water treatment and distribution, environmental projects, smart energy projects, property business, jet fuel storage, telecommunications, engineering, manufacturing and international upstream projects. HKCG believes its subsidiaries are a key component in its diversification and expansion plans.

Water

As at 31 December 2020, HKCG held interests in four water subsidiaries, one joint venture and two associates in the PRC for residential, industrial and commercial customers. HKCG entered the water sales market in 2005 and growing consumption, coupled with tariff increases, resulted in increase in total revenue. For the year ended 31 December 2020, consolidated water sales decreased by 4 per cent. to HK\$725.4 million as compared to the year ended 31 December 2019.

The following is a summary of HKCG's water projects:

- HKCG owns a 50 per cent. stake and China-Singapore Suzhou Industrial Park Public Utilities Development Group Company Limited owns a 50 per cent. interest in the Suzhou Project. HKCG's equity investment in the project was HK\$848.1 million as at 31 December 2020. The project holds an exclusive right to distribute water and provide water sewage treatment within the Suzhou Industrial Park for 30 years. Current capacities are 650,000 cubic metres of water supply and 500,000 cubic metres of sewage a day.
- HKCG owns a 49 per cent. stake in the China-Singapore Suzhou Industrial Park Environmental Technology Company Limited, which was specially established in 2011 to treat wastewater generated by an electronic component production plant in the Suzhou Industrial Park. HKCG's equity investment in the project was HK\$110.7 million as at 31 December 2020.
- HKCG owns an 80 per cent. stake and the joint venture partner owns a 20 per cent. interest in the Wujiang Project, which became operational in 2005. HKCG's equity investment in the project was HK\$736.8 million as at 31 December 2020. The project holds an exclusive right to distribute water for 30 years in Wujiang City.

- HKCG owns a 75 per cent. stake and Wuhu City Construction Investment Company Limited owns a 25 per cent. interest in the Wuhu Project, the acquisition of which was in September 2005. HKCG's equity investment in the project was HK\$308.9 million as at 31 December 2020. The project holds an exclusive right to distribute water in Wuhu City and its suburbs for 30 years, however the transfer of land use rights are still pending. See "Risk Factors Risks Relating to HKCG's Business Some of HKCG's PRC joint ventures do not possess valid land use rights, building ownership certificates or valid leases to certain properties". The Wuhu Project commissioned its large-scale fresh water project in August 2009. Consisting of 2,000 km of pipeline and four water plants, the project brings fresh water from the Yangtze River to Wuhu and Nanling in Anhui province.
- HKCG owns a 100 per cent. stake in the Maanshan Project, which became operational in 2012. HKCG's equity investment in the Maanshan Project was HK\$256.2 million as at 31 December 2020. The Maanshan Project holds an exclusive right to distribute water for 30 years in Zhengpugang New District of Maanshan City.
- HKCG owns a 100 per cent. stake in the Jiangbei Project, which became operational in 2013. HKCG's equity investment in the project was HK\$335.2 million as at 31 December 2020. The Jiangbei Project holds an exclusive right to distribute water for 30 years in the starting area of Jiangbei Concentration Zone in Anhui province.
- HKCG owns a 26.7 per cent. stake and Foshan Water Industry Group Company Limited and Foshan Financial Investment Holding Company Limited together own 73.3 per cent. interest in the Foshan Project. HKCG's acquisition of the Foshan Project was completed in April 2019. HKCG's equity investment in the Foshan Project was HK\$658.9 million as at 31 December 2020. This is HKCG's first water project in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macau Greater Bay Area ("Greater Bay Area"). The Foshan Project has 9 water plants with a combined capacity of supplying 1.64 million cubic metres of water every day, covering the major areas in Foshan city and servicing a total area of 1,750 square kilometres with over 960,000 households.

Environmental Projects

Capitalising on HKCG's rich experience in sewage treatment, Hong Kong and China Environmental Holdings Company Limited (Hua Yan Environmental) was established to coordinate the development of environmental governance businesses. As at 31 December 2020, HKCG held interests in four environmental projects in the PRC.

The urban organic waste resource utilisation project in Suzhou Industrial Park, Jiangsu province made satisfactory progress during the year 2020. The project has cumulatively processed over 170,000 tonnes of organic waste to date and produced nearly 5 million cubic metres of bio-natural gas. Plans were also made for a new food waste treatment line to serve residential districts with a designed daily capacity of 300 tonnes of food waste. It is expected to go into operation in June 2021.

A food waste resource utilisation project in Tongling, Anhui province was acquired in July 2020. With a working capacity of 100 tonnes per day, the plant has already processed 25,000 tonnes of food waste during the year 2020. The project is currently being expanded to increase its annual capacity to a total of 73,000 tonnes by the second half of 2021.

Smart Energy

HKCG has been involved in the Distributed Energy Systems (DES) business since 2017. Widely acclaimed by C&I customers, DES offers a decentralised energy supply for generating electricity as well as producing hot water, steam and chilled water using waste heat. The economies of scale available with DES have enabled to extend these efficient, cost-saving systems into residential districts for space heating and industrial development zones for steam supply.

In order to expand sustainable energy business, a Smart Energy system is developed that utilises artificial intelligence ("AI"), big data and the Internet to achieve higher energy efficiency and lower emissions. The system covers a portfolio of electricity, steam, natural gas, renewable energy and energy storage. During the year 2020, 40 solar photovoltaic power generation projects and five energy storage projects were acquired, with a total capacity of 300 megawatts and total storage capacity of over 100 megawatt-hours respectively.

Extended Businesses/Other Businesses

In connection with the Group's integrated green energy services, the Group is currently working to upgrade and transform a number of the Group's services, in addition to provision of natural gas to industrial and commercial customers. Examples include the Group's diversification into cooling, heating, steam and hot water, together with other energy-saving, value-added services. A laundry business, under the "C-Tech" brand, has been commissioned, and efforts are being made to develop the industrial and commercial applications in this market to further gas usage. In line with this extended services strategy, the Group continues to expand the scope of services available on the cloud platform of the Group's online service centre under the Group's Towngas Lifestyle initiative. Further to gas insurance and e-commerce sales services, a brand known as "Towngas Home" has been launched to offer premium household services to residential customers. Premium domestic services relating to kitchenware, heat supply and water purification are also being provided to residential customers under the "Cosy Home" brand.

Property Business

HKCG owns the commercial area of the Grand Waterfront project at Ma Tau Kwok, which is approximately 150,000 square feet. Rental of the commercial area started in the second half of 2007. As at 31 December 2020, over 75 per cent. of the 150,000 square feet space had been leased by retail tenants and the leasing prospect remains positive following the economic recovery. HKCG also owns approximately 300 parking spaces at Grand Waterfront, which generate recurring rental income.

HKCG has approximately 15.8 per cent. interest in the company that owns 100 per cent. of the IFC complex. The high-end shopping mall and office towers of the IFC, located near the waterfront in Central, Hong Kong, were substantially leased as at 31 December 2020. With inbound tourism being severely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, the occupancy rate of the IFC's hotel complex (comprising the Four Seasons Hotel and serviced apartments) was also negatively affected.

Jet Fuel Storage

In 2002, ECO obtained a 40-year franchise with the Airport Authority Hong Kong ("HKAA") to build and operate an aviation fuel facility, to meet the aviation fuel requirements of the Hong Kong International Airport. Linked directly to the airport via submarine pipelines, the facility consists of a jetty with two berths, which can respectively accommodate tankers up to 80,000 and 50,000 tonnes at the same time, as well as a tank farm with eight mega-sized aviation fuel tanks with a total storage capacity of 264,000 cubic metres.

With the commissioning of first phase of this project at the beginning of 2010, followed by the completion of subsequent phase at the end of 2010, ECO Aviation Fuel Facility ("ECO AFF"), the facility designed, constructed and operated by ECO to provide fuel for aircraft at the Hong Kong International Airport, is fully operational and currently receives, stores and supplies 100 per cent. of the aviation fuel needs of the Hong Kong International Airport. 2011 represented the first full year of operation for ECO AFF and its throughput amounted to more than 5.5 million tonnes of fuel during that year. In 2020, ECO AFF received 4.15 million cubic metres of aviation fuel while airport uplift is 4.18 million cubic metres. ECO AFF maintained its ISO 14001 since 2011.

Telecommunications

HKCG's wholly owned subsidiary, Towngas Telecommunications Company Limited ("TGT"), is one of the Hong Kong's premier fixed telecommunications network operators. As a carrier-neutral telecommunications service provider, by leveraging on Glass-In-Gas ("GIG") and Glass Along-Gas ("GAG") technology, TGT has created a fibre network providing high-end telecommunication infrastructure services and quality network solutions and built telecommunications duct in Liaoning, Shandong, Jiangsu, and Shandong in the mainland China, offering substantial synergies and economies of scale for telecommunication carriers, service providers and large corporations. TGT cooperates with local gas supplier to further apply GIG technology in the mainland China. In addition, TGT has been providing block wiring services to numerous development projects, including residential and commercial buildings.

TGT has three core businesses, network connectivity, data centre and cloud computing. TGT has expanded HKCG business in the mainland China since 2007 and has now founded 18 projects in Hong Kong and mainland China. HKCG has established seven networked data centres in Hong Kong, Beijing, Jinan, Dalian, Dongguan and Harbin, which are designed to accommodate up to 16,000 server racks. With the combination of professional data management and effective network communication service, each data centre can be a backup for each other. TGT data centres meet TIA 942 Rated 3+ international standard and have obtained several international standard certifications, such as CSA Star, ISO 9001, ISO14001, ISO 20000 and ISO 27001.

By integrating reliable and high-speed connectivity with advantages such as outstanding infrastructure, TGT is embracing the opportunities brought by "big data era", "5G wireless network" and "the Internet of Things" by enhancing its advanced fibre-optic network and maximising usage of its networked data centres and cloud platform, so as to meet the growing demand for telecommunications services as well as data analysis and storage.

Engineering

HKCG's wholly owned subsidiary U-Tech is an integrated utility contractor for water, drainage, sewage, electricity and telecommunications pipeline projects. U-Tech began Hong Kong operations in 1998 and contributes a small portion to HKCG's total revenue.

U-Tech employs "trenchless" technology to carry out many pipeline construction projects without the need to excavate long trenches in roads. This process ensures minimal disturbance to the environment and reduces the inconvenience caused to the general public. Having built a niche as a successful participant in the "trenchless" technology market, U-Tech has been extending this specialist knowledge to a number of leading utilities and property developers throughout Hong Kong.

U-Tech has completed a number of contracts for the replacement and rehabilitation of water mains and construction of water service reservoirs for the Water Supplies Department. Further, U-Tech has also carried out several government cooling water mains rehabilitation projects. U-Tech also provided consultancy services to third parties. In 2008, U-Tech provided consultancy services in the operations and maintenance systems to an upstream natural gas transmission company in Macau. In September 2018, U-Tech was placed on the "Group C" Waterworks Contractor List under the Development Bureau of Hong Kong. This launched a whole new era for U-Tech, as it was qualified to tender for any water works contracts of unlimited value and thus could undertake the most complex, mega-scale water projects in Hong Kong. In 2018, U-Tech gained a new contract for construction of a fresh water service reservoir and the associated water mains in Fanling for the Water Supplies Department and the works are in progress. Furthermore, in 2021, U-Tech was also promoted to the "Group B" Roads & Drainage

Contractor List under the Development Bureau of Hong Kong. This qualifies U-Tech to undertake roads and drainage related projects of a value up to HK\$400 million, thus expanding U-Tech's scope of work for the local government.

Manufacturing

GH-Fusion Corporation Limited was formed in 2000 to manufacture and supply polyethylene ("PE") pipe fitting products and jointing equipment for gas and water piping systems. In September 2012, broadening the product scope and offering a total solutions package to customers, G-Tech Piping System Company Limited, the Group's wholly owned subsidiary, was established to manufacture quality PE piping. In addition to providing HKCG with a supply of PE piping, the ability to manufacture and supply PE piping within the Group ensures that the PE piping supplied would meet the standards of safety and quality required by HKCG. G-Tech Piping Technologies Limited was formed in 2012 to extend the PE material supply to PE pipes produced in the two production plants in China.

Extending this strategy, M-Tech Metering Solutions Company Limited was established in 2011 to develop and manufacture advanced electronic gas metres, using the Micro-Electro-Mechanical System ("MEMS") gas mass-flow measurement technology. In 2017, M-Tech developed and launched an advanced small-scale commercial metre with MEMS technology to provide more options for gas users. This metre incorporates a Near Field Communication payment capability as well as smart metering functions for the compilation of tier tariffs in the PRC. Committed to customer satisfaction, M-Tech continues to develop smart metres for residential applications.

International Upstream Project

HKCG's first overseas on-shore oilfield project was added to its energy resource portfolio in 2012. HKCG acquired a 60 per cent. effective stake in an onshore oil exploration and production project in Thailand. The acquired Blocks SW1A, L33/43 and L44/43 are situated approximately 250 km north of Bangkok. The offtake from the blocks have been contracted with PTT Public Company Limited at formula-driven prices linked to the price of Singapore Product Oil. Concession for Block SW1A expired in July 2016 and had been extended by ten years to July 2026, while the other two are expiring by July 2032, and with an option to extend such concession rights by an additional ten years.

Suppliers and Customers

Suppliers

HKCG's principal supplies are natural gas and naphtha, the two feedstocks used in the production of town gas. During the year ended 31 December 2020, in Hong Kong, HKCG purchased 100 per cent. of its natural gas from Guangdong Dapeng and another supplier. Natural gas accounts for approximately 60 per cent. of HKCG's total feedstock requirements. HKCG purchased 100 per cent. of its naphtha from several suppliers from Southeast Asian countries and Australia.

Natural Gas

HKCG signed a 25-year agreement with its natural gas supplier, Guangdong Dapeng, in 2004 on favourable terms relative to world prices. All of HKCG's natural gas for its Hong Kong operations is supplied from Guangdong Dapeng and another supplier which supply approximately 60 per cent. of HKCG's feedstock requirements. However, the use of dual feedstocks means HKCG's town gas production facilities can switch to naphtha if natural gas supply problems occur. See "Gas Business Lines – Piped City-Gas Business in Hong Kong – Gas Processing" and "Risk Factors – Risks Relating to HKCG's Business – Due to the "take-or-pay" nature of HKCG's natural gas purchase contracts for its piped city-gas business, HKCG could be exposed to imbalances between the supply of natural gas by its suppliers and the purchase of gas by its customers".

In the PRC, HKCG sources its gas requirements primarily from large upstream oil and gas production companies. Demand for raw materials in the PRC is high, and HKCG is seeking new means to increase its supply by formalising arrangements with large upstream suppliers as well as investing in upstream projects. See "New and Clean Energy – PRC".

Naphtha

Naphtha is the other principal feedstock in town gas, and HKCG has term contracts with several suppliers from Southeast Asian countries and Australia. Naphtha is generally more expensive than natural gas, and HKCG's contracts are correspondingly priced subject to market price fluctuations and the quantity purchased. The contracts typically have a minimum purchase requirement.

Customers

As at 31 December 2020, in Hong Kong, HKCG was serving approximately 1.94 million piped city-gas customers, an increase of 0.5 per cent. from approximately 1.93 million as at 31 December 2019. As at 31 December 2020, in the PRC, the Group, including Towngas China, was serving approximately 31.8 million piped city-gas customers, an increase of 7 per cent. from approximately 29.8 million as at 31 December 2019.

In the coming years in the PRC, HKCG aims to increase its customer base in the commercial and industrial market segments as opposed to the residential market segment. In the commercial and industrial market segments, HKCG has greater pricing power, the ability to deliver its products in bulk and potentially earn higher margins. A shift to the commercial and industrial market segments would increase contribution from recurring piped city-gas revenues. Gas sales by volume from HKCG in the PRC were approximately 76 per cent. to commercial and industrial customers and approximately 24 per cent. to residential customers for the year ended 31 December 2020.

Similarly, in Hong Kong, HKCG aims to increase its current share of commercial and industrial customers. Due to enhanced COVID-19 social distancing measures and restrictions on restaurant operating hours by the government in 2020, many of HKCG's residential customers chose to cook at home. This, in turn, led to a rise in residential gas consumption. HKCG's gas sales by volume in Hong Kong were approximately 60 per cent. to residential customers and approximately 40 per cent. to commercial and industrial customers for the year ended 31 December 2020.

Operational and Information Systems

To effectively operate its underground pipeline network in Hong Kong, HKCG established a control centre that is manned 24 hours a day. In addition, HKCG currently utilises a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition ("SCADA") system for real-time monitoring of its more than 4,000 real-time telemetry and data points across its network and all its strategic pressure-regulating stations. The SCADA system runs on active-standby configuration to provide non-stop operation. Reliability is further enhanced by a third identical server in a remote backup centre. HKCG also uses the Geographic Information System ("GIS") to computerise the records of the piped city-gas supply network. With the SCADA and GIS tools, the control centre can monitor and coordinate all the activities on the underground pipeline network to ensure a high level of gas supply reliability. These monitoring systems together with HKCG's experience in network control are implemented in the PRC projects to improve their operational efficiency as well as the quality of services delivered to their customers.

HKCG's information technology ("IT") applications platform consists of three critical systems and a number of core business support systems. The three critical systems include an Enterprise Resource Planning system, a SAP-based Customer Consumption Management System and a Siebel-based Customer Relationship Management System. The core business support systems include a suite of Business Intelligence tools, Project and Work Management systems, Call Centre systems and various mobility applications. HKCG's IT systems are integrated to streamline data flow among business processes and accommodate its business environment and needs. HKCG also maintains critical systems in a backup facility to reduce the impact to operations caused by IT system interruptions. The backup facility is synchronised real-time on dedicated connections with the operating site available for immediate engagement.

In 2013, in order to address integration challenges associated business growth as well as increased diversity of computer systems used by different business ventures, HKCG launched the 'Towngas Management System' to create a common platform for the different computer systems to share information, create linkages and facilitate inter system communication.

Competition

HKCG's core business in Hong Kong is downstream piped city-gas supply to residential, commercial and industrial customers. HKCG has an approximately 74 per cent. penetration rate to Hong Kong households, and HKCG believes that its pipelines are within easy connection reach of approximately 86 per cent. of Hong Kong's households. As the barriers to entering the piped city-gas market are burdensome, including heavy initial expenditure and governmental approvals for infrastructure construction, HKCG does not anticipate direct competition in the downstream piped city-gas business in Hong Kong. However, HKCG does face competition in the wider energy market, especially from electrical power companies, LPG and diesel fuel suppliers.

HKCG's core business in the PRC is downstream piped city-gas supply to residential, commercial and industrial customers, and recently HKCG has developed midstream and upstream projects via joint ventures. See "Gas Business Lines – PRC Gas Projects". Within most areas where HKCG operates, the project possesses exclusive rights for gas distribution for a term of 30 years, and therefore there is no direct competition in those areas. However, HKCG does face competition in the wider energy market, especially from suppliers of LPG, diesel, coal and electricity, and potentially piped city-gas and in areas where exclusive rights have not been secured.

Environmental Matters and Safety

HKCG's operations are subject to environmental laws and regulations covering air pollution, noise pollution, water pollution and the administration of hazardous substances. HKCG has environmental management systems in place to monitor its environmental performance and believes that it is in compliance with all applicable environmental laws and regulations. The Tai Po plant has earned the ISO 14001 certification in respect of environmental protection.

In respect of safety, HKCG strives for continuous improvement in its safety performance for its employees, contractors, customers and the public. The safety management system was certified with ISO 45001 standard in 2019 and HKCG's customers benefit from its established safety measures. Under

HKCG's regular safety inspection programme, Towngas technicians initiate checks on piping and gas metres, as well as relevant appliances in customer premises, at least once every 18 months. Ensuring a regular and systematic service approach to gas safety has helped to reduce gas leakage incidents in HKCG's areas of operation. See "Risk Factors – Risks Relating to HKCG's Business – HKCG's non-compliance with environmental regulations, including those to be implemented in the future, in Hong Kong and the PRC may result in material adverse effects on its results of operations".

Environment

At HKCG, environmental considerations are central to the decision-making and management processes. The environmental performance and initiatives are overseen by the Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) Committee which is headed by the HKCG Managing Director appointed by the Board, with the support of the Environmental Working Committee and Corporate Sustainability Department to arrange environmental programmes and implement the environmental management system.

HKCG has been investing in technologies and businesses that reduce negative environmental impact and fight against climate change. In 2017, green bonds were issued to finance environmental friendly wasteto-energy investments, including Towngas' third landfill gas utilization project at the South East New Territories ("SENT") landfill site in Hong Kong, to further support cleaner fuel mix and sustainable sources of renewable energy. To avoid business interruptions arising from major climate change risks, HKCG conducted a holistic Corporate Climate Change Risk Assessment to its operations in Hong Kong, and has begun extending the risk assessment to projects in PRC. In 2020, HKCG also conducted a comprehensive assessment of transition risks and opportunities across its energy-related businesses in Hong Kong and mainland China under various climate scenarios and time frames. By deepening its understanding of how policy changes, developments in technology, reputational impacts and shifts in market preferences could have a significant impact on its businesses, both positively and negatively, HKCG is able to develop plans to mitigate risks and build adaptation and resilience strategies. The carbon intensity of its Hong Kong gas production in 2020 was dropped 23 per cent as compared with its 2005 baseline. Due to maintenance work at the Northeast New Territories Landfill, HKCG fell short of its target to achieve a 30 per cent decrease in carbon intensity for 2020. HKCG will, however, strive to meet this target in future.

HKCG endeavours to conserve resources use. The headquarters in Hong Kong is the first non-residential building in the city to be awarded the Final Platinum rating under the BEAM Plus Existing Building Version 1.2. Major green initiatives include the replacement of chillers with a high-energy efficiency, oil-free, variable-speed, water-cooled chiller and installation of a rainwater harvesting tank. HKCG is also in progress to obtain ISO 50001 energy management system certification as well as renew BEAM Plus Existing Buildings to the new version for the headquarters. HKCG's approach to waste management is underpinned by the "5R" principle-Replace, Reduce, Reuse, Recover and Recycle and has received the Wastewi\$e Certificate at Excellence Level for 17 consecutive years. The Used Gas Appliance Recycling Programme has been launched since 2003 to collect used appliances from customers for metal recycling. The revenue raised was used to fund further environmental friendly practices and educational activities.

Being a responsible public utility company, HKCG responsibility is not limited to its own operations. HKCG also promotes environmental awareness amongst its stakeholders. A great variety of activities such as seminars, tours and workshops were organised among its employees and contractors. Green cooking tips leaflets were also published to promote low-carbon lifestyle to customers. HKCG also supports activities organised by non-governmental organisations which support green initiatives both in Hong Kong and in the PRC to further extend the message to the public. These activities range from the Green Earth's five-year Plantation Enrichment Project to Food Grace's Mooncake Recycling Programme and the World Wide Fund's Earth Hour initiative.

These efforts are widely recognised. HKCG was ranked first on both the fifth Hong Kong Business Sustainability Index and the first Greater Bay Area (GBA) Business Sustainability Index, organised by The Chinese University of Hong Kong Business School's Centre for Business Sustainability. HKCG is also the only company on the GBA Business Sustainability Index to be ranked at the highest Exemplar tier. HKCG was also awarded by the Environmental Campaign Committee on the "2019 Hong Kong Awards for Environmental Excellence – Gold Award (Public and Community Services)", marking the

fourth time that HKCG was recognised at the Awards and the second time it received the Gold Award since 2011. The "BOCHK Corporate Environmental Leadership Awards 2018 – Gold Award (Manufacturing section)" and "Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Bay Area Environmental Leadership Recognition Award" were also awarded by the Federation of Hong Kong Industries and Bank of China (Hong Kong) recognising HKCG's achievement to protect the environment not only in Hong Kong, but also in the Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Bay Area.

Safety

HKCG has successfully upgraded to ISO 45001 certification for occupational safety and health management of its gas production, gas transportation and gas utilisation. HKCG's asset management system for its gas production plants, transmission and distribution network has been certified with ISO 55001 since 2014.

Under the OSH management system, HKCG has a comprehensive risk and opportunity management system to identify work-related hazards through risk analysis and evaluation, along with control measures. Opportunities are also identified for continual improvement.

HKCG continues to implement a number of measures to enhance safety. The first of these is the strengthening of HKCG's communications and contingency management in the event of an emergency. Supporting onsite requirements, HKCG's emergency operation vehicles carry the most up-to-date information on its underground pipeline locations throughout Hong Kong. The emergency operation vehicles are equipped with computers to enable onsite staff to locate information immediately as required. Additionally, HKCG has a robust Corporate Crisis Management Plan in place, with a three-tiered approach for recovering from an emergency situation in a timely and effective manner, while ensuring disruptions to the public are kept to a minimum. Regular training exercises and drills on crisis management are conducted for staff for better emergency preparedness. HKCG also conducts regular table-top exercises to further enhance its management team's ability to handle emergency situations.

Besides, HKCG continuously monitor the facilities in order to identify potential hazards and mitigate risks while looking for ways to make improvements. From the 24-hour Grid Control Centre at North Point headquarters in Hong Kong, and able to monitor HKCG's network in real time. Despite the fact that HKCG's operations and appliances meet stringent international standards, HKCG continues to make every effort to enhance its safety procedures. HKCG's pipes are checked rigorously from once to six times a year to determine their condition and cheque for leaks. HKCG also inspects in-home pipes inspections at least every 18 months. In addition to checking pipe conditions within customer premises, these inspections help to identify appliances in need of maintenance or repair. Customers are also encouraged to upgrade their appliances if their current equipment is out of date. These regular inspections were expanded in 2008, when they were extended to cover the supply pipes of HKCG's commercial customers as well.

As a leading energy supplier in Hong Kong and mainland China, HKCG connects with outside community groups as part of its advocacy of health and safety. On the other hand, as a public utility, HKCG works closely with the government authorities to formulate strategic plans, such as a facilities utilisation framework and preventive maintenance index, to ensure optimal safety by sharing the safety experience and standards with corporations, contractors and professional organisations.

An emergency logging system has greatly improved emergency communications with the intelligent tracking of emergency reports and follow up action; a new "Riser Inspection Robotic System", with its gas leak detector and video camera, cheques service pipes and risers on external buildings walls; and the implementation of a second generation geographic information system, means that with more detailed mapping information, network safety and operational efficiencies are greatly enhanced. Driving this culture of safety among the contractors, HKCG has launched an incentive scheme to enhance safety, quality and environmental protection performance in its new pipe laying contracts.

Safety Innovations

HKCG makes extensive use of technology to ensure the facilities are safe and operating properly, in keeping with its philosophy of "Growth = innovation x implementation". HKCG is the first organisation in Hong Kong to adopt LED technology for enhancing tail-lifts and rear-door safety on light goods

vehicles (LGV) to increase visual awareness among other road users and reduce the risk of road work and traffic accidents. All of HKCG's company LGV tail-lifts, and those of its contractors' LGVs in Hong Kong, had these LED lights installed since 2017.

In 2019, HKCG has invested in new robotics technology such as an Automatic Guided Vehicle that assists employees in performing heavy lifting duties and enables the frontline staff to work more safely and efficiently. HKCG also developed a micro-tunneling machine to facilitate trenchless pipeline insertion device, which is a type of corer machine that allows syphon pipes to be removed without digging up roadways, thereby reducing the need for excavation work before pipe insertion.

In 2020, HKCG applied AI to monitor third party construction works near its network to reduce the risk of pipe damage. The AI system can identify heavy machinery that may endanger its pipelines and trigger visual and audio alarms at sites and send alert messages or emails to its site staff for instant follow-up.

In addition to safety measures in Hong Kong, HKCG has strong safety commitment in the PRC as well. In the PRC, HKCG carries out regular safety inspections, checking not only on the condition of gas pipes and installations but also the gas appliances used. As potential risks are immediately addressed, HKCG has been able to significantly reduce the number of gas incidents.

Internally, HKCG makes every effort to imbue a safety mind-set not only among the employees but also the partners and contractors. Group Safety Committee Meetings are also held every month at the senior management level. In addition to addressing any potential safety issues which may arise, members of the Group Safety Committee will carry out inspections in person to ensure that safety levels are being met.

HKCG has launched a "General Manager Monthly Safety and Risk Management Programme", which ensures the direct commitment of the most senior members of management. HKCG's sophisticated network monitoring "Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition System", implemented in more than 30 project companies, continues to improve network safety. The effectiveness of this system is such that it is increasingly being adopted by other gas companies in the PRC.

HKCG also implemented a number of "Key Management Focus" projects addressing safety and risk to further improve the safety performance while the safety audit scoring system received a boost with the implementation of "Five Star+ Safety and Risk Management Audit Programme".

Regional Joint Venture General Manager Safety Conferences were held in Changchun and Chongqing in 2009 and a technical workshop was held for water projects on safety and risk management audit along with table top exercises which helped to enhance emergency handling procedures. Also, health, safety and environment workshops were held regularly in various regions and provinces, such as Jiangsu, Shandong, Guangdong, Sichuan for safety and risk management personnel of the project companies to share experiences on safety and risk management in Hong Kong and the mainland China which helped to strengthen the safety culture across the business operations.

A highlight in 2009 was the establishment of G5+ Polyethylene ("PE") piping standards, with four other major gas companies in Beijing, Chengdu, Guangzhou and Shenzhen, to enhance the quality and integrity of PE piping in the PRC. Though PE pipes are extensively used in the gas business, the technology is relatively new on the mainland China. Being one of the first to introduce PE technology into the country, HKCG has taken a major lead in the mainland's gas industry.

Over the years, this safety commitment has reaped significant results in the PRC. HKCG has won a number of public accolades for its safety practises.

The "Year of Safe Production" campaigns, first launched in Xi'an in 2008, is being rolled out throughout the operations in the PRC. The campaign took place in northeastern China and southwestern China in 2009 and 2010 respectively, followed by Shandong in 2011 and extended to three further provinces-Jiangsu, Zhejiang and Anhui in 2012, and other regions and provinces during 2013 to 2017. Under this initiative, an analysis of operations, based on geographical location, climate, operations history, safety awareness and other key factors, is carried out to identify key risk areas and establish key performance indicators to address these risks. To evaluate the results of the Group's effort over the past

decade in organising the campaign, the Group's Safety Committee conducted inspections in the northeastern and northern regions of China in 2017. The Group's Safety Committee mandated that various safety measures remain in place to ensure safety of gas supply.

2014 was themed the "Year of Safety Re-inspection" across Towngas China, and comprehensive production safety re-inspections were conducted on gas facilities, installations and network around mainland China. During the year, the first Pipeline Network Operation Competition organised by Towngas China aiming to test participants' technical knowledge, their knowledge of emergency procedures, work regulations and procedures, and proper handling of equipment was held amongst HKCG's project companies in the PRC.

During 2015 to 2017, Towngas China continued to fully implement the "Enterprise Risk Management System" in which project companies were required to carry out regular corporate risk self-assessment based on nine aspects, namely, the risks of production equipment and facilities, operational risks, legal risks, material supply risks, financial risks, risks of health, safety and environment, risks of human resources, market risks and the risks of information technology systems. Risk Management Committees were established at the Group and project company levels to put corporate risk assessment into action so as to boost their risk control capabilities and to ensure the corporate risk management plan can be implemented in a systematic and effective manner. In 2017, 22 project companies were selected for a survey on their corporate risk management and control measures taken to gauge their risk management capabilities. In 2020, HKCG further updated the Enterprise Risk Management System by adding the 10th risk – Ethics and Integrity, and standardizing the level of risk in accordance with latest requirement.

General manager of each project company conducts a safety inspection of the operational gas networks every month to identify and address any issues that arise. In addition, two cross-examinations among the project companies are carried out every year. To further emphasise the importance of safe operations and enhance management quality of work safety, the Annual Regional Safety Patrol, led by HKCG's Managing Director, was conducted in Northeast China and North China in 2017.

For ECO mainland projects, HKCG has implemented the process safety management system and various measures have been developed to control or mitigate major risks. In 2015, a bowtie analysis (safety barriers analysis) was introduced to ECO chemical business, allowing the management to identify potential risks arising at different stages of the chemical plants' operation and to set up barriers to mitigate these risks by systematically managing processes, procedures and behaviours. Findings from the bowtie analysis were regularly reviewed by the top management to ensure that the ECO safety management system has mapped and implemented all barriers at the plants.

In 2016, process safety key performance indicators ("KPIs") were established to monitor the process safety of ECO mainland chemical plants. Moreover, HKCG implemented a Mechanical Integrity ("MI") enhancement scheme at two chemical plants, where a Failure Mode, Effect and Criticality Analysis ("FMECA") was carried out to determine critical equipment with a relatively high priority, allowing the management to optimise their preventive maintenance strategy more effectively.

HKCG also reviewed the safety audit scheme in place for ECO mainland chemical plants, after which a post-audit enhancement programme was launched. In 2017, a comprehensive safety risk workshop and Layer of Protection Analysis ("LOPA") training for all safety managers at HKCG ECO mainland projects was conducted. Also, HSE workshop, process safety training courses and on-line safety quiz were organised for ECO mainland employees during the year.

In 2020, HKCG conducted safety inspections for all its chemical plants in mainland China that were either in operation or under construction. Three comprehensive safety inspection programmes were specially organised across major JVs to assess COVID-19 safety measures as well as lessons learned from the 2020 Beirut port explosion and other major incidents in mainland China. By adhering to best practices in Process Safety Management ("PSM"), such as following inherent safety designs and conducting in-depth Hazard and Operability ("HAZOP") studies and Bowtie Analysis, there were no major incidents at its chemical plants in 2020.

The Corporate Sustainability Department ("CSD"), situated in HKCG's head office in Hong Kong, holds both advisory and monitoring roles and responsibilities in all matters in relation to health, safety and environment ("HSE") within the Group. It provides professional support to assist the PRC project companies in developing and implementing proactive safety and risk management programmes, aiming at reducing the risk level of all production operations to an acceptable level. These programmes include, but are not limited to, carrying out regular safety inspections of all project companies to identify safety deficiencies, providing safety training to the front-line employees to cultivate their safety culture and to enhance their safety awareness.

Litigation

Although HKCG may, from time to time, be involved in litigation and claims arising out of its operations in the normal course of business, HKCG is not currently a party to any material legal proceedings out of the ordinary course of business. In addition, HKCG is not aware of any material legal or governmental proceedings against it, or contemplated to be brought against it, under any environmental statute or regulation to which HKCG is subject.

Insurance

HKCG's insurance programme covers not only the types of insurance required by law but also covers insurance protecting HKCG's assets and legal liability arising from its business operation, in amounts which management believes are reasonable and appropriate. Types of insurance taking out by HKCG include but are not limited to Property All Risk, Business Interruption, Public Liability, Employees' Compensation, Motor, Directors & Officers Liability Insurance. See "Risk Factors – Risks Related to HKCG's Business – HKCG's operations are subject to the risks, some of which may not be fully covered by insurance, of equipment and systems failure, accidents, interruptions and terrorism".

As at 31 December 2020, including its subsidiaries but not joint ventures or associates, HKCG employed a total of 53,768 employees, comprising 51,404 employees outside Hong Kong and 2,728 employees in Hong Kong.

Total remuneration for employees, including its subsidiaries but not joint ventures or associates, amounted to HK\$3,284.2 million for the year ended 31 December 2020, a decrease of HK\$201 million as compared to year ended 31 December 2019.

HKCG's aim is to develop a quality work environment that will attract, encourage and retain quality people within the organisation. HKCG also aims for its employees to match HKCG's commitment to provide safe and reliable gas services as efficiently and with as much care as possible and for its employees to continue to work towards the preservation and conservation of the environment in every aspect of their activities. Therefore, HKCG has a merit-based recruitment policy and is committed to hiring employees with the skills and knowledge to undertake their responsibilities.

Training

HKCG provides a comprehensive programme of on-going job education and training, including formal courses at external training centres and in-house training as well as on-the-job training.

The Towngas Engineering Academy (TEA) was established in 2009, operating a training centre in North Point, Hong Kong and opened the Shandong Hong Kong and China Gas Training Institute in Mainland China, to nurture a highly skilled pool of professional talents for Towngas both in Hong Kong and Mainland China, including HKCG's partner associates. TEA continues to develop and implement curricula including gas engineering knowledge, technical and cultural training for building professional competence of frontline staff and engineering personnel within the Group. Besides internal and vocational training, in recent years, TEA has extended programs to the teenage public aims at arousing youngsters' interest towards the gas industry.

HKCG believes its reputation for high quality service is spreading rapidly in the PRC as its project companies learn from global practises and gain a view of what other successful companies are doing in their quality control activities around the world. HKCG's training activities have been successful in the PRC, with management and employees showing enthusiasm to learn from international best practises and the latest industry developments.

Employee Safety

Hong Kong

HKCG aims for a record of zero accidents and fully complies with all relevant health and safety legislation, as well as committed to protecting its staff and contractors against health and safety risks from its operations. This commitment and approach to safety management are clearly outlined in the Corporate Health, Safety and Environment (HSE) Policy.

HKCG continues to expand its communications, training and other promotional activities. HKCG works to ensure the physical and mental health of every member within the Group, and therefore, HKCG has established a friendly, supportive and stress-free work environment. Apart from a range of leading employee welfare programmes, HKCG provided free clinical medical services, fitness facilities and a mother care room in its North Point headquarters. Because of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, HKCG replaced face-to-face activities with online programmes, including home fitness classes with yoga and Pilates, cooking classes, health tips and health talks by medical practitioners. HKCG also shouldered the cost of seasonal influenza vaccinations for its staff.

Driving a culture of safety and improving emergency procedures internally, HKCG held table-top exercises and a number of joint fire exercises with the Fire Services Department for personnel from Hong Kong and the PRC. These exercises helped ensure that HKCG's emergency response team and safety and risk management personnel would work smoothly with government authorities and external parties.

HKCG strives to develop safety culture to strengthen safety management system. In Hong Kong, Corporate Sustainability Department is responsible for organising various Health, Safety & Environment programme and activities for colleagues and contractors. CSD develop safety management system fulfilling the requirement of Factories and Industrial Undertaking (Safety Management) Regulation and ISO45001 Occupational Health and Safety Management System. In addition, CSD conducted a number of occupational safety and health ("OSH") training sessions, environmental awareness talks and professional and general safety and health training for employees.

Apart from developing and maintaining comprehensive safety management system, CSD organises a number of programmes and activities promoting safety culture. For example, the "Towngas Safety and Caring Programme" was developed for new joiners of HKCG, which provides HSE knowledge to new joiners through e-learning platform, and also provided them a mentorship programme in the first 3 months working in HKCG. New joiners can obtain OSH knowledge and be familiar with HKCG's culture from the programme. "Senior Management Regular HSE Inspection Programme" is in place to ensure leadership and the commitment of management, with the senior management of HKCG conducting HSE inspection to workplaces regularly to ensure compliance and continual improvement. In

order to enhance the reporting culture, "HSE Suggestion Scheme", "Near Miss Reporting Programme" and "HSE Instant Messaging Platform" were developed for employees and contractors to report good practises, near-miss cases and others to further improve the health and safety of workplaces.

"Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) Bulletin" is issued in every quarter to provide updated knowledge and news about latest ESG issues to employees and contractors. To enhance HSE culture, CSD organises HSE Day, HSE Month, HSE Quiz, HSE Walk, Contractor OSH programme and quarterly OSH promotion campaign regularly.

HKCG pursues for adopting new technology to ensure its facilities are safe and operating properly, in keeping with its philosophy of "Growth = innovation x implementation". In 2020, HKCG applied AI technology to monitor heavy machinery operation safety and to eliminate working at height hazard for riser checking works.

With the support of the management and effort of the employees, HKCG won a number of OSH Awards in HKOSH Award, including Safety Management Award, Safety Culture Award, Occupational Health Award, OSH Enhancement Programme Award, OSH Promotion Award, Pointing and Calling Award and OSH Annual Report Award.

Since obtaining ISO 45001 certification in 2019, HKCG has been assisting the subsidiaries, including ECO Environment Investments Limited (ECO) and U-Tech Engineering Company Limited (U-tech), to become ISO certified. In 2020, both subsidiaries successfully received certification.

HKCG successfully got recertified as a member of International Safety Workplace Programme in 2019.

PRC

HKCG's project companies in the PRC benefit from HKCG's health, safety and environment-focused experience and activities. Over the years, building on its established processes in Hong Kong, HKCG has been implementing international safety standards with the adoption of modern safety management systems, including sophisticated fire prevention systems, up-to-date gas detection procedures as well as established emergency handling strategies. Together with its regular safety inspection programme for customers, HKCG believes it has improved safety among its project companies. HKCG's joint venture in Wuhan gained its OHSAS 18001 certification in 2007, becoming HKCG's first large-scale PRC gas establishment to gain recognition from an international certification body for its health and safety management system. In 2008, joint ventures in Maanshan, Yixing, Guangzhou, Changzhou and Suzhou earned OHSAS 18001 certification, confirming that their occupational health and safety management systems are on par with stringent international specifications. The OHSAS 18001 standard was upgraded to ISO 45001 in 2018. As at the end of 2020, a total of 37 utility projects in the PRC have obtained OHSAS 18001/ISO 45001 standard certification. HKCG also gained external recognition for its activities in this area.

At the same time, HKCG published and implemented a number of safety manuals and guidelines for both the gas and water businesses, including an updated HSE policy and HSE manuals, a guideline on safety signage and pipeline colour codes, fire evacuation plans, joint venture general manager monthly safety and risk management inspection programmes as well as corporate emergency plans. HKCG also conducted regular safety and risk management audits as well as inspections, ensuring ongoing understanding and compliance with the highest industry standards.

HKCG organises regular safety training courses and workshops for mainland employees to raise their awareness of safety and promote a safe working culture. This includes various operational safety workshops and experience-sharing visits to Hong Kong Also, HKCG provides a range of communication channels to promote workplace safety, including WeChat, eLearning platforms and its corporate social media network. Using these channels, HKCG can share the latest HSE best practise guidelines, as well as incident alerts across its operations, so employees have access to HSE information and can take part in different activities, such as quizzes and competitions.

In 2017, a safety education video programme called "Don't Turn a Blind Eye" and the online safety and environmental protection knowledge contest were launched. Through these activities, employees learned about strict enforcement of safety systems, environmental protection, and occupation safety and health.

Responding to the national safe work month, the Group called on the project companies to organise the "Safety Walk" activity in 2017 and 2018. The event featured activities such as safety knowledge quiz, safe usage of gas promotion, safety promotion and environmental protection.

In 2020, the general manager of each JV increased safety inspections to twice a month and added an item on "Special Inspection for the Prevention and Control of COVID-19" to ensure all JVs implemented the specified sanitation and anti-viral measures.

Employee Relations

HKCG has experienced no work stoppages or strikes in its Hong Kong and PRC operations. With a few exceptions, HKCG has no collective bargaining or labour agreements with its employees in Hong Kong or the PRC. In Hong Kong, under the Employment Ordinance of Hong Kong, every employee, as between himself and his employer, has the right to become a member of a trade union and to participate in its activities. The Hong Kong & China Gas Co. Ltd. Chinese Employees Association (the "Association"), an employee-based trade union, was founded in 1948 and currently has approximately 542 members. Although the Association is not an officially recognised entity, it maintains regular dialogue and open communication with HKCG's management.

According to the "Labour Contract law of the PRC" (《中華人民共和國勞動合同法》), changes in labour rules, terms and conditions, policies and matters by employers that have a direct bearing on the immediate interests of employees have to be discussed with and determined through collective bargaining with labour unions or employee representatives. Advanced notification and explanation to labour unions or employees is also required for termination of employment contracts. In respect of HKCG, approximately 124 of its joint project companies have established labour unions, which engage in regular consultation and communication with management.

Community Relations

HKCG commits its community service efforts to areas where it believes there is a need for support. For instance, the Henderson Group and HKCG made donations to the Sichuan earthquake relief activities while some 150 volunteers from Henderson Group and HKCG participated in the relief work in 2008.

On 1 January 2008, HKCG extended its existing concession scheme in Hong Kong by introducing the Towngas Concession Scheme for Single Parent Families. In 2011, low-income families were added to this list.

HKCG's Towngas Volunteer Service Team was established in 1999 to further HKCG's commitment and care for the community. Since then, the team has contributed close to 980,000 voluntary hours of service, not only winning the Social Welfare Department of Hong Kong's "Highest Service Hour Award (Private Organisations-Best Customer Participation)", but also receiving the Hong Kong Council of Social Services' "Caring Company Award" for multiple years since 2002.

As part of its efforts to care for seniors and low-income families, HKCG has made and distributed over 4,000,000 rice dumplings and 2,500,000 mooncakes. At the same time, more than 670,000 servings of hot soup have been prepared, distributed and served to the elderly in the community. HKCG's Customer Volunteer Service Team was established in 2005 and a hair-cutting team was also set up in 2006 so as to widen the scope of the voluntary service.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Group maintained its caring initiatives through a wide range of volunteer and philanthropic activities to serve the elderly and help the disadvantaged. Together with the Christian Family Service Centre, HKCG launched the Love on Delivery programme for families suffering financial hardship as a result of job loss or underemployment due to COVID-19. Under this programme, 30,000 fresh food packs were distributed to 1,000 families from May to December 2020 to address the pressing needs of the underprivileged. As in-person visits were not possible during the pandemic, HKCG's volunteers provided their services online, organising small-scale interactive contests and publishing information on HKCG's job openings, health, gas safety and home repairs on the programme's social media platform. Another 450 families are expected to benefit from the programme in the second quarter of 2021 through the distribution of 13,500 fresh food packs.

To help members of the community who had lost their jobs as a result of the economic downturn, HKCG set up the Unemployed Support Scheme. Short-term employment opportunities were offered under the scheme to about 60 job seekers. Selected candidates who demonstrated outstanding performance were offered a one-year contract after completing their short-term jobs.

Through the annual Mad Dog Café charitable programme, HKCG employees prepares hotdogs and snacks to raise funds for those in need. Although the event had to be cancelled in 2020 due to the pandemic, the Group contributed funds towards the purchase of air purifiers, which were much in need for sanitising care homes for the elderly and disabled.

In the mainland, HKCG founded its own flagship charity programme, Gentle Breeze Movement, in 2013 to spread warmth to the public as a means to shoulder its responsibility as a corporate citizen. As part of the movement, as at the end of December 2020, the Group has donated educational materials valued at over RMB4.3 million to 42 schools in the provinces/autonomous regions of Jiangxi, Anhui, Jiangsu, Shandong, Guizhou, Shaanxi, Liaoning, Guangdong, Hubei, Fujian, Inner Mongolia, Sichuan, Heilongjiang and Chongqing. The programme was extended in 2020 to Chongqing and Qingyuan. Meanwhile, the Group also built Towngas China Charity Libraries and refurbished school facilities for impoverished students in a bid to improve their learning environment.

In the face of COVID-19, HKCG donated health supplies and medicine to mainland hospitals as well as medical staff and their families. These included supplies such as face masks, medical gloves, protective clothing, goggles and disinfectant as well as financial assistance. Health education programmes were also organised in districts across the country.

The Board of HKCG is committed to maintaining good corporate governance and is ultimately accountable for HKCG's activities, strategies and financial performance. The Board of HKCG has three Executive Directors and six Non-executive Directors. Three of the six Non-executive Directors are independent.

Dr. Lee is a Member of the Standing Committee of the 13th National Committee of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference and a Member as well as the Chairman of the Board of Directors of One Country Two Systems Research Institute. He was appointed as a Justice of the Peace by the Government of the HKSAR in 2009, and was awarded the Gold Bauhinia Star by the Government of the HKSAR in 2015. He is also the Chairman and President of Hong Kong & China Gas Investment Limited, HKCG's investment holding company in the PRC and chairman, vice chairman or a director of a number of project companies in the PRC. Mr. Chan is the Chairman of Towngas China, and the Vice Chairman of Shenzhen Gas Corporation Ltd. and Foran Energy Group Co., Ltd. (formerly known as Foshan Gas Group Co., Ltd.), and was previously a Non-executive Director of the tenth session of the board of directors of Shanghai Dazhong Public Utilities (Group) Co., Ltd., all of which are listed public companies. He is an Honorary President of The Hong Kong Management Association and a Vice Chairman of China Gas Association. Mr. Chan is a Member of the Standing Committee on Judicial Salaries and Conditions of Service of the Government of the HKSAR. (now known as Foran Energy Group Co., Ltd.) and a director of China-Singapore Suzhou Industrial Park Development Group Co., Ltd. ("CSSD") until his retirement at CSSD on 29th June 2020. All of which are listed public companies. He is a Member of the Mainland Business Advisory Committee of the Hong Kong Trade Development Council. (formerly known as Foshan Gas Group Co., Ltd.), all of which are listed public companies. Mr. Ho is the Vice Chairman of the General Committee of the Chamber of Hong Kong Listed Companies and the Vice Chairman of the Taxation Committee of the Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce. He is a Fellow of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales, a Fellow of the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and a Fellow of the Hong Kong Institute of Directors. Board Practices

According to the Articles of Association of HKCG, one-third of all the Directors are subject to retirement by rotation at every annual general meeting. Subject to the provisions contained in the Articles of Association, the term of office of all Non-executive Directors (including Independent Non-executive Directors) shall expire on 31 December 2023. HKCG's independent auditor, currently PricewaterhouseCoopers, is subject to re-appointment each year at the annual general meeting.

Committees of the Board

HKCG's Board maintains a Board Audit and Risk Committee, a Remuneration Committee and a Nomination Committee.

Board Audit and Risk Committee

The principal duty of the Board Audit and Risk Committee (formerly known as Audit Committee), formed in May 1996, is to assist the Board of HKCG in fulfilling its audit and control-related duties through the review of HKCG's financial reporting, risk management and internal control systems. The review covers all material controls, including financial, operational and compliance controls and risk management functions. HKCG has adopted written terms of reference for the Board Audit and Risk Committee that clearly define the role, authority and function of the Board Audit and Risk Committee. The Board Audit and Risk Committee is comprised of three members of the Board: Dr. the Hon. Sir David Li Kwok-po, Prof. Poon Chung-kwong and Dr. Moses Cheng Mo-chi.

Remuneration Committee

The principal duties of the Remuneration Committee, formed in September 2005, include, but are not limited to, making recommendations to the Board on HKCG's policy and structure for all remuneration of Directors and senior management (who are also executive directors of HKCG), reviewing and approving the special remuneration packages of all executive directors with reference to corporate goals and objectives resolved by the Board from time to time and determining, with delegated responsibility, the remuneration packages of individual executive directors. HKCG has adopted written terms of reference for the Remuneration Committee that clearly define the role, authority and function of the Remuneration Committee. The Remuneration Committee is comprised of five members of the Board: Dr. the Hon. Sir David Li Kwok-po, Dr. Lee Ka-kit, Mr. Lee Ka-shing, Prof. Poon Chung-kwong and Dr. Moses Cheng Mo-chi.

Nomination Committee

The principal duties of the Nomination Committee, formed in March 2012, include, but are not limited to, reviewing the structure, size and composition (including the skills, knowledge and experience) of the Board and making recommendations on any proposed changes to the Board to complement HKCG's corporate strategy. It is also responsible for making recommendations to the Board on nominations and appointment of directors as well as assessing the independence of independent non-executive directors. The Committee shall consider the candidate from a range of backgrounds on his/her merits and against objective criteria set out by the Board. HKCG has adopted written terms of reference for the Nomination Committee that clearly define the role, authority and function of the Nomination Committee. The Nomination Committee is comprised of five members of the Board: Dr. Lee Ka-kit, Mr. Lee Ka-shing, Dr. the Hon. Sir David Li Kwok-po, Prof. Poon Chung-kwong and Dr. Moses Cheng Mo-chi.

CERTAIN RELATIONSHIPS AND RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

As at 31 December 2020, Henderson Land Development Company Limited ("Henderson Land") owned approximately 41.53 per cent. of HKCG's shares, and is a related party of HKCG. See "Risk Factors – Risks Relating to HKCG's Business – Henderson Land Development Company Limited owns a significant stake of HKCG's shares and its interests may differ significantly from those of the Noteholders".

Dr. Lee Ka-kit, Chairman and Non-executive Director of HKCG, is also a Chairman and Managing Director of Henderson Land and a Vice Chairman of Henderson Investment Limited. Mr. Lee Ka-shing, Chairman and Non-executive Director of HKCG, is also a Chairman and Managing Director of Henderson Land and Henderson Investment Limited. Dr. Colin Lam Ko-yin, Non-executive Director of HKCG, is also an Executive Director and Vice Chairman of Henderson Land and Henderson Investment Limited. Prof. Poon Chung-kwong, Independent Non- executive Director of HKCG, is also an Independent Non-executive Director of Henderson Land. See "Directors and Management – Board of Directors".

Other related parties of HKCG include subsidiaries of Henderson Land. Members of the Group enter into transactions with Henderson Land and its subsidiaries from time to time. Those transactions include, for example:

- the development agreement which HKCG entered into with Henderson Land and its subsidiary in 2002 in relation to the property development at HKCG's Ma Tau Kok south plant site (now known as the Grand Waterfront property development). Under the development agreement, a subsidiary of Henderson Land is entitled to 27 per cent. of the net sales proceeds of the residential units of the property development, and HKCG is entitled to the remaining 73 per cent. Subsidiaries of Henderson Land were also appointed as the project and sales manager, the construction manager and main contractor, the suppliers of certain materials, the leasing manager and the estate manager of the property development. The transactions were entered into on normal commercial terms;
- the Grand Promenade property development project in Sai Wan Ho, Hong Kong, in which a member of the Group and a subsidiary of Henderson Land each has a 50 per cent. interest; and
- a member of the Group has an interest of approximately 15.8 per cent. and a subsidiary of Henderson Land has an interest of approximately 34.2 per cent. in the company that owns the IFC complex in Central, Hong Kong.

The Group has also entered into other transactions with Henderson Land and its subsidiaries, including transactions for sale of goods and services, and other transactions on normal commercial terms.

Other related parties of HKCG also include a bank with common directors with HKCG which is The Bank of East Asia, Limited (of which Dr. the Hon. Sir David Li Kwok-po, an Independent Non-executive Director of HKCG, is the Executive Chairman and Dr. Lee Ka-kit was previously a Non-executive Director of The Bank of East Asia, Limited). The Group has entered into banking and financial transactions with The Bank of East Asia, Limited and its subsidiaries or related companies on an arm's length basis or on normal commercial terms, and the Group expects to enter into similar transactions with it in the future.

Other transactions between the Group and related parties are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements of HKCG.

Towngas China became an associate of HKCG on 1 March 2007 when it acquired approximately 43.9 per cent. of Towngas China's equity shares. Towngas China, a Hong Kong listed company, changed its name from Panva Gas Holdings Limited on 23 May 2007.

The Group obtained an effective control over the majority of the board of directors of Towngas China in late December 2009. Therefore, Towngas China was accounted for and consolidated into the consolidated accounts of the Group as a subsidiary as from 31 December 2009.

On 17 March 2010, the Group entered into a sale and purchase agreement with Towngas China whereby the Group agreed to dispose of its entire equity interests in six piped city-gas project companies in Liaoning and Zhejiang provinces to Towngas China in exchange for the allotment and issue of 485 million new ordinary shares by Towngas China. The transaction was approved by Towngas China's independent shareholders at an extraordinary general meeting held on 29 April 2010. As a result of the transaction which was completed on 15 July 2010, the Group's interest in Towngas China increased from approximately 893 million shares to approximately 1,378 million shares and the Group's shareholding was raised from approximately 45.5 per cent. (as at 30 June 2010) to approximately 56.3 per cent. (as at 15 July 2010).

On 13 November 2010, the Group has agreed to take a placing of 250 million shares in Towngas China (the "2010 Placing Shares") representing approximately 10.21 per cent. of the issued share capital of Towngas China. After completion of the acquisition of the 2010 Placing Shares on 17 November 2010, the Group's shareholding in Towngas China was raised to approximately 66.49 per cent. After exercising certain share options, electing to receive new shares of Towngas China under its scrip dividend schemes and acquiring further interests in Towngas China from the market, the Group held approximately 68.21 per cent. of the total issued shares of Towngas China as at 31 December 2020.

Substantial Shareholding Interests in HKCG

Investors wishing to use the facilities of any of the Clearing Systems are advised to confirm the continued applicability of the rules, regulations and procedures of the relevant Clearing System. None of the Issuer, the Guarantor nor any other party to the Agency Agreement will have any responsibility or liability for any aspect of the records relating to, or payments made on account of, beneficial ownership interests in the Notes held through the facilities of any Clearing System or for maintaining, supervising or reviewing any records relating to, or payments made on account of, such beneficial ownership interests.

Book-entry Systems

Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg

Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg each holds securities for its customers and facilitates the clearance and settlement of securities transactions by electronic book-entry transfer between their respective account holders. Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg provide various services including safekeeping, administration, clearance and settlement of internationally traded securities and securities lending and borrowing. Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg also deal with domestic securities markets in several countries through established depository and custodial relationships. Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg have established an electronic bridge between their two systems across which their respective participants may settle trades with each other.

Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg customers are world-wide financial institutions, including underwriters, securities brokers and dealers, banks, trust companies and clearing corporations. Indirect access to Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg is available to other institutions that clear through or maintain a custodial relationship with an account holder of either system.

CMU

The CMU is a central depositary service provided by the Central Moneymarkets Unit of the HKMA for the safe custody and electronic trading between the members of this service ("CMU Members") of Exchange Fund Bills and Notes Clearing and Settlement Service securities and capital markets instruments (together, "CMU Instruments") which are specified in the CMU Reference Manual as capable of being held within the CMU.

The CMU is only available to CMU Instruments issued by a CMU Member or by a person for whom a CMU Member acts as agent for the purposes of lodging instruments issued by such persons. Membership of the services is open to all financial institutions regulated by the HKMA, Securities and Futures Commission, Insurance Authority or Mandatory Provident Fund Schemes Authority. For further details on the full range of the CMU's custodial services, please refer to the CMU Reference Manual.

The CMU has an income distribution service which is a service offered by the CMU to facilitate the distribution of interest, coupon or redemption proceeds (collectively, the "income proceeds") by CMU Members who are paying agents to the legal title holders of CMU Instruments via the CMU system. Furthermore, the CMU has a corporate action platform which allows an issuer (or its agent) to make an announcement/notification of a corporate action and noteholders to submit the relevant certification. For further details, please refer to the CMU Reference Manual.

An investor holding an interest in the Notes through an account with either Euroclear or Clearstream, Luxembourg will hold that interest through the respective accounts which Euroclear and Clearstream, Luxembourg each have with the CMU.

Transfers of Notes Represented by Registered Global Notes

Transfers of any interests in Notes represented by a Registered Global Note within Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and/or the CMU will be effected in accordance with the customary rules and operating procedures of the relevant Clearing System.

Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and the CMU have each published rules and operating procedures designed to facilitate transfers of beneficial interests in Registered Global Notes among accountholders of Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg and the CMU. However, they are under no obligation to perform or continue to perform such procedures, and such procedures may be discontinued or changed at any time. None of the Issuer, the Guarantor, the Paying Agents, the Transfer Agent, the Registrar and the Dealers will be responsible for any performance by Euroclear, Clearstream, Luxembourg or the CMU or their respective accountholders of their respective obligations under the rules and procedures governing their operations and none of them will have any liability for any aspect of the records relating to or payments made on account of beneficial interests in the Notes represented by Registered Global Notes or for maintaining, supervising or reviewing any records relating to such beneficial interests.

TAXATION

The following is a general description of certain tax considerations relating to the Notes and is based on law and relevant interpretations thereof in effect as at the date of this Offering Circular, all of which are subject to change, and does not constitute legal or taxation advice. It does not purport to be a complete analysis of all tax considerations relating to the Notes. Prospective holders of Notes who are in any doubt as to their tax position or who may be subject to tax in any jurisdiction are advised to consult their own professional advisers.

Hong Kong

Withholding Tax

No withholding tax is payable in Hong Kong in respect of payments of principal or interest on the Notes or in respect of any capital gains arising from the sale of the Notes.

Profits Tax

Hong Kong profits tax is chargeable on every person carrying on a trade, profession or business in Hong Kong in respect of profits arising in or derived from Hong Kong from such trade, profession or business (excluding profits arising from the sale of capital assets).

Interest on the Notes may be deemed to be profits arising in or derived from Hong Kong from a trade, profession or business carried on in Hong Kong in the following circumstances:

- (i) interest on the Notes is derived from Hong Kong and is received by or accrues to a corporation, carrying on a trade, profession or business in Hong Kong;
- (ii) interest on the Notes is derived from Hong Kong and is received by or accrues to a person, other than a corporation, carrying on a trade, profession or business in Hong Kong and is in respect of the funds of that trade, profession or business;
- (iii) interest on the Notes is received by or accrues to a financial institution (as defined in the Inland Revenue Ordinance (Cap. 112) of Hong Kong (the "IRO")) and arises through or from the carrying on by the financial institution of its business in Hong Kong; or
- (iv) interest on the Notes is received by or accrues to a corporation, other than a financial institution, and arises through or from the carrying on in Hong Kong by the corporation of its intra-group financing business (within the meaning of section 16(3) of the IRO).

Sums received by or accrued to a financial institution by way of gains or profits arising through or from the carrying on by the financial institution of its business in Hong Kong from the sale, disposal and redemption of Notes will be subject to Hong Kong profits tax. Sums received by or accrued to a corporation, other than a financial institution, by way of gains or profits arising through or from the carrying on in Hong Kong by the corporation of its intra-group financing business (within the meaning of section 16(3) of the IRO) from the sale, disposal or other redemption of Notes will be subject to Hong Kong profits tax.

Sums derived from the sale, disposal or redemption of Notes will be subject to Hong Kong profits tax where received by or accrued to a person, other than a financial institution, who carries on a trade, profession or business in Hong Kong and the sum has a Hong Kong source unless otherwise exempted. The source of such sums will generally be determined by having regard to the manner in which the Notes are acquired and disposed of.

In certain circumstances, Hong Kong profits tax exemptions (such as concessionary tax rates) may be available. Investors are advised to consult their own tax advisors to ascertain the applicability of any exemptions to their individual position.

Stamp Duty

Stamp duty will not be payable on the issue of Bearer Notes provided either:

- (i) such Bearer Notes are denominated in a currency other than the currency of Hong Kong and are not repayable in any circumstances in the currency of Hong Kong; or
- (ii) such Bearer Notes constitute loan capital (as defined in the Stamp Duty Ordinance (Cap. 117.) of Hong Kong (the "SDO")).

If stamp duty is payable it is payable by the Issuer on the issue of Bearer Notes at a rate of 3 per cent. of the market value of the Bearer Notes at the time of issue. No stamp duty will be payable on any subsequent transfer of Bearer Notes.

No stamp duty is payable on the issue of Registered Notes. Stamp duty may be payable on any transfer of Registered Notes if the relevant transfer is required to be registered in Hong Kong. Stamp duty will, however, not be payable on any transfer of Registered Notes, provided that either:

- (i) such Registered Notes are denominated in a currency other than the currency of Hong Kong and are not repayable in any circumstances in the currency of Hong Kong; or
- (ii) the Registered Notes constitute loan capital (as defined in the SDO).

If stamp duty is payable in respect of the transfer of Registered Notes it will be payable at the rate of 0.2 per cent. (of which 0.1 per cent. is payable by the seller and 0.1 per cent. is payable by the purchaser) normally by reference to the consideration or its value, whichever is higher. The Hong Kong government has passed the Revenue (Stamp Duty) Bill 2021 to increase the relevant rate of stamp duty from 0.2 per cent. to 0.26 per cent. (of which 0.13 per cent. is payable by the seller and 0.13 per cent. is payable by the purchaser), with such increase due to take effect on 1 August 2021. In addition, stamp duty is payable at the fixed rate of HK\$5 on each instrument of transfer executed in relation to any transfer of the Registered Notes if the relevant transfer is required to be registered in Hong Kong.

Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act

Pursuant to certain provisions of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code of 1986, commonly known as FATCA, a foreign financial institution (as defined by FATCA) may be required to withhold on certain payments it makes ("foreign passthru payments") to persons that fail to meet certain certification, reporting or related requirements. The issuer may be a foreign financial institution for these purposes. A number of jurisdictions (including Hong Kong) have entered into, or have agreed in substance to, intergovernmental agreements with the United States to implement FATCA ("IGAs"), which modify the way in which FATCA applies in their jurisdictions. Under the provisions of IGAs as currently in effect, a foreign financial institution in an IGA jurisdiction would generally not be required to withhold under FATCA or an IGA from payments that it makes. Certain aspects of the application of the FATCA provisions and IGAs to instruments such as the Notes, including whether withholding would ever be required pursuant to FATCA or an IGA with respect to payments on instruments such as the Notes, are uncertain and may be subject to change. Even if withholding would be required pursuant to FATCA or an IGA with respect to payments on instruments such as the Notes, such withholding would not apply prior to the date that is two years after the date on which final regulations defining foreign passthru payments are published in the U.S. Federal Register and Notes characterised as debt (or which are not otherwise characterised as equity and have a fixed term) for U.S. federal tax purposes that are issued on or prior to the date that is six months after the date on which final regulations defining foreign passthru payments are filed with the U.S. Federal Register generally would be grandfathered for purposes of FATCA withholding unless materially modified after such date (including by reason of a substitution of the issuer). However, if additional Notes (as described under "Terms and Conditions - Further Issues") that are not distinguishable from previously issued Notes are issued after the expiration of the grandfathering period and are subject to withholding under FATCA, then withholding agents may treat all Notes, including the Notes offered prior to the expiration of the grandfathering period, as subject to withholding under FATCA. Holders should consult their own tax advisers regarding how these rules

may apply to their investment in Notes. In the event any withholding would be required pursuant to FATCA or an IGA with respect to payments on the Notes, no person will be required to pay additional amounts as a result of the withholding.

The proposed financial transactions tax ("FTT")

On 14 February 2013, the European Commission published a proposal (the "Commission's Proposal") for a Directive for a common FTT in Belgium, Germany, Estonia, Greece, Spain, France, Italy, Austria, Portugal, Slovenia and Slovakia (the "participating Member States"). However, Estonia has since stated that it will not participate.

The Commission's Proposal has very broad scope and could, if introduced, apply to certain dealings in Notes (including secondary market transactions) in certain circumstances. The issuance and subscription of Notes should, however, be exempt.

Under the Commission's Proposal the FTT could apply in certain circumstances to persons both within and outside of the participating Member States. Generally, it would apply to certain dealings in Notes where at least one party is a financial institution, and at least one party is established in a participating Member State. A financial institution may be, or be deemed to be "established" in a participating Member State in a broad range of circumstances, including (a) by transacting with a person established in a participating Member State or (b) where the financial instrument which is subject to the dealings is issued in a participating Member State.

However, the FTT proposal remains subject to negotiation between participating Member States. It may therefore be altered prior to any implementation, the timing of which remains unclear. Additional EU Member States may decide to participate.

Prospective holders of Notes are advised to seek their own professional advice in relation to the FTT.

SUBSCRIPTION AND SALE

The Dealers have, in an amended and restated programme agreement dated 9 June 2021 (such agreement as further amended and/or supplemented and/or restated from time to time, the "Programme Agreement"), agreed with the Issuer and the Guarantor a basis upon which they or any of them may from time to time agree to purchase Notes. Any such agreement will extend to those matters stated under "Form of the Notes" and "Terms and Conditions of the Notes". In the Programme Agreement, the Issuer (failing which, the Guarantor) has agreed to reimburse the Dealers for certain of their expenses in connection with the establishment and any future update of the Programme and the issue of Notes under the Programme and to indemnify the Dealers against certain liabilities incurred by them in connection therewith.

The Dealers and certain of their affiliates may have performed certain investment banking and advisory services for the Issuer, the Guarantor and/or their respective affiliates from time to time for which they have received customary fees and expenses and may, from time to time, engage in transactions with and perform services for the Issuer, the Guarantor and/or their respective affiliates in the ordinary course of their business. The Dealers or certain of their affiliates may purchase Notes and be allocated Notes for asset management and/or proprietary purposes but not with a view to distribution.

The Dealers or their respective affiliates may purchase Notes for its or their own account and enter into transactions, including credit derivatives, such as asset swaps, repackaging and credit default swaps relating to Notes and/or other securities of the Issuer, the Guarantor or their respective subsidiaries or associates at the same time as the offer and sale of Notes or in secondary market transactions. Such transactions would be carried out as bilateral trades with selected counterparties and separately from any existing sale or resale of Notes to which this Offering Circular relates (notwithstanding that such selected counterparties may also be purchasers of Notes).

The Dealers may hold or sell such Notes or purchase further Notes for their own account in the secondary market or deal in any other securities of the Issuer or the Guarantor, and therefore, they may offer or sell the Notes or other securities otherwise than in connection with the offering of the Notes. Accordingly, references herein to the Notes being 'offered' should be read as including any offering of the Notes to the Dealers and/or their respective affiliates, for their own account. Such entities are not expected to disclose such transactions or the extent of any such investment, otherwise than in accordance with any legal or regulatory obligation to do so. Furthermore, it is possible that only a limited number of investors may subscribe for a significant proportion of the Notes. If this is the case, liquidity of trading in the Notes may be constrained. The Issuer, the Guarantor and the Dealers are under no obligation to disclose the extent of the distribution of the Notes amongst individual investors.

United States

The Notes have not been and will not be registered under the Securities Act or the securities laws of any state or other jurisdiction of the United States and may not be offered or sold within the United States or, if Category 2 is specified in the Pricing Supplement, to, or for the account or benefit of, U.S. persons except in certain transactions exempt from or not subject to the registration requirements of the Securities Act. Terms used in this paragraph have the meanings given to them by Regulation S under the Securities Act.

The Notes in bearer form are subject to U.S. tax law requirements and may not be offered, sold or delivered within the United States or its possessions or to a United States person, except in certain transactions permitted by U.S. tax regulations. Terms used in this paragraph have the meanings given to them by the U.S. Internal Revenue Code of 1986 and Treasury regulations promulgated thereunder. The applicable Pricing Supplement will identify whether TEFRA C rules or TEFRA D rules apply or whether TEFRA is not applicable.

If Category 2 is specified in the Pricing Supplement, each Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that it will not offer, sell or deliver Notes (a) as part of their distribution at any time or (b) otherwise until 40 days after the completion of the distribution, as determined and certified by the relevant Dealer or, in the case of an issue of Notes on a syndicated basis, the relevant lead manager, of all Notes of the Tranche of which such Notes are a part, within the United States or to, or for the account or benefit of, U.S.

persons except in accordance with Regulation S of the Securities Act. Each Dealer has further agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to agree, that it will send to each dealer to which it sells any Notes during the distribution compliance period a confirmation or other notice setting forth the restrictions on offers and sales of the Notes within the United States or to, or for the account or benefit of, U.S. persons. Terms used in this paragraph have the meanings given to them by Regulation S under the Securities Act.

If Category 1 is specified in the Pricing Supplement, the Notes are being offered and sold only outside the United States in offshore transactions in reliance on, and in compliance with, Regulation S.

Until 40 days after the commencement of the offering of any Series of Notes, an offer or sale of such Notes within the United States by any dealer (whether or not participating in the offering) may violate the registration requirements of the Securities Act if such offer or sale is made otherwise than in accordance with an available exemption from registration under the Securities Act.

Each issuance of Index Linked Notes or Dual Currency Notes shall be subject to such additional U.S. selling restrictions as the Issuer and the relevant Dealer may agree as a term of the issuance and purchase of such Notes, which additional selling restrictions shall be set out in the applicable Pricing Supplement.

Prohibition of Sales to EEA Retail Investors

Unless the Pricing Supplement in respect of any Notes specifies "Prohibition of Sales to EEA Retail Investors" as "Not Applicable", each Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that it has not offered, sold or otherwise made available and will not offer, sell or otherwise make available any Notes which are the subject of the offering contemplated by the Offering Circular as completed by the Pricing Supplement in relation thereto to any retail investor in the European Economic Area.

For the purposes of this provision:

- (a) the expression "retail investor" means a person who is one (or more) of the following:
 - (i) a retail client as defined in point (11) of Article 4(1) of MiFID II; or
 - (ii) a customer within the meaning of the Insurance Distribution Directive, where that customer would not qualify as a professional client as defined in point (10) of Article 4(1) of MiFID II; or
 - (iii) not a qualified investor as defined in the Prospectus Regulation; and
- (b) the expression an "offer" includes the communication in any form and by any means of sufficient information on the terms of the offer and the Notes to be offered so as to enable an investor to decide to purchase or subscribe the Notes.

If the Pricing Supplement in respect of any Notes specifies "Prohibition of Sales to EEA Retail Investors" as "Not Applicable", in relation to each Member State of the EEA, each Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that it has not made and will not make an offer of Notes which are the subject of the offering contemplated by this Offering Circular as completed by the pricing supplement in relation thereto to the public in that Member State except that it may make an offer of such Notes to the public in that Member State:

(a) if the pricing supplement in relation to the Notes specify that an offer of those Notes may be made other than pursuant to Article 1(4) of the Prospectus Regulation in that Member State (a "Non-exempt Offer"), following the date of publication of a prospectus in relation to such Notes which has been approved by the competent authority in that Member State or, where appropriate, approved in another Member State and notified to the competent authority in that Member State, provided that any such prospectus has subsequently been completed by the pricing supplement contemplating such Non-exempt Offer, in accordance with the Prospectus Regulation, in the period

beginning and ending on the dates specified in such prospectus or pricing supplement, as applicable and the Issuer has consented in writing to its use for the purpose of that Non-exempt Offer;

- (b) at any time to any legal entity which is a qualified investor as defined in the Prospectus Regulation;
- (c) at any time to fewer than 150 natural or legal persons (other than qualified investors as defined in the Prospectus Regulation) subject to obtaining the prior consent of the relevant Dealer or Dealers nominated by the Issuer for any such offer; or
- (d) at any time in any other circumstances falling within Article 1(4) of the Prospectus Regulation,

provided that no such offer of Notes referred to in (b) to (d) above shall require the Issuer or any Dealer to publish a prospectus pursuant to Article 3 of the Prospectus Regulation or supplement a prospectus pursuant to Article 23 of the Prospectus Regulation.

For the purposes of this provision, the expression "an offer of Notes to the public" in relation to any Notes in any Relevant Member State means the communication in any form and by any means of sufficient information on the terms of the offer and the Notes to be offered so as to enable an investor to decide to purchase or subscribe the Notes, as the same may be varied in that Member State by any measure implementing the Prospectus Directive in that Member State, the expression "Prospectus Directive" means Directive 2003/71/EC (as amended or superseded), and includes any relevant implementing measure in each Relevant Member State.

United Kingdom

Prohibition of Sales to UK Retail Investors

Unless the Pricing Supplement in respect of any Notes specifies "Prohibition of Sales to UK Retail Investors" as "Not Applicable", each Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that it has not offered, sold or otherwise made available and will not offer, sell or otherwise make available any Notes which are the subject of the offering contemplated by this Offering Circular as completed by the Final Terms (or Pricing Supplement, as the case may be) in relation thereto to any retail investor in the United Kingdom.

For the purposes of this provision:

- (a) the expression "retail investor" means a person who is one (or more) of the following:
 - (i) a retail client, as defined in point (8) of Article 2 of Regulation (EU) No 2017/565 as it forms part of domestic law by virtue of the EUWA; or
 - (ii) a customer within the meaning of the provisions of the FSMA and any rules or regulations made under the FSMA to implement Directive (EU) 2016/97, where that customer would not qualify as a professional client, as defined in point (8) of Article 2(1) of Regulation (EU) No 600/2014 as it forms part of domestic law by virtue of the EUWA; or
 - (iii) not a qualified investor as defined in Article 2 of UK Prospectus Regulation; and
- (b) the expression an "offer" includes the communication in any form and by any means of sufficient information on the terms of the offer and the Notes to be offered so as to enable an investor to decide to purchase or subscribe for the Notes.

If the Pricing Supplement in respect of any Notes specifies "Prohibition of Sales to UK Retail Investors" as "Not Applicable", each Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that it has not made and will not make an offer of Notes which are the subject of the offering contemplated by this Offering Circular as completed by the final terms in relation thereto to the public in the United Kingdom except that it may make an offer of such Notes to the public in the United Kingdom:

- (a) if the final terms in relation to the Notes specify that an offer of those Notes may be made other than pursuant to section 86 of the FSMA (a "Public Offer"), following the date of publication of a prospectus in relation to such Notes which either (i) has been approved by the Financial Conduct Authority, or (ii) is to be treated as if it had been approved by the Financial Conduct Authority in accordance with the transitional provision in Regulation 74 of the Prospectus (Amendment etc.) (EU Exit) Regulations 2019, provided that any such prospectus has subsequently been completed by final terms contemplating such Public Offer, in the period beginning and ending on the dates specified in such prospectus or final terms, as applicable, and the Issuer has consented in writing to its use for the purpose of that Public Offer;
- (b) at any time to any legal entity which is a qualified investor as defined in Article 2 of UK Prospectus Regulation;
- (c) at any time to fewer than 150 natural or legal persons (other than qualified investors as defined in Article 2 of UK Prospectus Regulation) in the United Kingdom subject to obtaining the prior consent of the relevant Dealer or Dealers nominated by the Issuer for any such offer; or
- (d) at any time in any other circumstances falling within section 86 of the FSMA,

provided that no such offer of Notes referred to in (b) to (d) above shall require the Issuer or any Dealer to publish a prospectus pursuant to section 85 of the FSMA or supplement a prospectus pursuant to Article 23 of UK Prospectus Regulation.

For the purposes of this provision, the expression "an offer of Notes to the public" in relation to any Notes means the communication in any form and by any means of sufficient information on the terms of the offer and the Notes to be offered so as to enable an investor to decide to purchase or subscribe for the Notes and the expression "UK Prospectus Regulation" means Regulation (EU) 2017/1129 as it forms part of domestic law by virtue of the EUWA.

Other regulatory restrictions in the United Kingdom

Each Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that:

- (a) in relation to any Notes which have a maturity of less than one year, (i) it is a person whose ordinary activities involve it in acquiring, holding, managing or disposing of investments (as principal or agent) for the purposes of its business and (ii) it has not offered or sold and will not offer or sell any Notes other than to persons whose ordinary activities involve them in acquiring, holding, managing or disposing of investments (as principal or as agent) for the purposes of their businesses or who it is reasonable to expect will acquire, hold, manage or dispose of investments (as principal or agent) for the purposes of their businesses where the issue of the Notes would otherwise constitute a contravention of Section 19 of the FSMA by the Issuer;
- (b) it has only communicated or caused to be communicated and will only communicate or cause to be communicated an invitation or inducement to engage in investment activity (within the meaning of Section 21 of the FSMA) received by it in connection with the issue or sale of any Notes in circumstances in which Section 21(1) of the FSMA does not apply to the Issuer or the Guarantor; and
- (c) it has complied and will comply with all applicable provisions of the FSMA with respect to anything done by it in relation to any Notes in, from or otherwise involving the United Kingdom.

Japan

The Notes have not been and will not be registered under the Financial Instruments and Exchange Act of Japan (Act No. 25 of 1948, as amended; the "FIEA"). Accordingly, Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that it has not, directly or indirectly, offered or sold and will not, directly or indirectly, offer or sell any Notes in Japan or to, or for the benefit of, any resident of Japan (as defined under Item 5, Paragraph 1, Article 6 of the Foreign Exchange and Foreign Trade Control Act (Act No. 228 of 1949, as amended)), or to others for re-offering or resale, directly or indirectly, in Japan or to, or for the benefit of, a resident of Japan, except pursuant to an exemption from the registration requirements of, and otherwise in compliance with, the FIEA and any other applicable laws, regulations and ministerial guidelines of Japan.

Hong Kong

Each Dealer has represented and agreed, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to represent and agree, that:

- (a) it has not offered or sold, and will not offer or sell in Hong Kong by means of any document, any Notes (except for Notes which are a "structured product" as defined in the Securities and Futures Ordinance (Cap. 571) of Hong Kong, the "Securities and Futures Ordinance") other than (i) to "professional investors" as defined in the Securities and Futures Ordinance and any rules made under the Securities and Futures Ordinance, or (ii) in other circumstances which do not result in the document being a "prospectus" as defined in the Companies (Winding Up and Miscellaneous Provisions) Ordinance (Cap. 32) of Hong Kong (the "C(WUMP)O") or which do not constitute an offer to the public within the meaning of the C(WUMP)O; and
- (b) it has not issued or had in its possession for the purposes of issue and will not issue or have in its possession for the purposes of issue, whether in Hong Kong or elsewhere, any advertisement, invitation or document relating to the Notes, which is directed at, or the contents of which are likely to be accessed or read by, the public of Hong Kong (except if permitted to do so under the securities laws of Hong Kong) other than with respect to Notes which are or are intended to be disposed of only to persons outside Hong Kong or only to "professional investors" as defined in the Securities and Futures Ordinance and any rules made under the Securities and Futures Ordinance.

The People's Republic of China

Each Dealer has represented, warranted and agreed that the Notes are not being offered or sold and may not be offered or sold, directly or indirectly, in the People's Republic of China (for such purposes, not including the Hong Kong and Macau Special Administrative Regions or Taiwan), except as permitted by the securities laws of the People's Republic of China.

Singapore

Each Dealer has acknowledged, and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to acknowledge, that this Offering Circular has not been registered as a prospectus with the Monetary Authority of Singapore. Accordingly, each Dealer has represented, warranted and agreed or will represent, warrant and agree that it has not offered or sold any Notes or caused the Notes to be made the subject of an invitation for subscription or purchase and will not offer or sell any Notes or cause the Notes to be made the subject of an invitation for subscription or purchase, and has not circulated or distributed, nor will it circulate or distribute, this Offering Circular or any other document or material in connection with the offer or sale, or invitation for subscription or purchase, of any Notes, whether directly or indirectly, to any person in Singapore other than (a) to an institutional investor (as defined in Section 4A of the Securities and Futures Act (Chapter 289) of Singapore, as modified or amended from time to time (the "Securities and Futures Act")) pursuant to Section 274 of the Securities and Futures Act, (b) to a relevant person (as defined in Section 275(2) of the Securities and Futures Act) under Section 275(1) of the Securities and Futures Act, or to any person pursuant to Section 275(1A) of the

Securities and Futures Act, and in accordance with the conditions specified in Section 275 of the Securities and Futures Act, or (c) otherwise pursuant to, and in accordance with the conditions of, any other applicable provision of the Securities and Futures Act.

Where the Notes are subscribed or purchased under Section 275 of the Securities and Futures Act by a relevant person which is:

- (a) a corporation (which is not an accredited investor (as defined in Section 4A of the Securities and Futures Act)) the sole business of which is to hold investments and the entire share capital of which is owned by one or more individuals, each of whom is an accredited investor; or
- (b) a trust (where the trustee is not an accredited investor) whose sole purpose is to hold investments and each beneficiary is an individual who is an accredited investor,

securities or securities-based derivatives contracts (each term as defined in Section 2(1) of the Securities and Futures Act) of that corporation or the beneficiaries' rights and interests (howsoever described) in that trust shall not be transferable for six months after that corporation or that trust has acquired the Notes pursuant to an offer made under Section 275 of the Securities and Futures Act except:

- (i) to an institutional investor or to a relevant person or to any person arising from an offer referred to in Section 275(1A) or Section 276(4)(i)(B) of the Securities and Futures Act;
- (ii) where no consideration is or will be given for the transfer;
- (iii) where the transfer is by operation of law;
- (iv) pursuant to Section 276(7) of the Securities and Futures Act; or
- (v) as specified in Regulation 37A of the Securities and Futures (Offers of Investments) (Securities and Securities-based Derivatives Contracts) Regulations 2018.

General

Each Dealer has agreed and each further Dealer appointed under the Programme will be required to agree that it will (to the best of its knowledge and belief) comply with all applicable securities laws and regulations in force in any jurisdiction in which it purchases, offers, sells or delivers Notes or possesses or distributes this Offering Circular and will obtain any consent, approval or permission required by it for the purchase, offer, sale or delivery by it of Notes under the laws and regulations in force in any jurisdiction to which it is subject or in which it makes such purchases, offers, sales or deliveries and none of the Issuer, the Guarantor and any of the other Dealers shall have any responsibility therefor.

If a jurisdiction requires that the offering be made by a licensed broker or dealer and the Dealers or any affiliate of the Dealers is a licensed broker or dealer in that jurisdiction, the offering shall be deemed to be made by that Dealer or its affiliate on behalf of the Issuer in such jurisdiction.

None of the Issuer, the Guarantor and any of the Dealers represents that Notes may at any time lawfully be sold in compliance with any applicable registration or other requirements in any jurisdiction, or pursuant to any exemption available thereunder, or assumes any responsibility for facilitating such sale.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Authorisation

The establishment of the Programme and the issue of the Notes thereunder have been duly authorised by a resolution of the Board of Directors of the Issuer dated 15 May 2009, a resolution of a committee of the Board of Directors of the Issuer dated 13 December 2010, resolutions of the Board of Directors of the Issuer dated 17 April 2012, 28 June 2019 and 1 June 2021. Each issue of Notes will be separately approved by the Board of Directors (or a committee thereof) of the Issuer.

Guarantee

The giving of the Guarantee has been duly authorised by a resolution of HKCG's Board of Directors on 15 May 2009, a resolution of HKCG's Board of Directors on 25 November 2011, a resolution of a committee of the Board of Directors of HKCG on 17 April 2012, 28 June 2019 and 1 June 2021.

Consents

All consents, approvals, authorisations or other orders as may be required by the Issuer have been given for the establishment of the Programme and for the Issuer to undertake and perform its obligations under the Notes to be issued under the Programme and the documents entered into in connection with the Programme to which the Issuer is a party.

All consents, approvals, authorisations or other orders as may be required by HKCG have been given for the creation and issue of the Guarantee and for HKCG to undertake and perform its obligations under the Guarantee and the documents entered into in connection with the Programme to which HKCG is a party.

Listing of Notes

Application has been made to the Hong Kong Stock Exchange for the listing of the Programme by way of debt issues to Professional Investors only, and for the listing of, and permission to deal in, the Notes to be issued under the Programme with 12 months after the date of this Offering Circular. The issue price of Notes listed on the Hong Kong Stock Exchange will be expressed as a percentage of their nominal amount. Transactions will normally be effected for settlement in the relevant specified currency and for delivery by the end of the second trading day after the date of the transaction. It is expected that dealings will, if permission is granted to deal in and for the listing of Notes, commence on or about the business day next following the date of listing of the relevant Notes.

Clearing systems

The Notes to be issued under the Programme have been accepted for clearance through Euroclear and Clearstream. The appropriate Common Code and ISIN for each Tranche of Notes allocated by Euroclear and Clearstream will be specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement. The Issuer may also apply to have the Notes accepted for clearance through the CMU. The relevant CMU instrument number will be specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement. If the Notes are to clear through an additional or alternative clearing system the appropriate information will be specified in the applicable Pricing Supplement.

No significant change

Save as disclosed in this Offering Circular, there has been no significant change in the financial or trading position of the Group since 31 December 2020 and there has been no material adverse change in the financial position or prospects of the Group since 31 December 2020.

Litigation

None of the Issuer, HKCG or any other member of the Group is or has been involved in any governmental, legal or arbitration proceedings (including any proceedings which are pending or threatened of which the Issuer or HKCG is aware) in the 12 months preceding the date of this document which may have or have in such period had a significant effect on the financial position or profitability of the Issuer, HKCG or the Group.

Auditor

The independent auditor of the Issuer and HKCG is PricewaterhouseCoopers who are independent Certified Public Accountants. PricewaterhouseCoopers have audited HKCG's consolidated financial statements, and have issued an unqualified audit opinion, in accordance with Hong Kong Standards on Auditing issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants for the financial year ended 31 December 2020.
